- During the day, the shofar is blown as follows: the first set of thirty before Mussaf, one set during Shemoneh Esrei of Mussaf, one set during chazaras ha'shatz, and then the last ten during the final Kaddish.
- After Maariv, we greet each other with: "L'shanah tova tikasevu v'seichaseimu l'altar l'chayim tovim ul'shalom, basifran shel tzadikim gamurim."

Weekly Parsha



Rosh Hashanah By Rabbi Oizer Alport

"She made a vow and said, 'Hashem, master of Legions, if You take note of the suffering of Your maidservant, and You remember and do not forget Your maidservant, and give Your maidservant a male offspring, then I shall give him to Hashem all the days of his life'" (Shmuel I 1:11)

An American Rabbi once visited Rav Shlomo Zalman Auerbach shortly before Rosh Hashanah. Rav Shlomo Zalman asked him whether he had any congregants in difficult financial situations, to which the Rabbi sadly replied in the affirmative. Rav Shlomo Zalman then asked whether there were any wealthy members of the synagogue, to which the Rabbi again responded in the affirmative. Rav Shlomo Zalman continued, asking whether any of the down-on-their-luck congregants were as poor as the poorest beggars in Jerusalem or whether any of the rich congregants was a billionaire. The Rabbi, becoming confused, answered in the negative on both counts.

Rav Shlomo Zalman smiled and asked what would a member of the Forbes 500 think if he were seated on Rosh Hashanah next to the poorest of the vagabonds and overheard him praying to become so wealthy in the coming year that that on the following Rosh Hashanah, the billionaire would be working for him? The Rabbi, taking the bait, responded that a person making such ridiculous requests would be viewed as crazy. Rav Shlomo Zalman disagreed strongly. On any other day of the year, such a far-fetched request would indeed be considered inappropriate. On Rosh Hashanah, however, the entire universe is being re-created for the upcoming year, and with nothing set in stone, the sky is the limit for our prayers.

As proof, Rav Shlomo Zalman noted that the Midrash teaches that Chana was barren for 19 years prior to the birth of her son Shmuel. Although she surely beseeched Hashem daily to grant her a child, the Haftarah which we read on the first day of Rosh Hashanah teaches that on Rosh Hashanah she prayed for a special child: *zera anashim*. Although this literally refers to a male child, the Gemara (Berachos 31b) understands it as a plea for a child who would be considered equal to Moshe and Aharon combined.

This would be quite a tall order even for a woman with a large family who had no

difficulty conceiving, but for a woman who had suffered the anguish of being childless for almost 20 years, such a request seems absurd. Any other woman who had been barren for so long would be ecstatic just to conceive a healthy child. Why did Chana make such an unrealistic request? She understood that on Rosh Hashanah, the only barriers to what we may ask for are self-imposed ones. She asked for a son who would lead the generation and after two decades of suffering, she merited to give birth to the prophet Shmuel.

Rav Shlomo Zalman's message is relevant to each and every one of us. When we go to the synagogue on Rosh Hashanah, we are surely cognizant of the tremendous import of the day, and we pray appropriately on behalf of ourselves and our loved ones. We pray for years of health and happiness, of spiritual and material blessing, and of joy and success for our family and friends. However, the scope of our requests has always been limited to what we considered reasonable and appropriate for our circumstances. This year, let us remember the lesson of Chana regarding the phenomenal power of the day and that for one who appreciates it and prays accordingly, the sky is literally the limit.

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Don't Blow It!

The Mishnah states: "When the Yom Tov of Rosh Hashanah fell on the Shabbos, they would blow the shofar in the Temple, but not in the provinces. After the Second Temple was destroyed, Rabban Yochanan ben Zakkai instituted that they should blow the shofar wherever there is a Beis Din. R' Elazar said: Rabban Yochanan ben Zakkai instituted this practice only in Yavneh. They said to him: He instituted it both for Yavneh and for any other place in which there is a Beis Din" (Rosh Hashanah 4:1). In order to avoid the possibility of chillul Shabbos, Rabban Yochanan ben Zakkai required that the shofar be blown in the presence of a court, whose judges would warn the people not to carry the shofar in the street (Rambam, Hilchos Shofar 2:9). Rav notes that although R' Elazar mentions only Yavneh, the shofar may be blown before the Great Sanhedrin wherever it is located. R' Elazar's point is that specifically the Great Sanhedrin is required, and not a minor sanhedrin of twentythree judges [and certainly not a court of three judges]. The Gemara (Rosh Hashanah 29b) rules that when Rosh Hashanah falls out on Shabbos, the shofar is not blown because of the concern that someone may carry the shofar daled amos in a reshus harabim, a public thoroughfare, as it is stated: "Rava says: Under Biblical law, it is surely permitted to blow the shofar on the Shabbos, but it is the Rabbis who decreed against it, in accordance with a dictum of Rabbah, for Rabbah said: Everyone is obligated in the shofar blowing, but not everyone is proficient in shofar blowing. Therefore, the Rabbis decreed against blowing the shofar on the Shabbos, lest one take [a shofar] in his hand, and go to an expert to learn how to blow it, and inadvertently transport it four *amos* through a public domain, which is a violation of Biblical law."

