THE MAIN READING

The main reading of the Megillah will be in the Main Synagogue beginning with Mincha services at 5:40 PM.

Teenagers of the congregation who are students in the Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein Upper School of Ramaz will lead the Maariv service and read the Megillah.

Children from nursery age through grade 6 should arrive between 5:40 and 5:55 PM and should meet in the Etra Chapel on the lobby level. Members of our youth department staff under the direction of our youth

director, Ari Segal, will be in charge of the children that evening.

The children will be escorted to special sections reserved for them in the front of the Main Synagogue. They will, of course, be provided with Purim *grogers* and candy bags to enhance their enjoyment of this great festival.

Parents are asked to join the regular services in the Main Synagogue until the conclusion, at which time they may pick up their children from the chapel and proceed with them to the Purim Pizza Party and Chagiga in the second floor Auditorium.

AM HASEFER TO DISCUSS . . .

THE LOST MUSEUM: THE NAZI CONSPIRACY TO STEAL THE WORLD'S GREATEST WORKS OF ART SUNDAY, MARCH 14, 8:00 PM NEW PARTICIPANTS

The Am Hasefer book Discussion Club will review Hector Feliciano's recent book, *The Lost Museum*, at its next meeting on Sunday evening, March 14 at 8:00 PM. The book is available at Judaica Classic's by Doina in the first floor lobby. It will take place at the home of Jeffry and Jennifer Roth and will be moderated by Jennifer, a former Couple's Club Co-President and now Vice President of Fine Arts at Sotheby's.

In this startling book, Hector Feliciano reveals the story of the systematic pillaging of Jewish-owned artwork during World War II. Between 1939 and 1944, the Nazi occupation of France enabled Germany to confiscate rare works of Jewish-owned art from collectors and gallery owners. More than 20,000 pieces were sent to Germany, many bearing the mark "Property of Third Reich." Some were destined for a museum of European art that Hitler planned to create in Austria; others entered the private collection of top Nazi dignitaries, or were sold into France and Switzerland's flourishing wartime art market.

The Lost Museum focuses on the private collections of five families: Bernheim-Rothschild, Rosenberg, Jeune, David-Weill, and Schloss. The fate of these works is traced as they pass through the hands of top German officials, unscrupulous art dealers, and unwitting auction houses such as Christie's and Sotheby's. Hector Feliciano paints a vivid picture of a concealed international art trade with links in France, Germany, Switzerland, Great Britain, the former Soviet Union, and the United States — disclosures that have provoked an ongoing debate in

THREE KJ BARAK PLAYERS NAMED TO ISRAEL NATIONAL TEAM

Three stars of KJ Barak, our teen ice hockey team, were named to the Junior National Ice Hockey Team of Israel. Team Israel visited KJ on January 8-10 during a tour of New York and Canada jointly sponsored by the New York Jewish Community Relations Council, Maccabi USA and KJ. The Israeli players and coaches stayed with KJ families, attending our synagogue on Shabbat, and training with KJ Barak throughout the following week.

The three players, who have all been members of KJ's youth hockey team for five years, are each 16-yearold juniors at Ramaz and the sons of KJ members. They are defensemen Eliezer Magid and Jaime Widder and forward Eric Kluger.

The 17 member Team Israel contingent is coached by Boris Mindel, a former member of the Red Army team which dominated world hockey in the 1970's,a nd Simon Jacubovitch, former coach of the Soviet Wings. It includes a number of players from the Israel youth team that skated with and against members of the KJ hockey program during the 1997 Maccabiah.

Ben Epstein, coach of KJ Barak, announced that the three KJ players on Team Israel took part in a series of games in New York and Montreal during the second week in January.

A YOUNG 'KJ'ER IN PRINT

We are thrilled to see an article by Jonathan Greenbaum, son of Wendy and Sholem Greenbaum, in *Sha'alei Hilulim*, a compendium of essays on Jewish law written by the students of Yeshivat Sha'alvim. Jonathan's article is on euthanasia. He also has an article in the same journal, in Hebrew, authored together with a

fellow classmate from Ramaz, Ronald Sabban, on the subject of three-year *chazaka*, according to the view of Rebbe Yishma'el.

By the way, the volume is excellently written and contains a number of very interesting essays in addition to the two pieces by Jonathan.

DAVID DEBORA LEADS SHABBAT SERVICES AT MOUNT SINAI

If there is anyone in need of a place in the neighborhood where both hospitalized patients and their families can attend regular Shabbat services, they can feel free to go to the chapel at Mount Sinai Hospital. David Debora, a Ramaz alumnus, conducts Shacharit and Mincha services at Mount Sinai, where patients and family members can come to both daven and have *mishebeirachs* said for sick people in the hospital. David has been helping out with Shabbat services and other programs at Mount Sinai for several years, first as a substitute and assistant to Rabbi Spirn, who has recently retired and now is an assistant to Rabbi Olberstein, the new Chaplain.

The services offer both patients and relatives a more familiar normalized environment, and are conducted at the regular times of 9:00 AM for Shacharit and within half an hour of the time that Mincha is scheduled to start. David has been proud that the services provide a place for people in the hospital to get together with fellow patients instead of having to spend their Shabbatim alone and out contact with others.
