Weekly Parsha



Parshas Shoftim By Rabbi A. Leib Scheinbaum

"You shall come to the Kohanim, the Levi'im, and to the judge who will be in those days... and they will tell you the word of judgment" (17:9)

We believe that the leaders of each and every generation are specifically suited for that generation. Therefore, we do not second-guess our gedolim, Torah leadership. They are Hashem's choice, and to impugn the integrity of their leadership is to question Hashem's decision. The leader of each individual generation is the last word in Torah ruling. We do not compare him to the leaders of earlier generations. He is our leader - not the leader of a previous generation.

Horav Shimshon Pincus, zt'l, relates an amazing story that occurred concerning the Vilna Gaon which underscores this idea. We must remember that the Gaon was not only the greatest luminary of his generation, but he exceeded the scholarly and spiritual plateau of many leaders before him. Nonetheless, even the great Gaon deferred to the contemporary leadership of his time.

The story is told that one Erev Shabbos, the tailor whose house abutted the home of the Gaon, had a certain shailah, halachic question, concerning a chicken. In those days, every chicken was personally checked for any traifos, invalidations which would render it nonkosher. Today, with quality control, very few issues arise, and when they do, they are immediately addressed. The tailor was a G-dfearing man, so he immediately dispatched his son to the Gaon's home with the question concerning the chicken. The Gaon poskined that the chicken was indeed treif.

Meanwhile, unbeknownst to the tailor, his wife had sent someone to the Rav of Vilna, Horav Shmuel ben R' Avigdor, who ruled that the chicken was, in fact, kosher. They now had a problem: two rabbanim had ruled on the chicken - one kosher, one not kosher. This was a serious halachic dilemma.

The Ray represented the rabbinic leadership of the city of Vilna. Officially, he had the final word. The Gaon was the undisputed gadol hador, the preeminent Torah leader of the generation. Would a "tug of war" ensue? When the Rav heard that the Gaon had ruled against him, he immediately proceeded to the Gaon's home. The Rav explained that, while there was no doubt that the Gaon was many times his superior in Torah knowledge, nonetheless, if his word were not to be respected and heeded, he would lose his standing in the community, and his halachic rulings would be rendered deficient. The only choice available was for both of them to go together to the tailor's house and both eat from the chicken. The Gaon agreed. The Gaon, who personally held the chicken to be nonkosher, was prepared to eat from it because he understood that the viability of a Torah ruling was at risk. Therefore, to uphold the Torah, he was prepared to eat a piece of chicken that he held was treif. However, when the two rabbanim arrived at the tailor's home, the oil lamp on the table had fallen, spilling some of the non-kosher fat used as fuel on the chicken, thus rendering it unquestionably treif. The Gaon did what he had to do and Hashem did what He wanted to do.

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Guarding the Gates

In his commentary on Parshas Shoftim, the Sforno states that most of the parsha deals with commandments directed to the leaders of the nation because, as role models, their conduct has a powerful influence on the rest of the people, for good or for bad (Artscroll Stone Chumash). The parsha begins with, "Judges משפטים) and officers (שפטים) shall you appoint in all your cities... and they shall judge the people with righteous judgment" (Devarim 16:18). Rashi identifies שפטים as "judges" who pass judgment, and שטרים as "officers" who impose authority over the people, following the order of the judges: with stick and with strap until one accepts upon himself the verdict of the judge. Having stated that the officers are not the judges themselves, Rashi explains that Moshe mentions them in this pasuk, which deals with the appointment of judges, because they act as the agents of the judges (Tanchuma 2). In the days of the Bais HaMikdash, the Great Sanhedrin served as the שפטים; in addition, any province with less than 120 residents had a Bais Din consisting of three משפטים, and one with 120 or more had a "small Sanhedrin" consisting of twenty-three שפטים.

Reb Shlomo Goldberger once related a childhood memory of his holy grandfather, Rabbi Daniel Goldberger, whom the family would often visit in Denver for Parshas Shoftim. Each year Rabbi [Daniel] Goldberger would teach in the name of the Shelah HaKodesh that this pasuk relates to each and every Jew on a personal level as well; that each individual must appoint "שטרים and שפטים in all his gates." As brought down by the Shem MiShmuel, Chazal mention that a person's five senses are his five "gates," through which all information from the outside world enters his

realm of awareness. In particular, the eyes, ears and mouth are the "gates" that lead directly into a person's soul, and one should be extremely careful to guard these gates.

