Weekly Parsha



Parshas Re'eh By Rabbi Oizer Alport

"You shall not do this to Hashem" (12:4)

After instructing the Jewish people to break and smash the idolatrous temples and pillars which they will find in the land of Israel, the Torah warns against doing the same to Hashem. Rashi questions why a Jew would consider destroying the Temple. He explains that the Torah means to prohibit copying the immoral actions of the non-Jews which will cause the Beis HaMikdash to be destroyed.

Rashi also quotes the Gemara in Shabbos (120b), which derives from our verse that although it is forbidden to erase Hashem's name, it is Biblically permissible to cause it to be erased in an indirect manner. How can our verse, which the Gemara understands as prohibiting only direct action and permitting indirect causality, also be interpreted as forbidding actions which will only indirectly bring about the Temple's destruction?

Rav Aharon Kotler answers that the Midrash (Shir HaShirim Rabbah 3:6) refers to the destruction of the Beis HaMikdash as the grinding of already ground flour. In other words, although our enemies carried out the actual destruction of the Temple's physical edifice, in reality, its spiritual beauty and splendor had already been removed due to the sinful paths that the Jews followed. Had this not been the case, the non-Jewish army would have had no power over the place where Hashem's Presence dwelled. When Rashi interprets the verse as an admonition against following non-Jewish practices and causing the destruction of the Beis HaMikdash, he is not referring to indirect causality, which is permitted according to the Gemara in Shabbos. Rather, just as the Gemara forbids directly erasing Hashem's name, Rashi is teaching us that our sins and immoral choices directly destroy Hashem's Temple.

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To Him Shall You Cleave

The commentary in the Artscroll Stone Chumash notes that throughout the entire Sefer Devarim, Moshe Rabbeinu is the speaker, and when he addressed klal Yisroel, he chose the

words and conveyed the commandments as he understood them. Indeed. Onkelos translates the term Mishneh Torah as פתשגו אוריתא. the copy of the Torah, meaning that it clarifies and explains the Torah. In this sense, Sefer Devarim began as the Oral Law conveyed by Moshe, and then, when G-d commanded him to inscribe his words in the Torah, it became part of the Written Torah. It is especially because of this that Moshe is called רבנו, our teacher, for he not only was the conduit through which Hashem's words were transmitted verbatim to klal Yisroel, he was also the teacher who explained those words (Beis HaLevi). Moshe Rabbeinu's warning, "The entire word that I command you, that shall you do; you shall not add to it... shall not subtract from it (Devarim 13:1) appears several times throughout Sefer Devarim, and serves as an eternal warning to every generation.

Parshas Re'eh continues: "If there should stand up... a prophet or a dreamer of a dream, and he will produce to you a sign or a wonder... do not hearken to the words of that prophet or to that dreamer of a dream, for Hashem, your G-d, is testing you... Hashem, your G-d, shall you follow and Him shall you fear; His commandments shall you observe... His voice shall you hearken; Him shall you serve and to Him shall you cleave (ובו תדבקוו). And that prophet and that dreamer of a dream will be put to death" (ibid. 13:2-6). I never considered the powerful message behind these words until I recently learned from a new sefer in Nesivos Shalom. Rashi states that "and to Him shall you cleave (ובו תדבקון)" teaches that we should cleave to His ways, to perform acts of kindness: bury the dead, visit the sick; just as the Holy One, Blessed is He, did. According to the Nesivos Shalom, these verses must be explained in light of what is taught in the holy Seforim that the purpose of the Torah and the commandments is the statement, "to Him shall you cleave," love of Hashem and attachment to Hashem. All 613 commandments are ideas and advice about how to fulfill this mitzvah. He writes: In Parshas Eikev there are two verses regarding דבקות, attachment to Hashem: "Hashem, your G-d, shall you fear, Him shall you serve, to Him shall you cleave" (ibid. 10:20), and later the verse states: "To love Hashem, your G-d, to walk in all His ways, and to cleave to Him" (ibid. 11-22). This sovran commandment is mentioned twice to teach that love and fear of Hashem are the foundations of Torah, and are most effective in achieving דבקות, attachment to Hashem.

