KI Rabbis Take The Lead

Rabbi Moses Sebulun Margolies (the "Ramaz"), President of the Agudat Harabanim and Rabbi of Congregation Kehillath Jeshurun in New York City, and Rabbi Dr. Philip Klein, Rabbi of the first Hungarian Congregation Oheb Zedek in New York, had also received telegrams from Eastern Europe and Palestine requesting aid. These calls for help, coupled with news reports of the desperate situation in the countries at war, moved the Union of Orthodox Congregations to action. At a conference of the Union of Orthodox held on September 28, 1914, a decision was made to send telegrams to all Orthodox congregations in the United States, asking each to conduct an appeal for relief contributions on Yom Kippur Eve.

KJ TO HOST SHABBAT ACROSS AMERICA Friday Evening, March 20

In synagogues across the United States, 65,000 North American Jews will gather on Friday evening, March 20, in an effort to revitalize Shabbat observance. Kehilath Jeshurun will be one of those sites.

Organized the by National Jewish Outreach Program, which directed by Rabbi Ephraim Buchwald, who will be our 125th Anniversary Shabbat Scholar the next morning, "SHABBAT ACROSS AMERICA" will open the doors of hundreds of synagogues to practicing and nonpracticing Jews so they may join together to experience and rejoice in a traditional Shabbat service and festive meal.

"We cannot accept the common perception that American Jewry is an endangered species," commented Rabbi Buchwald. "It is true that the vast majority ofJews this country have never experienced a traditional Shabbat and do not feel a connection to the Judaism their grandparents practiced only half a century ago. This should not be! SHABBAT ACROSS AMERICA is exciting way reintroducing friends and family members to a practice that has been with, and unified our people for over 5,000 years, and which we hope will be with us for at least 5,000 more."

PASSOVER RELIEF: WE NEED YOUR GIFT NOW

The first order of priorities in preparing for Passover is Maot Chitim, Passover Relief. It is our way of saying that our personal joy on the festival is incomplete if we do not share what we have with others who are less fortunate.

Who gives Passover Relief? According to the Shulchan Aruch (The Code of Jewish Law), there are only two types of people as far as Passover Relief is concerned: donors and recipients. If you are not a recipient you must be a donor.

The Kehilath Jeshurun Passover Relief appeal serves first and foremost this communal *mitzvah*. Last year the readers of the

Bulletin contributed more than \$45,000. It was a most gratifying response to a call for charitable funds. But, we do need even more this year.

A large part of our funds go to the Joint Passover Appeal, which last year helped 27,000 individuals and 13,445 families, many of whom were sick and elderly.

There are additional causes which are helped generously by our appeal. They include among others:

- Gifts to needy individuals in our community.
- The New York Board of Rabbis Passover Fund for Jewish patients in hospitals and inmates in prisons.
- Many organizations and institutions who seek our help and depend on our

assistance in this season and throughout the year.

Due to the current economic climate in our city, the needs are greater and the number of people contributing may be fewer. Some donors of last year may be recipients this year. We need your extra effort.

SOCIAL ACTION COMMITTEE CELEBRATES TENTH ANNIVERSARY

The Social Action Committee and Sisterhood are working together to introduce a new program called KJ Call Connect. The purpose of this is to bring our members who cannot participate as actively as they would like, closer to the community.

A member will, on a weeklv basis call congregant they have been matched with to wish a Shabbat Shalom, or say "Hello, how are you?" We need information from the community about those who may enjoy such a call including those who are elderly, homebound, or Alice Smokler ill. Call in the synagogue office 427-1000 with suggestions.

Established in 1988, the KJ Social Action Committee is completing its tenth year of service to the community. Through its Simcha Sharing Fund, approximately \$25,000 has been distributed to a variety of organizations serving the Jewish poor, amongst The Metropolitan them Coordinating Council on Jewish Poverty, Dorot, The Educational Alliance, The Jewish Board of Family and Children's Services, and Children's Ohel Home. Twice each year, at Pesach and Rosh Hashanah, we have been able to disburse funds to worthy organization, thanks to donations from congregants who have had a Simcha (wedding, bar/ bat mitzvah, engagement, birthday, brit, etc.). In November 1989 the Board of Trustees approved the establishment of a Simcha Sharing Fund so that we could, in the spirit of tzedakah, reach fellow Jews who are hungry and homeless.

