# Weekly Parsha



Parshas Mattos/Masei By Rabbi A. Leib Scheinbaum

# "A thousand from a tribe, a thousand from a tribe, for all the tribes of Yisrael you shall send a legion" (31:4)

The Midrash teaches that actually three thousand men represented each tribe: twelve thousand were soldiers who went into battle; twelve thousand took care of the armaments and weapons; and twelve thousand prayed for the soldiers.

Consequently, for each soldier that went to the battlefield, a counterpart prayed for his health, welfare and success. This is enigmatic. First, this was a *milchemes mitzvah*, a war that Hashem commanded them to wage. Their success was guaranteed by Hashem. Why was tefillah necessary? Second, if tefillah was that essential to their success, why did they need one person to pray for each soldier? Would it not have sufficed to have Moshe Rabbeinu and the people pray for everyone collectively? Last, it seems to be implied from the Midrash that the individuals who prayed also went out to the battlefield - or, at least, they did not simply pray at home. Why? Could they not have served their purpose by praying in the Beis HaMedrash at home?

Horav Yechezkel Levinstein, zl, explains that a great danger lurks for one who enters the battlefield. The idea of kochi v'otzem yadi asah li es ha'chayil hazeh, "My power and the strength of my hand made for me this great might" is a compelling force to overcome. The fear that the soldier might think that he has the strength - he has the ability to vanquish his adversary - is a real fear. To counter this impulse, for each soldier who went into battle another soldier stood near the battlefield, praying for him to emerge victorious. This image catalyzed two victories -- the soldier emerged unscathed, both physically and spiritually.

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# Life Is a Journey

Parshas Masei opens with an entire chapter detailing the forty-two encampments during the Bnei Yisroel's forty-year journey from Mitzraim to the Plains of Moav, opposite the Yarden, their final stop before entering the Land. Rashi, citing R' Moshe HaDarshan,

states that the Torah's list of these journeys emphasizes G-d's great compassion, because it shows, notwithstanding the decree that they wander in the *midbar* for forty years, that the people enjoyed extended periods of rest. Of the forty-two encampments, the first fourteen took place before the *meraglim* were dispatched by Moshe to spy out the land, and the last eight encampments were after the death of Aharon in the fortieth year. Thus, during the thirty-eight years in between, the Bnei Yisroel only encamped in twenty different places. The Ramban notes that the Torah stresses that G-d commanded Moshe, as the verse states, "Moshe wrote their goings forth according to their journeys at the bidding of Hashem..." (Bamidbar 33:2), to record these places to suggest that great secrets are contained in these forty-two journeys. Indeed, the Magen Avraham (428:8) cites Tzror HaMor that the forty-two journeys allude to the forty-two Letter Name of G-d, and krias haTorah should not be interrupted during the reading of these places (Artscroll Stone Chumash).

Rav Levi Yitzchak of Berditchev explains that the purpose of the forty-two encampments on the way to Eretz Yisroel was to extract the *nitzotzos*, the sparks of *kedushah* trapped in the *klippos*, the contaminated husks, in those locations; the *avodah* that the Jewish people performed in those places had the effect of releasing the sparks from their captivity. This is why some encampments lasted for a long time, while others were comparatively brief. It all depended on the depth of the entrapment and the difficulty of the extraction.

Rashi, citing Tanchuma, describes the journey with the following mashal: "This can be compared to a king whose son was ill, and he took him to a different place to cure him. Once they started back, his father began to count all the journeys. He said to his son, 'Here we slept. Here we felt cold. Here you had a headache, etc." At the end of the painful journey, the king recapitulated for his son all that he had gone through on the son's account, to remind the son of how much he loves him. Here, too, G-d recapitulates for Israel the events of the forty-year sojourn in the wilderness, to remind them of His love for them, and inspire them to reciprocate. "We slept" represents the times Israel was at peace. "We felt cold" represents the times Israel felt they were lacking something, "You had a headache" represents the times Israel was in danger (Tanchuma 3; Gur Aryeh).

The Baal Shem Tov teaches that every individual Jew experiences forty-two different stages of growth in his or her lifetime, corresponding to the forty-two stations in the *midbar*. We are now in the midst of *Bein Hametzarim*, the three-week period between the seventeenth of Tammuz and the ninth of Av, a mournful period of commemoration of the devastating calamities that occurred on

those two dates in Jewish history. I once learned in a shiur given by Rabbi Dovid Jaffee an absolutely amazing concept brought down in Avodas Yisroel, written by the Koznitzer Maggid, who explains that there is a parallel between Bein Hametzarim and the forty-two encampments described in our parsha. Parshas Masei always falls out during the "threeweeks" to teach us that this is a most propitious time for teshuvah and character refinement. Three weeks have twenty-one days and twenty-one nights; when combined it equals forty-two, corresponding to the forty-two stops in the wilderness. Thus, just as the Bnei Yisroel experienced forty-two different journeys in the midbar, each one bringing them closer to a more refined and purified state of being, so, too, are we given forty-two "opportunities" for reflection and self-improvement during this period of Bein Hametzarim. Each day and each night represent a different station in the midbar. With the proper mindset, we can use this period of time to work on improving ourselves each day and night, to prepare for the month of Elul, the ultimate time for teshuvah.