The Ramchal writes; "Our Sages of Blessed memory have instructed us that man was created for [the sole purpose of] reveling in the eternal and delighting in the splendor of the Divine Presence [דבקות Hashem], this being the ultimate joy and the greatest of all pleasures in existence. And the true place for this pleasure is in the World-to-Come, which was

created with this purpose in mind" (Mesillas Yesharim Ch. 1). This is what is meant by Dovid HaMelech when he said: "And as for me, closeness to Hashem is my good" (Tehillim 73:28), and, "One thing I have asked of Hashem, that will I seek - that I may dwell in the House of Hashem all the days of my life" (ibid. 27:4). The Ramchal cautions: "The Holy One, Blessed be He, has placed man in circumstances where many factors can distance him from Hashem, these being the bodily desires" (Mesillas Yesharim Ch. 1). The Rambam adds "if one's blood boils from desire for sin, his blood becomes impure and he is distanced from Hashem." Thus, notes the Nesivos Shalom, according to this Rambam, it is possible for a Jew to constantly serve Hashem and not achieve anything if his blood remains impure. Every desire and every matter that goes against the will of Hashem distance a Jew from Him. However, Hashem gave us the Torah with 613 commandments, all of which bring holiness into a Jew and purify his blood, to enable man to connect to Him. The commandments to love Hashem and to fear Hashem especially enable דבקות, attachment to Him - the purpose of the entire Torah and commandments.

The Nesivos Shalom continues: "If there should stand up... a prophet or a dreamer of a dream": This refers to heresy from a false prophet who spreads impurity throughout the air in order to distance Jews from Hashem. In such a situation, when the entire environment is full of impurity, it is not sufficient to just fulfill the 613 commandments, including love and fear of Hashem. "Hashem, your G-d, shall you follow and Him shall you fear; His commandments shall you observe... His voice shall you hearken": One of the foundations of Torah is to "hear" [and hearken to] the voice of Hashem that emerges from every occurrence. The Gemara (Berachos 59a) teaches that thunder was created only to straighten out the "crookedness of the heart" [the fear upon hearing thunder causes people to repent]. For every event, one should hear from within it the voice of Hashem speaking to him. "Him shall you serve and to Him shall you cleave": When there is a false prophet contaminating the environment, we must straighten and renew all aspects of Divine service. We must renew our commitment to the roots and foundations of the Torah (Nesivos Shalom).

In today's world, we are faced with a culture that has no boundaries and no filters. A world of "progressive-political-correctness," where anything goes and everything is accepted as part of the "new norm." Like every generation that preceded us, we need to heed the words of Moshe Rabbeinu: "The entire word that I command you, that shall you do; you shall not add to it... shall not subtract from it." The Nesivos Shalom concludes: Hashem teaches us how to live our lives. In this parsha,

the holy Torah is teaching us about times like our generation, when a Jew goes out in the street and is surrounded by things that distance him from Hashem. Some of these matters are caused by man himself, due to, as the Ramchal states, his "bodily desires." However, some things are due to his surroundings, the atmosphere and the prevalent philosophy in the world. One must grab onto all the foundations of the Torah in the most exalted way and fulfill "to cleave to Him" by attaching oneself to Torah scholars. This is why Chassidim placed so much emphasis on attachment to the Rebbe and set this as their foundation. This is the antidote to the impure atmosphere of today's world, and this is the way to achieve דבקות, attachment to Hashem.

The sefer Degel Machaneh Efrayim relates that the Ba'al Shem Tov met the Mashiach and asked him, "When is the master coming to redeem the Jewish People?" Mashiach answered: "When your Torah is revealed and your wellsprings burst forth outward." This means that when the teachings of Chassidus spread throughout the world, then the redemption will come. I have been learning from a sefer in Chassidus called Meshivat Nefesh, a collection of writings from the works of Likutey Moharan and Likutey Halakhot. The concept of דבקות presented here focuses on one cleaving to a tzaddik by attaching oneself to the tzaddik to learn from him; by emulating him and walking in his ways. It is said that Mashiach will come in two "stages." First, Mashiach ben Yosef [the tzaddik] will come and pave the way to redemption. Mashiach ben Dovid [the baal-teshuva] will follow, and he will become the paladin to herald in the Final Redemption, for he walks in the footsteps of the tzaddik and stands in a place where the

tzaddik cannot stand. The Rebbe writes: "We need the righteous Mashiach to come and redeem us with eternal redemption. We need to build the Building of Holiness, the Perfect Structure, in a wondrous way that will never be destroyed. And we need to gather in all of the dispersed of Israel and bring them together once again in holiness - not one single spark or banished soul will remain outside, for G-d mercifully plans to prevent any soul from being left out (II Shmuel 14:14). So whatever acts of holiness any Jew does now, whether it is learning Torah or prayer or giving tzedaka or other mitzvos, it is all very precious in G-d's eyes. But He greatly needs the true tzaddik who is involved in rectifying all the souls and all the worlds, and the structure of holiness." May we all be zoche to reach our own exalted levels of as we swiftly approach the month of Elul and the Yomim Nora'im. A gutten Shabbos.
