DR. TAMAR ROSS NEXT 125TH ANNIVERSARY SCHOLAR FEBRUARY 14, 1998

Dr. Tamar Ross, senior lecturer in the Department of Philosophy at Bar Ilan University will be our next Shabbat scholar on Saturday, February 14. She will speak at both Shabbat morning services and at a Men's Club sponsored Seudah Shlishit that afternoon.

Dr. Ross will address the subject: "THE ROLE OF DOUBT IN RELIGIOUS BELIEF."

Traditional Jewish thinking is often in monolithic and finite terms. But, does a person of faith always know better than the person who doubts? A close look at some of the passages of the writings of Harav Kook will reveal an approach which is much more modest and even tentative in its claim of being the truth. The writings may even allow a positive function questioning any skepticism in the development of one's religious belief.

Seudah Shlishit

Following Mincha at 5:00 PM, Dr. Ross will

present the same topic from a different perspective. In this session, we will study a few passages from the writings of Rav Kook in order to see how he viewed some of the challenges of modern secularism and how he saw them as potential religious values. He suggested that they may spur us to a higher and refined level of faith in God. Dr. Ross will evaluate for us how Ray Kook came to such conclusions.

DR. TAMAR ROSS

Professor Ross was born in the United States and made Aliyah to Israel when she was 16. She received her Ph.D. from Hebrew University. In addition to her role as lecturer in University's Bar Ilan Philosophy Department, she also teaches at Midreshet Lindenbaum in Jerusalem. She is published widely in scholarly journals both in Israel and abroad.

RAMAZ DINNER HONORS RABBI LOOKSTEIN

A MESSAGE TO THE COMMUNITY FROM RABBI LOOKSTEIN

The Sixty-First Annual Dinner Dance of Ramaz on Sunday evening, January 11, 1998, was an unbelievable experience for me. The warmth and appreciation which I felt from the entire community was beyond description. The presence in the Marriott Hotel of 1,700 guests, including hundreds of members of the congregation, some of whom have no direct connection to Ramaz, was deeply gratifying to me, to Audrey and to our entire family.

The remarkable presentations that evening were in such good taste and had a light touch to them making the evening even more special. Of course, the performance of the Ramaz Chorus and Dance Troupe was breathtaking and glorious.

The very moving Tribute Book and Journal were filled with so many nice messages. All of this made the evening a once-in-a-lifetime experience and it was worth waiting forty years to enjoy it.

I consider the evening to be a great tribute to this community and I tried to say it in my response to the gathering. I hope you will be interested in reading that response which is printed below.

RESPONSE AT THE RAMAZ DINNER IN HONOR OF RABBI HASKEL LOOKSTEIN

January 11, 1998 By Haskel Lookstein

I understand tonight a little better the way my daughter, Debbie, felt as she sat on her bed 23 years ago on the eve of her Bat Mitzvah, surrounded by gifts and sobbing uncontrollably, saying: "I don't deserve these; why are people sending me so many presents?"

It is a well-known principle of psychology that you don't heap praise directly on a child, because the child, knowing the real truth, feels very conflicted and usually goes into the next room and knocks over a valuable vase just to show that he/she isn't really that good.

Since I'm basically a kid

at heart, I was looking for a vase on Friday night as I leafed through the journal and tribute book. But instead, I found a *pasuk* that made me feel a little easier.

V'amarta bil'vavekha — lest you think in your heart; kochi v'otzem yadi asa li et ha-chayil ha-zeh - my strength and my talent have accomplished all of this; v'zakharta et h S E-lohekha — you must remember the Lord, your God: ki hu ha-notain l'kha ko'ach la'asot chavil — for it is He who gives you strength to accomplish; l'ma'an hakim et brito asher nishba la-avotekha...

and thus He will fulfill His covenant with your forefathers...

Tonight is evidence of God's work in the past and present.