"הא" - See, I present before you... a blessing and a curse" (Devarim 11:26). The eyes are often referred to as "the windows of the soul," and in his sefer with that very title, Rabbi Zvi Miller writes, "Today, the forces of tumah, impurity, are using the same devious tactic that Bilaam employed. We face an onslaught of immodest clothing and behavior in the streets, at work, in every public place, and even in our own homes. We are bombarded by images so destructive that many of our great rabbis have proclaimed that we are now surrounded by the worst level of tumah in history." Hardly a day goes by where I do not find myself having to avert my eyes to avoid seeing something that I should not. Even in his time, Rabbi Yisrael Salanter dedicated much of his mussar writings to the subject of shimaras einavim, to help a Jew guard his eyes, as it says in the Shema: "...and remember all the commandments of Hashem and perform them; and not explore after your heart and after your eyes after which you stray." Rabbi Zvi Miller adds, "Control of our eyes is not just an inner battle between desire and restraint. We master ourselves countless times during the day and therefore, in Hashem's Eyes, we have the highest status we become holy!"

"שמע" Hear O Israel: Hashem our G-d... is One" (Devarim 6:4). Just as one must protect himself from what his eyes see, so too, must one be equally cautious to protect his ears from what others say. The Chofetz Chaim notes that one who listens to loshon hora is as guilty as the one who speaks it. Contrary to the Torah. the popular adage "Sticks and stones will break my bones, but words will never hurt me" is something by which we do not hold. In fact, the opposite is true! People feel as though it is their [constitutional] right to express themselves in any way they see fit; to say anything, anytime, to anyone, with absolutely no regard for the effect that it may have on others. Although profanity and inappropriate speech have become a regular part of the language and the culture (as well as sanctioned "hate speech"), they remain antithetical to Torah values, and one should try to avoid listening to such things at all costs. Protecting one's ears from improper speech is essential to spiritual growth and stability.

The Chovos HaLevavos says that "the mouth is the quill of the heart," suggesting that the mouth expresses the contents of the heart. Dovid HaMelech writes, "Which man desires life, who lives days to see good? Guard your tongue from evil" (Tehillim 34:13). The Overview in Sefer Chofetz Chaim states: "Loshon hora is a weapon manufactured solely from words, yet the Torah considers the harm those words create to be massive. So sharp a

wedge does loshon hora drive between a Jew and Hashem that it even deprives him of Divine assistance in a time of need. And the sheer number of Torah directives relating to speech has no direct parallel in any other function." The importance of guarding one's mouth from loshon hora and other forms of inappropriate or forbidden speech cannot be overstated.

So, the Torah commands us to appoint and שטרים not only as leaders for the nation to judge and enforce the laws of the Torah, but also for the individual Jew to judge himself and his own behavior. It is imperative for us to assign "guards" to protect the "gates" to our neshamah from the evils of the outside world in which we live. We must all take heed, and be careful as to what comes in through our eyes and ears, and what comes out of our mouths, to help us grow spiritually and better connect to Hashem. Elul is here. We must prepare ourselves for our journey toward teshuvah and redemption by appointing שפטים and שטרים in all our "gates." A gutten Shabbos.

From the Sfas Emes

The month of Elul is called עת רצון, a time of Divine goodwill, a "month in which time itself is altered and becomes capable of receiving Hashem's bounty from the world above the bounds of time." The holy Sfas Emes explains that Elul and its status as עת רצוו can be traced back to the first Elul that Israel experienced as a nation in the Midbar. After the sin of the Golden Calf, the people were restored to Hashem's good graces on Rosh Chodesh Elul, when Moshe ascended Har Sinai to receive the Second Tablets. The Sfas Emes

establishes a connection between the first Elul. the Second Tablets, and the annual process of teshuvah which occurs every year at this time. He writes: "To understand how the Second Tablets signaled Hashem's acceptance of our teshuvah, let us remember that the forty-day period Moshe spent on Har Sinai to receive them is observed annually by Jews throughout the world as a month of introspection and repentance- Elul. The first forty-day period, in contrast, is not commemorated. Surely this is impressive testimony to the higher status of returning penitents vis-à-vis a nation of as-yet untested tzaddikim receiving the Torah for the first time, as it is stated in the Gemara (Berachos 34b): In the place where the baalei teshuvah stand, even the completely righteous are unable to stand" (Elul 5643)

"And from where do we know that money is a valid method of kiddushin? - it is derived through the gezeirah shavah of 'kichah' (taking) to 'kichah' (taking) from the field of Efron: It is written here, in reference to kiddushin: When a man shall 'take' a wife. And it is written there, in reference to Avraham's purchase of Efron's field: I have given the money of the field - 'take' it from me. And this term 'taking' is referred to as 'acquisition,' for indeed, we find that Scripture calls the purchase of Efron's field an act of 'acquisition,' as it is written: The field which Avraham acquired. Hence, [the Mishnah] - which lists 'money' as a method of kiddushin - taught: a woman is acquired." (Kiddushin 2a)
