# Weekly Parsha



Parshas Shelach By Rabbi A. Leib Scheinbaum

### "And the people wept that night" (14:1)

Klal Yisrael believed the spies' malignant report of what they saw in Eretz Yisrael. They responded to the report in a manner unbecoming a noble people, a nation that stood at Har Sinai and was privy to an unprecedented Revelation of the Almighty. What was their response? They cried - and cried. They withdrew to their tents and lamented the terrible "fate" that was awaiting them. They lived through a night of ceaseless weeping, a night of unwarranted weeping. Hashem also responded. The Talmud in Taanis 28a states that Hashem said to Klal Yisrael, "You wept without reason; I will provide you with a weeping for generations." This refers to our national day of mourning, Tisha B'Av, the day upon which our two Batei Mikdash were destroyed, the day that served as the harbinger of our *galus*, the beginning of our long exile.

Hashem does not tolerate unwarranted weeping. While it is appropriate to mourn for a tragedy, it is wrong to transform a mishap into a tragedy, to view a temporary setback as a national calamity. It is not justifiable; it is not honest. Even in mourning, integrity must prevail. Another aspect of unmitigated grief should be addressed. The Jewish nation has undergone great tragedies throughout our tumultuous history. We have suffered persecution, affliction, and annihilation. We have always, however, bounced back. We did not resign ourselves to the loss. We took the necessary steps to rebuild our lives, to emerge from the ruins and go forth with courage and determination. We did not permit grief to lead to despair.

It is told that during the Three Weeks of mourning, from the Seventeenth of Tamuz to Tisha B'Av, Rav Naftali, zl, m'Ropshitz would repeatedly sing a tune to the words of the prayer, "And You will restore the Kohanim to their service, and the Levi'im to their chants, and Yisrael to its place of beauty." He did not allow himself to be overcome by grief; he did not permit despair to take hold of him.

The story is told about a talmid chacham who was once walking along the edge of a river when he heard a sudden cry for "help." He looked around and saw a man struggling to stay afloat in the water. Unable to swim, the scholar quickly obtained a rope and threw it to the man, saying, "Better grab the rope. If you do not succeed, give my best regards to the Livyasan,"

the legendary large fish at the bottom of the

People who observed this incident had a difficult time accepting the scholar's callous remarks. He explained that this was not gallows humor, but an attempt to ease the person's anxiety somewhat, so that he would be more capable of grasping the rope and saving his life. When one panics it becomes difficult to see the way out. Even in the most difficult times, one must find some source of cheer. some positive outlook, to prevent depression and despair from setting in - a situation from which it is difficult to extricate oneself.

### Out of the Darkness

"In the beginning... when the earth was astonishingly empty, with darkness (חשׁד) upon the surface of the deep... G-d said, 'Let there be light'... G-d saw... the light was good, and G-d separated between the light and the darkness (משׁד)" (Bereishis 1:1-4). Darkness is not merely the absence of light, but a specific creation, as it is stated (Yeshaya 45:7) "He Who forms the light and creates darkness." This is also indicated by the Sages' characterization that until light and darkness were separated from one another, they functioned in a "mixture," implying that patches of light and darkness were intermixed with one another (Artscroll Stone Chumash). Rashi adds that in the plain sense, G-d saw that the light was good, so He decreed that it should not be mingled with the darkness, but should function independently during the day, and the darkness by night (Bereishis 1:1:4).

