# AFTER NOT GUILTY VERDICT, HAMAN FOUND LIABLE FOR MISTREATMENT OF MORDECHAI AND ESTHER PURIM SATURDAY EVENING, MARCH 22ND, SUNDAY MARCH 23RD THREE READINGS OF MEGILLAH

Kehilath Jeshurun will once again be the site of a spectacular Purim celebration for people of all ages. We particularly honor our children with special gifts for this holiday.

# THE MAIN READING

The main reading of the Megillah will be in the Main Synagogue beginning with Mincha services at 6:00 PM. There will be a shiur after Mincha. Ma'ariv will begin at 7:00 PM followed by the reading of the Megillah. Shabbat concludes that evening at 6:46 PM and we are anxious to give people who are not in walking distance to the Synagogue a chance to "grab a cab" and get here in time for the Megillah reading which will begin at 7:15 PM.

All children should arrive between 6:50 and 7:10 and will then be brought to the Main Synagogue by our youth leaders and seated in

specially reserved sections at the front of the Synagogue where they can enjoy the Megillah reading and stamp out Haman's name with the graggers they will be given that evening. Children from Nursery through Grade 6 should gather in the Etra Chapel on the lobby level. Our Youth Department staff, under the direction of Chaim Zakheim, will help to enhance their enjoyment of this great festival.

Parents are asked to join the regular service in the Main Synagogue until the conclusion at which time they may pick up their children from the Chapel.

# NO PIZZA PARTY

Due to the difficulty of arranging a Purim Pizza Party following the Megillah reading on Saturday evening, we will not hold that celebration this year. We put this

information here because we know many people have become accustomed to it on Purim night and we want you to know that it will not be on this year's schedule.

# SECOND EVENING READING

Also beginning with a Ma'ariv service at 7:00 PM, a second simultaneous Megillah reading will follow and take place in the Social Hall on the Lobby level. Last year a full house attended this service which will be led by our assistant rabbi, Rabbi Mark Wildes. BYOG (Bring Your Own Gragger) is the

word for this service. We are proud to note that one of the fine young men in the Congregation and a student at Ramaz, Ariel Edelstein, who reads meaningfully and beautifully will *lein* the Megillah at this service. Those who wish to avail themselves of this service are invited to do so.

# **BEGINNER'S MEGILLAH READING**

The KJ Beginner's Program will conduct its own special reading of the Megillah with explanations provided throughout. It will take place in the Main Synagogue on Saturday evening, March 22nd, at 8:30 PM. Ariel Edelstein will again read the Megillah in its entirety, and we believe those attending will be awed by the beautiful way in which this young teenager of the Congregation will read.

The Beginner's reading will be

followed by a special Purim party for them which will include live music, traditional holiday foods, and an opportunity to meet new people.

Admission to the party is \$7.00 in advance provided a reservation is made AND PAID FOR by Wednesday March 19th. Otherwise, the entrance fee is \$10.00 at the door for the party. There is, of course, no charge for the Beginner's Megillah Reading.

# SUNDAY MORNING ALL OF US SHOULD BE THERE

Another gala Purim service will be held on Sunday morning for all men, women and children beginning at 9:00 in the Main Synagogue. Shacharit services and the reading of the Megillah will again be conducted by students of the Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein Upper School of Ramaz.

Children should come with their

parents directly to the Main Synagogue. The Megillah reading itself that morning should begin at approximately 9:30.

During the reading of the Megillah we will invite the children to a special section of the Synagogue and ask them to bring their graggers from the night before.

We have the advantage of Purim Day being on a Sunday this year, the time when most people can make the time to come and fulfill the Mitzvah of hearing the Megillah for the second time in the morning. We strongly urge you to do so.

The Congregation will then be invited for hamantaschen, juice, milk and coffee in the auditorium.

# 9TH ANNUAL PURIM SEUDAH SUNDAY, MARCH 23 - 4:00 PM

Our exciting Purim weekend both Saturday evening and with events all day Sunday including a distribution of 850 Mishloach Manot baskets and a children's carnival will be capped by the 9th annual KJ Purim Seudah for men, women and children beginning in the auditorium at 4:00 PM. The program has been a 'sellout' in every one of the first eight years and we therefore urge you to get your reservations in early.

The Purim Seudah or dinner is one of the Mitzvot of the festival. The program and festive meal promise to be one of the exciting highlights of our Synagogue year. It will include music and entertainment.

