"YOSL RAKOVER TALKS TO GOD"

AUTHOR ZVI KOLITZ TO BE PRESENT

As the German tanks destroyed the Warsaw Ghetto, one of the few remaining fighters, Yosl Rakover, writes out his last words to God, seals the text in a glass bottle, and thrusts it into the rubble before preparing to die.

The text surfaces in Europe in the 1950's, is passed from hand to hand, is broadcast on Radio Berlin – where it is acclaimed by Thomas Mann as a religious masterpiece and then translated into many languages.


What is hailed by many as the most important testament to the Holocaust, is, in fact, fiction, a short story! It was written in 1948 for a Yiddish newspaper by Zvi Kolitz in Buenos Aires, where Kolitz had gone to raise

money for the Jewish underground in its struggle to establish the State of Israel.

PROFESSOR ZVI ZOHAR TO BE SAMUEL S. SILVERSTEIN SHABBAT SCHOLAR PRESENTATION TO BEGIN WITH FRIDAY EVENING DINNER FEBRUARY 2-3, 2001

Professor Zvi Zohar will serve as our Shabbat Scholar at the annual Samuel S. Silverstein Shabbaton to be held this year on February 2-3, 2001. The presentations will begin following Shabbat dinner on Friday night.

FRIDAY NIGHT DINNER "THE SHAS PARTY'S IMPACT ON ISRAEL'S POLITICAL SCENE."

Israel's political landscape has, over the past decade, been dramatically changed by the strength of the ultra Orthodox Sephardi party known as SHAS. The party currently holds 17 seats in the Knesset, just behind Likud. Dr. Zohar will examine the role SHAS has in Israeli society and its impact on the political landscape of the nation. He will evaluate its view of the peace process and examine the true perspective of the party's membership.

SHABBAT MORNING

"THE HALACHIC OUTLOOK OF SHAS' SPIRITUAL FOUNDER, RABBI OVADIA YOSEF"

Zohar's Professor presentation will be from the pulpit at Shabbat morning services. At that time, he will examine the Halachic Philosophy and Outlook of Rabbi Ovadiah Yosef. SHAS was the dark horse party in the 1984 Israeli elections. Rabbi Yosef gave the party its spiritual leadership and much to its own surprise won four seats in the Knesset that year. From the beginning then, the party called for Torah observance and pride in Middle Eastern Jewish roots which struck a cord with many of Israel's seemingly disenfranchised citizens, namely Jews who had arrived from countries such as Morocco, Iraq, and Yemen.

SEUDAH SHLISHIT

"HOW DOES JEWISH LAW DEAL WITH PUBLIC DESECRATORS OF SHABBAT?

Professor Zohar's final presentation will be at a Seudah Shlishit sponsored by the Kehilath Jeshurun Men's Club following Mincha at 4:50 PM. He will discuss the ways in which halachic tradition has dealt with public desecrators of Shabbat, with special focus on the responses of *Poskim* to modern situations in which now, for the first time in halachic history, most Jews seem to fall into the category of being non-observant of Shabbat.

SHABBAT DINNER

The several Friday evening dinners held throughout the year have become a very popular part of the synagogue calendar. It is a time to share in the tradition of the Sabbath, including the joyful singing of Shabbat Zmirot. Frequently we have been oversubscribed and unfortunately many people who wish to join us could not be accommodated. We, therefore, urge you to make reservations immediately, so that you may share in the spirit of the evening. The cost for adults is \$25 and children are \$15. Nonmember adults cost \$30 and nonmember children cost \$20. A check in the full amount must accompany your reservation.

PROFESSOR ZVI ZOHAR

Dr. Zvi Zohar, Professor of Sephardic studies at Bar Ilan University, is one of Israel's most astute observers of the social and political scene.

A fellow at the Shalom Hartman

Institute, where he heads the Center for the Study of Halacha, Professor Zohar has made Sephardic religious tradition a major focus of his numerous books and essays. It is interesting to note that Dr. Zohar argues that Shas is not a true

reflection of the best that Sephardic tradition has to offer.

CHANUKAH BEGINS THURSDAY EVENING, DECEMBER 21

While the practice of gift giving has become an integral part of the Festival of Lights, the lights themselves are the principal observance of the holiday and should be highlighted as the central feature of Chanukah in the home.

The following are a few items which should be kept in mind:

1. The Menorah.

While one Menorah suffices for the household, it is customary — and desirable — for each member of the household to light his or her own Menorah. This is particularly recommended for the children of the family who will take special delight in kindling their own Chanukah lights.

2. The Time for Lighting.

The candle or oil lights should be lit as soon as possible after nightfall (30 minutes after sunset). They should be allowed to burn for at least 30 minutes.

On Friday afternoon, the flames are lit before the Sabbath candles and they should be large enough so that they will remain lit for about an hour and a half. Special Friday evening long candles for Chanukah are available in the Judaica shop in the synagogue lobby. On Saturday night at home, the candles are lit after Havdalah.

3. Arranging the Candles.

The candles or flames are set from the right side of the Menorah as the candle lighter faces it. One flame is lit the first night, in addition to the Shamash. Each night an additional flame is lit.

4. Lighting the Flames.

The candles or oil flames are lit from left to right — starting with the newest candle first. We begin by lighting the "Shamash." Then the blessings are recited — three on the first night and two on the other seven nights. After the blessings are recited, we light the flames by the light of the "Shamash."

The reason for using the "Shamash" is in order to avoid any practical use of the Chanukah flames. These lights are holy and their sole purpose is the ritual one — to proclaim the miracle of Chanukah.

5. Concluding Songs.

Following the lighting of the candles, we sing "Ha-Nerot HaLalu," which explains the reasons for the ceremony, and Maoz Tzur, a ballad which describes in several stanzas how Divine Providence has intervened at various points in history to save us from our enemies.

CHANUKAH CANDLES

Through the courtesy of the Kehilath Jeshurun Benevolent Fund, Chanukah candles have been sent to every recipient of the KJ Bulletin.

The proceeds of this Fund are used for deserving individuals who might not otherwise come to the attention of public charity.



NEW BET DIN OF AMERICA FLOURISHING

We are proud to note that the relatively new Bet Din of America, of which Rabbi Haskel Lookstein serves as Vice President, is increasing its impact and influence in the American Jewish community. Its preeminent role over the last three years has been its increasingly proactive success in dealing with agunah and potential agunah situations. Considerable funds are spent in mediating and negotiating with spouses, sometimes literally sitting on the doorstep of a recalcitrant spouse, until a divorce according to halacha (Jewish law), can be accomplished. The Bet Din has established an Agunah Fund to cover these costs and seeks gifts earmarked for this vital program.

The Bet Din considers its active stance an important public service and part of its responsibility to the community, regardless of whether the parties agree to or are capable of providing compensation. This activity has produced *Gittin* or freed *Agunot* in scores of cases, completely in accord with halacha.

Rabbinic leaders and community lay leaders regularly consult the Bet Din for guidance with respect to difficult communal and halachic issues. Many representatives from major newspapers and television networks have turned to the Bet Din for official statements regarding the Jewish law perspective towards a variety of subjects including marriage annulments and homosexual unions. They were recently consulted by the writers and legal department of the television program Law and Order concerning its portrayal of a Bet Din in a recent episode. The Bet Din was also recently represented at a Bar Association symposium on matrimonial cases.

During the past year, the Bet Din handled approximately 300 *Get* cases and resolved more than 15 *Agunah* situations. It also negotiated financial disputes between parties in a number of matrimonial cases and also dealt with custody and visitation issues in several cases.
