HIGH HOLY DAY MESSAGE "SEARCHING?"

The front-page of the Living Section of *The Herald* (in South Florida) of Friday, August 13, was dominated by a picture of a twenty-year-old Jewish woman sitting in meditative fashion. She looks like a Buddhist (she actually tried Hinduism after Christianity) but she is now captivated by the Kabbalah, as a member of one of 39 sites world-wide of the Kabbalah Centre. She is exploring Jewish mysticism because no religion so far has answered her burning question: "Who is God?"

Liza Solomon's search is doomed to failure because she is asking the wrong question. Even Moses, whose relationship with God was as close as humanly possible, could not know who or what God is. "I will be what I will be," God answered. "Show me thy glory," Moses demanded. God responded: "You will see my back (i.e., the results of my action), but my face cannot be seen." You will know that I am powerful. kind. compassionate, long-suffering, and abounding in chesed ... but you cannot know my essence.

The real question that should occupy us is not who is God, but who are we? That is the question of the High Holy Days. How have we justified our lives on this earth this year? How have we fulfilled our obligations as wives and husbands, mothers and fathers, daughters and sons, as friends, as Jews? Have we sanctified God's name through our lives? Have we made someone else's life better and happier because of our actions?

Who is God is an interesting speculation. Who am *I* is *the* critical question. The answer to that question will determine whether the coming year will be a *shana tovah* — a *good* year — or not. May we spend the High Holy Day season pondering that question and formulating an answer rooted in Torah and *mitzvot*.

The rabbis, officials, and officers of the congregation join me in wishing us all a *ketiva va'chatima tova* — a year of health, happiness and blessing.

Mark Green

Long time political activist Mark Green has accepted the invitation to speak at this year's Men's Club Sukkah Supper on Thursday evening, September 30, at 7:00 PM. (Mincha will precede the supper at 6:30 PM in the chapel.)

Green holds the position of Public Advocate which replaced the position of City Council President in 1994. The Public Advocate is nextin-line to the Mayor should he for any reason step out of office. He successfully sued the United States Commerce Department for the list of American companies going along with the Arab boycott of Israel. He helped to organize the Kosher Coalition to keep Kosher for Passover prices equal to the rest of the year. Green is also responsible for encouraging Yankee Stadium and Shea Stadium to open up kosher food stands for the benefit of observant fans.

Having had Major Giuliani and a substitute for City Controller Alan Hevesi in the past couple of years, we are particularly pleased to welcome Mark Green to Kehilath Jeshurun and look forward to his presence with us on September 30.

SHABBAT SHUVA DISCOURSE "FENCES BETWEEN THE SEXES"

This past summer a mother of a fourteen-year-old girl from our community visited a modern Orthodox camp to see her daughter star in the camp's production of a Broadway musical. As she watched the show she realized that there were three girls sharing the same part. The reason was that when they sang a song there would be no "violation" of *kol isha* (hearing a woman's voice).

This is but one example of a tendency in some religious circles to take a very strict view on issues relating to sexual contact – or fantasy – between men and women. Hearing a woman's singing voice; seeing a married woman's hair uncovered; separate seating at weddings, at funerals and at other public occasions

are all part of an effort to erect *halakhic* fences between the sexes.

Many of these practices are relatively new in America; some were not even the custom in Eastern Europe seventy-five years ago. What should be our response to these changes? What are the new rules based on? Are they grounded in authoritative sources or are they simply part of the religious movement to the right?

Rabbi Haskel Lookstein will discuss these issues from an *halakhic* and sociological perspective at the Shabbat Shuva Discourse on Shabbat afternoon, September 18, after Mincha at 6:00 PM. We urge the community to attend what promises to be a very important analysis and statement.

RABBI HERSHEL SCHACHTER TO DELIVER TESHUVA DRASHA AT KJ THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 16, 8:00 PM

This year, the annual KJ Teshuva Drasha will be given by Rabbi Herschel Schachter. Rabbi Schachter is a Rosh Yeshiva at the Isaac Elchanan Theological Seminary, and the Rosh Kollel of the Marcos and Adina Katz Kollel, both of Yeshiva University. Rabbi Schachter is no stranger to KJ, as he has been for many years, and continues to be a lecturer in our Adult Institute.

The concept of a Teshuva Drasha is

not unique to KJ. Jewish communities throughout the world have adopted this lecture as a further means of inspiring their members to greater heights of spirituality and repentance at this critical time of the year. We are fortunate to have Rabbi Schachter, a person who embodies scholarship, spirituality and sensitivity, as the one to whom we will look for inspiration. We know it will be an invaluable experience for all those in attendance.






CHATAN TORAH Richard E. Kobrin

Richard E. Kobrin will be called to the Torah on Simchat Torah to complete a cycle of Torah reading. Richard has been part of the KJ/Ramaz family for as long as he can remember. Despite deep roots on the West Side, he was raised in the epicenter of the community by his parents, the late Hortense and Irving Kobrin, who became actively involved with a budding Ramaz in the late 1930's and signed up their three sons for a Ramaz education. He graduated from Columbia College and attended the New York University Real Estate Institute. He served as an officer for over thirty years in the Jewish Campus Life Fund, the organization that supports the Jewish chaplaincy at Columbia University.

Career-wise, he began in real estate in the office of the late Jack D. Weiler and has served for the past 27 years as Executive Vice-President of Eugene M. Grant Co., the realty concern which bears the name of the well-known philanthropist and supporter of Israel. He is also active in the Real Estate division campaign of UJA-Federation, State of Israel Bonds and ORT.

We are very pleased to welcome Joshua Cypess to Kehilath Jeshurun and we look forward to his having a meaningful tenure with us.



THE MIKVEH ON THE EVE OF YOM KIPPUR

Every year on the eve of Yom Kippur, there is a custom for men to immerse in the mikveh in preparation for this holy day.

One does not have to be a holy person to participate in this activity. On the contrary, for those of us who are just trying to be observant Jews, it is an added inspiration and preparation for a great day of introspection.

Our practice at KJ is that we observe this custom as a group before the morning service. All MEN are invited to assemble at the mikveh, 234 West 78th Street (East of Broadway) at 7:15 AM on Sunday, September 19. Everyone will have the opportunity to immerse and then we will return to KJ for Shacharit services.