The performance of a Purim shpiel under the direction of Dr. Charles Cohen along with Music Director Elliot Weiss will star the KJ Players in a spoof entitled "A Rare Rabbi Roast/The Rabbi Can Now Ride the Subway for Half Fare and Get Into Movies Cheap."

The Seudah is again chaired by Men's Club co-President, Howard Katz, and co-chaired by Yvonne Koppel-Kopans and Andrew Charles.

# KJ TO BEGIN 125TH ANNIVERSARY YEAR WITH DEDICATION OF NEW TORAH AT ANNUAL MEETING

SUNDAY, APRIL 6, AT 10:00 AM

Among the oldest and yet most vibrant congregations in the United States, Kehilath Jeshurun has played a leadership role in the American Jewish Community over the last one and quarter centuries since its founding in 1872. With pride, we will celebrate both our longevity and our achievements during a year of special events and publications, beginning with the 125th Annual Meeting on Sunday morning, April 6. The meeting will be held in the Main Synagogue.

The highlight of the program that day will be the *Hachnasat Sefer Torah* ceremony, at which time we will bring

the Torah from Park Avenue and 85th Street down the block to a celebration of singing and into the Main Synagogue, where it will ultimately take its place in our sacred Ark. With musical support from the students at Ramaz under the direction of Caroll Goldberg, the day will have an air of festivity and, simultaneously, an air of holiness in the Congregation. The new Torah's cover has been created to conform with the style of the other Torahs in our Ark. This has been prepared under the leadership of former Sisterhood President, Rae Gurewitsch.

The program of the Annual

Meeting will also include the induction of new families and brief eulogies of members who died since the last Annual meeting in 1996.

Following the formal part of the meeting, there will be a brunch collation for all in attendance. It should be a glorious day and one to which we hope both long time and older members, as well as new and younger members will want to come and in which they will want to participate, as we begin another 125 years.

# BENJAMIN AND ESTHER GOTTESMAN CENTER FOR RAMAZ AND KJ TO BE CONSTRUCTED ON THE YORK PREP SITE NEW MIDDLE SCHOOL WILL HELP RAMAZ EXPAND TO MEET THE NEEDS OF THE COMMUNITY

We are proud to announce that the Ramaz School joined by its sponsoring Congregation, Kehilath Jeshurun, will construct a new middle School on the south side of 85th Street on the site currently occupied by York Prep. The present occupants will move to a beautiful and more spacious building on the West Side.

The new structure which is scheduled to begin operation in 1999 will be known as the Benjamin and Esther Gottesman Center. The dedication of that Center in memory of the late Benjamin Gottesman and in honor of his wife, tibadeil l'chaim — Esther Gottesman — was made possible by a project making gift from his children, Ruth and David S. Gottesman, David Gottesman is the Chairman of the Board of Yeshiva University, He grew up in our Congregation since early childhood and has watched with great pride how the Congregation and Ramaz have served this community over the past sixty years.

The new building will have seven

stories above ground and three below ground level. It will provide facilities also for the Congregation through the use of its Chapel, large auditorium, gymnasium and other rooms. Its primary purpose will be, of course, to house a new Ramaz Middle School for grades 5, 6, 7 and 8. The removal of two grades from our current 85th Street site and two grades from our East 78th Street site will enable both buildings to open up opportunities for additional students, while, at the same time, enabling Ramaz to reduce class size.

It is anticipated that Ramaz will be able to accommodate two Nursery A and two Nursery B classes along with three classes of twenty-two children each from Kindergarten through grade 8, instead of the current program of two classes on a grade level, each with twenty-six or more students. At the same time, Ramaz will be able to open its doors to more High School students, so that the school will retain its balance in the High School, between children from the local

Manhattan community and those from the wider metropolitan New York Jewish community.

The entire program is estimated to cost approximately \$25 million, of which close to \$15 million in cash and in Pledges have been raised already. There will be many naming opportunities in the new facilities as well as in our current facilities. We invite those who are interested in supporting this extraordinary project to contact Rabbi Lookstein in order to discuss this further.

Twenty years ago this community built a High School which radically affected the stability and quality of Jewish life in Manhattan. We anticipate that the new Middle School and all of the possibilities it creates for the Lower School and High School will do the same for the next generation. We congratulate Ramaz on embarking on this challenging project and we invite the Congregation to participate in making this communal dream a blessed reality.