FIRST THE PAST

The RaMaZ, z'l — my great-grandfather, Rabbi Moses Z. Margolies, without whom there would be no name *and* no pattern for Ramaz.

My father, z'l — who conceived, established and developed the school. We are just trying to continue to build, consistent with his philosophy.

My mother, z'l — whom I promised five months ago as she lay in Mt. Sinai Hospital following surgical

repair of her broken hip: "Mother, we will dance together at the Ramaz Dinner." She retorted: "In a wheelchair?" I said: "No, we'll dance slowly."

Alas, it wasn't meant to be. I missed a call that I know she would have made morning: "Haskel, don't forget to mention so and so." I know she would included Lillian Jacobs and, of course, my sister, Nathalie Friedman - "Don't forget her," she would have said. Neither Nathalie nor I could dress fully for tonight or be the center of the dancing. But you all should dance and rejoice. That's what she would very much have

AND NOW TO THE PRESENT

Many of you understand that the tribute to me tonight is shared fully by my wife, Audrey. Very little of what I have been involved in during the past forty years would have been possible without the unconditional love, the abundant warmth. the wise guidance, the consistent support and the wonderful home she provided for me, for our children and grandchildren — who, thank God, are all here in New York today for the Ramaz/KJ community and for the wider Jewish world. I am so grateful to my mother-inlaw, Esther Katz, for giving birth to Audrey, and to my father-in-law, Morris Katz, z'l, who encouraged Audrey in so many things, including to go out with me. We were friends and she didn't want to lose me as a friend. But he said: "Go once." So she did and I got the best wife anyone could hope for. And, speaking of the responsibilities of a wife, my father, z'l, loved to tell the following story.

A certain man was guest of honor at a gala, charitable dinner. He was feted with the usual excessive encomiums and laudatory remarks. Upon coming home that night, he was removing his bowtie in front of the mirror and, while looking in the mirror. he remarked to his wife: "Dear, how many truly great people do you think there are in this world?" Whereupon his wife responded: "One less than you think."

This incredible dinner didn't happen because of me. It is the brainchild and production ofsome unbelievably talented, hardworking people. The Chairpersons: Ruth Kestenbaum, Luxenberg, Ike Rhonda Herschkopf, and David Sable. The Chairs of the Subcommittee: Rita Distenfeld, Jane Gol. Susan Castle, Carol Gross, Sherry Fessel, and Sue Talansky.

The most creative group of people who put together the Tribute Book: Meryl and this year as every year — but even more; I would say more about him but he limited my time to ten minutes — Dr. Noam Shudofsky — the Two Million Dollar Man!

Finally, if you read the tribute book and the journal, you will see clearly that this whole enterprise is attributable to a confluence of three extraordinary groups.

1. My colleagues at Ramaz and KJ — members of the administration, the

Ladies and Gentlemen: Fifty-six years ago today, December 7, 1941, the Japanese bombed Pearl Harbor. It was, as President Roosevelt described it, a day that would live in infamy.

Seven weeks later, on January 25, 1942, the leaders of Nazi Germany met at the Wansee Conference and formulated a plan that they hoped would lead to the annihilation of all of world Jewry. In fact, by the end of the war, barely three years later, 6.000,000 Jews had been murdered.

Today, December 7, 1997, we are part of a resounding response to those terrifying times. We are breaking ground for another educational facility that will build on a dream envisaged sixty years ago; a dream that began across the street in rented quarters with a class of six students whom I was one: dream that today incorporates two buildings —the Lower School housed in Congregation Kehilath Jeshurun's Synagogue House, and the Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein Upper School in the Morris and Ida Newman Educational Center on East 78th Street; a dream that encompasses today 1,001

students from all over Metropolitan New York studying Torah, absorbing best of western civilization, living a life of Torah and Mitzvot. menschlichkeit and an unconditional love of the entire people of Israel and the State of Israel; a dream that assures that, in the words of Emil Fackenheim, will not grant to Hitler — ימח שמו וזכרו posthumous victory;

do. Our Middle School is, therefore, symbolic of a philosophy of education and life that embraces the golden mean of Aristotle and Maimonides as a prescription for the modern Jew.