Parshas Shelach tells the tragic story of the meraglim, twelve prestigious tribal leaders dispatched by Moshe Rabbeinu to spy out the Land. Their slanderous report against Eretz Canaan sparked a national hysteria, which resulted in a forty-year "death sentence" for the entire generation of men from the age of twenty and above. It was decreed that only His faithful servants, Calev ben Yefunah and Yehoshua bin Nun, the two meraglim whose faith and trust in Hashem never wavered, would enter the Land with the rest of klal Yisroel. Following a night of national mourning, the Torah states that there was an assemblage, the "Ma'afilim," who "awoke early in the morning and ascended toward the mountaintop saying, 'We are ready, and we shall ascend to the place of which Hashem has spoken, for we have sinned!' (Bamidbar 14:40). Moshe assured them that they would not succeed, and warned, "Do not ascend, for Hashem is not in your midst... and you will fall by the sword, because you have turned away from Hashem, and Hashem will not be with you" (ibid. 14:42-43). And, indeed. the Torah states, "The Amalakite and the Canaanite... descended; they struck them and pounded them until Charmah" (ibid. 14:45).

The Midrash (Bamidbar Rabbah 17) defines the Ma'afilim as "those who caused darkness," (עפלה related to עפלה/darkness). Rather than sanctifying the Almighty's Name, they desecrated it. When they were smitten by the enemies, the nations, unaware that Hashem was punishing them, believed that He was powerless against the enemy. Hence, the Ma'afilim caused a chillul Hashem. The Torah records the incident of the Ma'afilim as a lesson for us all. The "Ma'afilim" of each generation insist on following their own views, considering them superior to those voiced by Torah leaders. The Torah warns that disregard for Torah opinion creates a chillul Hashem, and the undertakings of the "Ma'afilim" are self-destructive (The Midrash Says).

Before the Ma'afilim embarked on their attempt to enter the Land, they declared "for we have sinned" (Bamidbar 14:40), which suggests that they were first attempting to do teshuvah. Though Hashem is always ready to forgive those who repent, this declaration was not sufficient to assuage His wrath, because the sin was still fresh. Moreover, the declaration was motivated not so much by sincere remorse as by regret that they had forfeited their chance to enter the Land (Ohr HaChaim). In his sefer, Michtav M'Eliyahu, Rav Dessler writes: "This is difficult to understand. All the ingredients of teshuvah seem to have been present. There was confession, remorse, and resolution for the future. Why was their teshuvah not accepted?"

Rav Dessler explains with a fundamental yesod: "To resolve these difficulties, we must understand a basic principle. There is a law in creation: 'A person is led along the way in which he wants to go.' It follows that a person has to create his tikkun on that very level which he chose for himself when he first transgressed. The gillui – the revelation of G-d's glory – must emerge from the depths of darkness which the sinner created. This was the purpose of creation; that the light should come out of darkness. Therefore, the temptation which caused his test in the first place - his bechirahpoint - must remain in place, and he has to overcome his temptation and all its consequences, fighting a long-term battle against the darkness which he created. This is the only way in which the purpose of creation can be fulfilled. Decrees cannot be cancelled; there can be no easy return to a person's state before the sin."

I find this to be a most powerful lesson. Teshuvah is not a point that one reaches – it is a lifelong process. The greater the investment, the greater the return. Rather than view the Torah as a system of reward and punishment, I prefer to see it as a system of cause and effectone of consequence. The Nesivos Shalom

teaches that Hashem "wove the mitzvos into the fabric of creation," and that just as the laws of gravity will force a rock to fall when thrown upward, so, too, do we experience the "natural consequences" for our every thought, deed, word, and action. When one performs a mitzvah or good deed, the natural consequence is a reward; if he transgresses, the consequence is in the form of a punishment. Either way, both should inspire a person and motivate them towards the path of teshuvah. Rav Dessler concludes: "We can now understand the accounts for the refusal to accept the teshuvah of the generation which had turned its back on the 'Land of Desire' (Tehillim 106:24). They had made their choice, and they and their children had to accept the consequences and fight their battles on the chosen level. They had to live in the desert for a generation until their desire for Eretz Yisroel was fully restored. Only then could they be allowed to resume the conquest of the land." Life is full of ups and downs - trials and tribulations - but our struggles are our paths to greatness. May we all be zoche to continue to fight the fight, as we strive to come out of the darkness and journey towards the holy light of Redemption. A gutten