# PRESENCE OF YACHAD MEMBERS **DEEPLY MOVES KJ MEMBERS**

Was it their enthusiasm, or was it their innocence? Was it their singing or their Divrei Torah? Perhaps it was their optimism, their outlook on life.

Over the Shabbat of February 7th and 8th, members of Kehilath Jeshurun and students of Ramaz enjoyed a special opportunity to be together for our annual Shabbaton with members of YACHAD, an organization sponsored by the Orthodox Union and NCSY for developmentally disabled young people. They davened with the Congregation Friday evening and both Shabbat morning and afternoon. One of their members delivered a D'var Torah from the pulpit Shabbat morning and two more did so at Seudah Shlishit after Mincha. Their words were clear. their thoughts expressive, their presentation creative, all with a great touch of warmth and humor.

While we hope we provided a good opportunity for them to observe Shabbat together, there is no doubt that what they provided for us was a real Kiddush Hashem. The singing at Seudah Shlishit was actually inspiring. We are grateful to the families of Kehilath Jeshurun who hosted members of YACHAD and their counselor/advisors by providing home hospitality. And we are grateful to our Trustee and Ramaz Student Activities Director Kenneth Rochlin for coordinating this program for our community. We look forward to welcoming them back next year.

# SENATOR LIEBERMAN OFFERS INSPIRING ADDRESS TO 1000 SHABBAT WORSHIPPERS

Can an Orthodox Jew succeed in the hallways and chambers of Capitol Hill? "You bet," said Senator Joseph Lieberman, Democrat of Connecticut in addressing a packed Main Synagogue Shabbat morning, February 8. He and his family davened with the Congregation Friday evening and Shabbat morning and drew upon the Torah portion of the week, Mishpatim, concerning his role as the first and only Orthodox Jewish member of the United States Senate. The Honorable Robert Abrams, former Attorney General of the State of New York, and a Trustee of Kehilath Jeshurun, who is a close personal friend of the Senator's introduced Lieberman to the Congregation. The Senator's visit was conceived by the KJ Political Affairs Committee as one of the first great events of our 125th Anniversary year.

A graduate of both Yale college and Yale Law School, the theme of the Senator's message was that we have the ability to be full fledged members of the United States society and be observant Jews at the same time. We are able to adhere to those values and ethics that Judaism teaches us. The Senator stressed that the synthesis of an observant Jewish life with public service is not only possible but is something every Jew should strive to achieve. Lieberman indicated that his adherence to a religious value system help people place trust in him, enabling him to be effective in government and, he remarked, has helped him achieve success in elections. "People trust people who believe in something."

Rabbi Lookstein concluded the presentation by quoting Maimonides' explanation of what a true sanctification of God, a Kiddush Hashem really is. The Rabbi stated that Senator Lieberman personifies a Kiddush Hashem by living his life for the sake of God's name and serves as an outstanding role model to all people. It was, he continued, a privilege to host the first "Shomer Mitzvot" Senator in our community for Shabbat. Senator Lieberman is a source of pride for the entire Jewish people and is an example of what can be achieved without sacrificing one's heritage or values. (Continued on next column on Page 5)

# NEW TORAH COMPLETED FOR SYNAGOGUE USE

Children of the fourth, fifth and sixth grades of Ramaz, their parents and siblings, participated in Sunday morning davening on February 9th followed by the completion of the last letters of a new *Sefer Torah* which will be kept in the ark of Kehilath Jeshurun and used regularly at Shabbat and Yom Tov services here. The Torah, commissioned by the Jesselson family, was used for the first time the following Shabbat when the Bar Mitzvah boy, Samuel Jesselson, read from it.

The children and their families participated in a Mitzvah that most Jews do not get to do in a lifetime. Each family was called up one by one in alphabetical order and stood by the sofer, Rabbi Lasdun. The letters in this Torah are sharp and clear allowing one to read from it with ease. A great air of excitment permeated the Main Synagogue fulfilling the Mitzvah of "Kitvu Lachem et Hashira Hazot." "Write for yourself the Torah." Each child in those grades received a t-shirt marking the day with that pasuk on it as well as the words "I wrote a Torah at KJ."

The ceremony was followed by a delicious brunch for all the families in the auditorium.

The Torah will be formally dedicated at the annual meeting on Sunday morning, April 6.


# **BNAI MITZVAH**