According to the Nesivos Shalom, the seforim hakedoshim observe that the forty-two journeys correspond to the forty-two words of אנא בכח. which has seven lines of six words each. These lines in turn correspond to the seven lower sefiros, each one considered in its combination with the other six. Toras Avos explained that the upshot of this observation is to expand our conception of our task and job in this world. We understand that we are obligated to meticulously heed all the expectations of halachah in performing all the mitzvos. Beyond that, however, waits another job description. Each of us comes into the world for the purpose of making some contribution to, some tikkun in, each of the middos through which Hashem relates to the world. The scope of this task is alluded to in the forty-two journeys. The Malbim, quoting the Abarbanel, states: "The Torah details these various encampments to serve as a portent of the future: that before the Final Redemption. the Jews will go into an exile that will be like an impossible journey through the wilderness where the Jewish people will be banished from mainstream society, forced to wander from place to place alone and unto themselves as though dwelling in a parched wasteland. Surely there is a hidden relationship whereby each travel of the Bnei Yisroel listed here maps a 'Wilderness' of exile, sojourning, and to all that transpired therein and throughout the long history of the Galus... Moshe was therefore commanded to record these specific travels as a remembrance for the future, for the End of Days, for these travels served as a testimony to all that would happen to the Jewish people at the End of Days."

Life is a journey! I recently heard in a shiur that Hashem is especially close during this

austere period of Bein Hametzarim. The Gemara (Megillah 29a) states: Rabbi Shimon bar Yochai says: "Come and see how beloved the Jewish people are before the Holy One, Blessed be He. As every place they were exiled, the Divine Presence went with them." In our deepest suffering, Hashem suffers along with us, and although we may feel a certain disconnect, Hashem is never sending us away; rather, He is sending us on a journey back home! And not only that, Hashem holds out "His hand" and comes back home with us, as the Gemara further states: So too, when, in the future, they will be redeemed, the Divine Presence will be with them, as it is stated: "Then the Lord your G-d will return with your captivity" (Devarim 30:3). It says: "He will return," which teaches that the holy One, Blessed be He, will return together with them from among the various exiles (Megillah 29a). May we all be zoche to continue to grow with each new stage of life along our arduous journey back home, and to use these three weeks to improve our ways and prepare for Elul, as we inch our way toward the Final Redemption and Yemei HaMoshiach. # From the Shem MiShmuel

The mystics note that the breakdown of six arei miklat and the forty-two Levitical cities are present in the Shema. The first line of the Shema, from Shema to echad contains six words. The rest of the paragraph from v'ahavta to u'visharecha contains forty-two words. The division of the Shema is not arbitrary, for the two sections reflect quite distinct concepts. The first line, containing six words, is the most basic declaration of a Jew's faith in G-d and

His perfect, total Unity. The remainder of the paragraph expresses our love for G-d and how the implications of that love manifest themselves in thought and deed. We may suggest that the six arei miklat and the fortytwo Levitical cities correspond, at least conceptually, to this breakdown of the content of the Shema.

#### Parsha Poem

How fortunate is the woman, Who having made a vow, can be released by husband or father.

How blessed is the man who has a wife or a daughter, who vows out of love for HaShem and His Torah.

How favored is the man whose wife. knowing better, advises him not to vow in the first place.

And a wise man is heedful of the binah, whispering softly to him from within a woman's eyes.

# From This Week's Daf

"A hurricane at sea threatened to drown [Titus]. He said: 'It seems to me that the power of the G-d of [the Jews] is only in water. When Paroah came against the Jews, He drowned him in the waters of the Reed Sea. When Sisera came against the Jews, He drowned him (i.e., his army) in the waters of Nachal Kishon. So now too, He threatens to **drown me in the waters** of the Mediterranean Sea. If He is truly powerful, let Him come up on dry land and wage war with me there!' A Heavenly voice emanated and said to [Titus]: 'O evil man, the son of an evil man, a descendant of the evil Esav. I have a puny creature in My world, and it is called a gnat. Go up on dry land and fight [this puny creature]!' When [Titus] ascended to dry land, a gnat came and entered his nose. It picked at his brain for seven years... It was taught in a Baraisa: R' Pinchas ben Aruva said: I was among the nobles of Rome. When [Titus] died, they split his head open, and they found a gnat inside it that was like a swallow weighing two selas. A Tanna taught in a Baraisa: The gnat was like a one-yearold pigeon weighing two litras. Abaye said: We hold a tradition that its mouth was of copper and its nails were of iron." (Gittin 56b)