Our Pesach and Yom Kippur food drives help to stock the pantry at Project Our Ezra. volunteers participate with DOROT in distributing holiday food packages and sharing friendly visits with elderly Jews on Manhattan's Upper West Side. Our annual Thanksgiving Clothing Drive has been successful each year in collecting a ton of clothing annually for distribution throughout the Metropolitan area. The Mitzvah Tov Project is supported by KJ children 1 to 12 years of age, who donate a brand new toy from birthday gifts received. Every two months toys are distributed and the children who donate them receive a mitzvah certificate in thanks for their participation.

In the past two years we participated with the Jewish Board of Family and Children's Services Telephone Language Companion Program reaching out to 16 Russian immigrants in need of English language conversation support.

In the Book of Exodus, we are told how God "passed over" the houses of the Children of Israel, sparing them the tenth plague, which was visited upon the oldest son in each Egyptian family. To be "passed over" was truly a miracle for the Jewish people.

Today we are presented with a different set of unsettling circumstances. So many of our Jewish elderly living right here in Manhattan are being passed over, but by no means in a miraculous way. They are in

need of food, especially during Passover, and rely solely on donations from people like us. Remember, many of these people are like our own *Bubbies and Zeydes* and need a loving, caring family. Many of them will ask: "How will I eat during Passover? The food is so expensive!"

The answer remains with us. Let us not "pass over" those who need us.

DOROT PASSOVER PACKAGE DELIVERY

As Passover approaches, many of us are looking forward to celebrating the holidays with family and friends. DOROT knows many older people who will be spending this holiday alone.

DOROT's Annual Passover Package delivery will take place on Sunday, April 5, between 10:00 AM and 1:00 PM, out of DOROT headquarters, 171 West 85th Street, near Amsterdam Avenue.

Volunteers are needed to deliver hundreds of packages and to visit with our older friends on Manhattan's Upper West Side. While our older friends enjoy the packages they receive, it is the time spent by the volunteer which brings feelings of warmth and caring into their homes.

The KJ Social Action Committee has participated in this program for a decade and we encourage members of the congregation to call Social Action Committee Chairperson, Doris Travis at 755-5376 to volunteer or to call DOROT directly at 769-2850.

JEWISH YOUTH CONNECTION AT KJ PLANNING FOR THIRD YEAR

The Jewish Youth Connection at KJ opened its classroom doors in September 1996. That year there were only four students. This year the enrollment has increased to 22 students. The JYC is for children who are not day school students but share in a growing interest in Judaism on the part of their families. JYC seeks to teach students who are fresh and ready to learn. Classes are held on Sunday mornings.

There are several goals to the curriculum, including learning Hebrew and becoming comfortable with the *Siddur*. Hebrew is taught one on one with a Big Brother/Big Sister. By the time a child graduates he/she will know the 400 most common Hebrew words in the prayer book and will thereby understand most Hebrew prayers in their original form.

The faculty of JYC is made up of teachers who have at least a Bachelor's Degree in Jewish studies. All of the Big Brother and Big Sisters are graduates of a Jewish high school and are enthusiastic and experienced working with youth.

The school offers the whole family a Jewish learning experience. There are organized family programs built around the theme of Succot, Shabbat, Chanukah, Purim, and Passover which are fun

informative for everyone attending. The school begins with students in the third grade of secular school. The first is vear introduction to the laws and customs of Jewish holidays. They are introduced to the biblical narrators in the books of Bereishit and Shemot (Genesis and Exodus) and develop a familiarity with important biblical personalities and events.

The Big Brother/

Big Sister tutoring program allows for the discussion of significant Jewish issues such as belief, Jewish prayer, and observance.

In response to parental urging, a JYC Juniors program was started beginning with a combined first and second grade class that focuses on the Torah portion of the week, Jewish ritual, Jewish art projects, and Hebrew reading readiness. JYC

with the two classes will expand by one class per year for each of the next four years.

Members of the congregation who know students who not receiving the benefit of a Ramaz or similar day school education and whose family interest in Judaism is developing wish might recommend students to the JYC program 794by calling 1JYC(1952).