Since the prohibition against shofar on Shabbos is a Rabbinic safeguard, it was not applied in the Temple, in keeping with the general rule that אין שבות במקדש, Rabbinic safeguards do not apply in the Temple (Rashi). Tosafos adds that there would seem to be another reason for the decree – namely, that one might inadvertently carry the shofar from a private domain to a public domain, which is also forbidden by Biblical law. However, the Gemara does not consider that concern significant enough to have triggered the decree. People are not likely to make the mistake of carrying from a private domain to a public domain, since the boundary between a private domain and a public one is usually demarcated (Rosh Hashanah 29b).

"In the seventh month, on the first of the month, there shall be a rest day, a remembrance with shofar blasts" (Vayikra 23:24). According to Rashi, remembrance alludes to the verses recited in conjunction with the shofar blasts, which call upon G-d to remember Israel for good. The shofar blasts recall the supreme loyalty of Avraham and Yitzchak at the Akeidah (Bereishis 22:1-19). The shofar – a ram's horn – symbolizes the ram that Avraham offered in place of Yitzchak. The Ramban explains that a remembrance before G-d is needed because Rosh Hashanah inaugurates the aseres yemai teshuvah, the tenday period of judgment and repentance between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur (Artscroll Stone Chumash). The Sfas Emes writes: "The Midrash (Yalkut Emor 645) relates that upon hearing the shofar, Hashem rises from the Throne of Justice and sits on the Throne of Mercy. On Shabbos, depicted by the Zohar as an עת רצון, a time of Divine goodwill, Hashem's mercies are evoked even without the shofar. By sounding the shofar, we remind Hashem of the inner purity of the Jewish soul. On Shabbos, however, a day in which the soul predominates over the body, this reminder is unnecessary; the mere verbalization of the shofar's theme through the verses of Malchiyos, Zichronos and Shofaros suffices. Just as tefillin are not donned on Shabbos since the Shabbos day itself is an אות, a sign of our relationship to Hashem as tefillin usually are. so too, the inherent spirituality of Shabbos obviates any need for the shofar" (5652).

The Gemara continues, and cites a Baraisa that describes exactly how Rabban Yochanan ben Zakkai's institution came into being: "It

once occurred that Rosh Hashanah fell on the Shabbos, after the [Great] Sanhedrin had been exiled to Yavneh, and the residents of all the surrounding towns gathered to hear the blowing of the shofar. Rabban Yochanan ben Zakkai said to the sons of Beseirah: Let us blow the shofar! They replied: Let us first consider whether it is proper to do so. [Rabban Yochanan ben Zakkai] said to them: Let us first blow, and afterwards we will consider whether this practice should continue in the future. After they had blown, [the sons of Beseirah] said to him: Let us now consider whether this practice should continue. He said to them: The shofar has already been heard on the Shabbos in Yavneh, and one should not refute the Beis Din after the deed has been done" (Rosh Hashanah 29b).

The Psalmist writes: "Because it is a decree for Israel, a judgment [day] for the G-d of Yaakov" (Tehillim 81:5). Rashi comments: "It is a decree for Israel" from the Holy One, Blessed is He, to blow the shofar on that day, and it is a day of judgment for the Holy One, Blessed is He. The verse does not mean that the blowing of the shofar is in some sense a judgment for G-d, rather, the subject here is Rosh Hashanah, not the blowing of the shofar. The Sfas Emes elaborates: "Whereas, the physical aspect of every Jew, the 913, the body, is constantly waging battle against the Evil Inclination, the yar, the soul containing the pure Divine sparks is never tainted by evil. Thus, our primary concern when sounding the shofar is to assist the body in its eternal struggle against evil. The body, known as Yaakov, because of its constant struggles with evil - in the same manner that Yaakov battled those symbols of evil, Lavan and Esav desperately needs the assistance of the shofar in its noble battle משפט לאלהי יעקב. (In fact,

the Zohar interprets the requirement of sounding the trumpet when waging battle against the foe within you – על צר הצרר אתכם - to refer to the shofar's effectiveness against the יצר הרע). However, the soul, depicted as ישראל, the name given to the Patriarch after he had triumphed over Esav, needs no such assistance. It remains pure as ever, unaffected by evil. The Divine spark remains permanently embedded in it. On Shabbos, the day when the soul and the ישראל component of every Jew prevails, the shofar is not required" (5662). It's Shabbos. It's Rosh Hashanah. Don't blow it! Wishing the entire kehillah a k'siva v'chasima tova - may we all be zoche to a happy, healthy and sweet new year with bracha and hatzlacha.