Our ceremony today is, finally, an expression of thanks to a few people without whom we would never have broken ground. First, the founder and principal of Ramaz, my father, Rabbi Joseph H.

a dream that is the best assurance that Judaism and the Jewish people will not only survive, but thrive.

Our ceremony today conveys another message. We are breaking ground for Middle School. Middleness for Ramaz is more than a designation of grades 5 through 8. Ramaz itself is passionately middle — as in "middle of the road." We firmly believe in Centrist Orthodoxy. We are committed to Torah with tolerance; fervent religious practice with respect for those who are not quite as fervent as we, but who also strive for the good of the Jewish people and his Commandments and with an openness toward those who do not believe as we

Lookstein, of blessed memory, who dared to dream this dream and whose uncanny abilities made it a reality.

Second, to a highly dedicated group of lay people and professionals who have planned for every facet of this building and who will continue to supervise the construction of the building and plan for the educational program that will function within its walls.

Third, to an extraordinarily generous group of supporters who have committed thus far \$22,700,000 to ensure the successful completion of this project. Foremost among them are David S. Gottesman and his wife Ruth Gottesman who encouraged us from the

beginning to undertake this task and who made the first commitment as an act of support for the Ramaz pattern of Jewish education as a means to honor their sainted parents: Benjamin and Esther Gottesman, of blessed memory.

Sandy and Ruth: Last Monday would have been the 100th birthday of Benjamin Gottesman. What a wonderful gift you have bestowed on him, on your immortal mother and on the Ramaz/KJ community, to possible make the continued growth and enhancement of the Ramaz School and to house our Middle School in the Benjamin Esther and Gottesman Center.

For you and for all of us, I pray in the words of King Solomon when he dedicated the Temple in Jerusalem:

יהי ה' א־לוהינו עמנו כאשר היה עם אבותינו אל יעזבנו ואל יטשנו

"May the Lord our God be with us as He was with our parents. May he never abandon us and never forsake us."

May I call upon the Chairman of the Building Committee, Steven R. Gross, to present to Sandy and Ruth Gottesman a specially inscribed shovel with which to symbolize our breaking ground for this center.

And now, in gratitude and prayer to God for having brought us to this day, we sound the *Shofar* which one day will herald the redemption of mankind. !תקיעה, שברים, תרועה, תקיעה, שברים, תרועה, תקיעה

AM HASEFER BOOK DISCUSSION CLUB To Discuss JEWISH POWER

Author J. J. Goldberg To Be Present

Jewish Power: Inside the American Jewish Establish-ment by J. J. Goldberg will be the topic of the next Am Hasefer Book Discussion Club meeting on Sunday evening, February 22, at 8:00 PM. It will be held at the home of Jennifer and Jeff Roth, 156 East 79th Street. Jeff Roth will moderate the discussion and we are pleased to note that the author will be present.

Each election season, United States presidential candidates spend millions of dollars trying to woo the Jewish vote. In fact, since 1972, nearly every major presidential campaign has set up a separate Jewish organization, with its own staff and budget, to stump among Jewish Americans and appeal for their votes. Presidents and Prime Ministers from dozens of nations regularly pay visits to the New York headquarters of key Jewish agencies such as the American Jewish Committee and the Anti-Defamation League. At least two dozen foreign embassies in Washington have diplomats assigned part time to an informal "Jewish Desk" to maintain ties with the Jewish lobby. Why all this effort and attention for a statistically meaningless 2.5% of the American population? In JEWISH POWER, J. J. Goldberg addresses this question along with a host of intriguing, often controversial issues, surrounding the American Jewish community. Goldberg offers an insider's look at the workings of Jewish power politics in contemporary America.
