A HIGH HOLY DAY MESSAGE

Our message to you for the High Holy Day season is encapsulated in the story of Uzi Mordechai, a resident of Katzrin in the Golan Heights. Uzi is a bus driver in the Golan. Following the terrorist bombing of a school bus near Kfar Darom, which inflicted lifelong wounds and disabilities on the Cohen children last November, he assembled his fellow drivers and told them "we have to go down there and relieve the bus drivers there who risk their lives day after day on those dangerous roads in the Gaza Strip. This is the imperative of the court! We cannot leave them alone. We know this kind of work and we can carry out our responsibilities."

The result was that he and his fellow drivers established a program in which they relieved bus drivers in the Gaza Strip area for one week at a time, during which those drivers would come up and spend a restful and recreational week in the Golan while shifts of Golan drivers, headed by Uzi, took their place.

As we think about our responsibilities for the New Year, it seems to us that our primary responsibility from a communal point of view is to strengthen the hands of our brohers and sisters in Israel. We can do this by calling them regularly

and inquiring as to how they are doing. We can do this by sending funds where they are needed. Most of all, however, we can do this by traveling to Israel. We cannot provide Israelis with a vacation here in America during which they might chill out from the tension that is part of everyday life in Israel. We can, however, go there ourselves and demonstrate by our presence that we are their family and we care about them.

During the past year, KJ has led the congregational world in carrying out two large missions to Israel. We expect to do the same this year starting with our encouraging our membership to join the EDAH Mission and Conference in Israel during Sukkot. Reservations can be made by contacting EDAH directly at (212) 244-7501. We urge all of our members to go to Israel whenever they can and to join us on the missions that, please God, we will put together during the year.

This is the responsibility of the hour for all of us. We hope that our demonstration of solidarity with the citizens of Israel will be another way in which to pray to God for peace, safety and security for them and for all of us in the year ahead.

MEN AND THE MIKVEH ON THE EVE OF YOM KIPPUR

Every year on the eve of Yom Kippur, there is a custom for men to immerse in the mikveh in preparation for this holy day.

One does not have to be a holy person to participate in this activity. On the contrary, for those of us who are just trying to be observant Jews, it is an added inspiration and preparation for a great day of introspection.

Our practice at KJ is that we observe this custom as a group before the morning service. All MEN are invited to assemble at the mikveh, 234 West 78th Street (East of Broadway) at 6:30 AM on Wednesday, September 26. Everyone will have the opportunity to immerse and then we will return to KJ for Shacharit services.

RABBI HASKEL LOOKSTEIN RE-ISSUES LEARNING TAPE FOR WEEKDAY PRAYERS AND PREPARES A NEW TAPE FOR SELICHOT

We are happy to announce that Rabbi Haskel Lookstein's learning tape for the *nusach* for weekday prayers has now been re-issued by Chadish Media and is available to the congregation and to the Ramaz family through the congregation's office. The tape is sold in stores for \$12.00. KJ will make it available to you for \$10.00.

The tape is an excellent opportunity for people of all ages to learn how to daven before the Amud with the correct *nusach* and phraseology. Many people have learned from it and speak very highly of its value as a learning tool. It should be particularly helpful for Ramaz students in Grades 7 - 12.

NEW SELICHOT TAPE PREPARED

This past summer Rabbi Lookstein recorded a tape in Israel which teaches people how to lead *selichot* services throughout the year. It begins with a complex recording of the first *selichot* service with the traditional *nusach* (no *chazanut*) and it continues with the special pizmonim which are sung at *selichot* services before Rosh Hashanah, between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur and on Asarah B'Tevet, Taanit Esther and Shiva Asar B'Tammuz.

This new tape makes available a clear *nusach* and careful phraseology from which one can learn how to lead selichot services. The *nusach* on the

tape was learned by Rabbi Lookstein from the many years during which our Ritual Director, Israel D. Rosenberg, of blessed memory, led those services in our synagogue.

This tape is also available from the congregation's office for a contribution of \$10.00.

All of Rabbi Lookstein's nusach tapes are the result of many years of listening to his late father, Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein; Mr. Joseph E. Adler, of blessed memory, who was Ritual Director of our congregation from 1933 to 1954; and, finally, Mr. Rosenberg. These tapes perpetuate a style of davening which the Rabbi's father modeled and the beautiful. precise nusach of two ba'alei tefilah who were meticulous in their rendition of the traditional nusach for the prayers. The Rabbi also has available tapes for Shabbat, Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, all of which can be obtained through the congregation's office by calling 774-5640. The tapes are for the community. In Memoriam

BERNARD FISCHMAN

Bernard Fischman was a member of our congregation for some sixty five years. His wife, Hilda Schlang Fischman is a granddaughter of the late Rabbi Moses Z. Margolies (the RaMaZ).

Bernard was an extraordinarily accomplished lawyer who worked extremely hard in his profession, but who devoted fully one third of his time to pro bono causes, many of them Jewish. Jonathan Pollard used to call his office three times a week collect from prison in North Carolina. In Prime Minister Sharon's suit against Time Magazine, Bernard Fischman was the one who wrote the briefs which successfully argued the suit. He was deeply involved in the struggle to free Soviet Jews, in the fight against Anti-Semitism and in all aspects of the human rights struggle.

His long-time, close friend, Elie Wiesel delivered a eulogy at the funeral as did Robert Bernstein, former President of Random House and Arnold Forster, former General Counsel to the Anti Defamation League. Elie Wiesel's heartfelt tribute to Bernie echoed what he once had put in writing:

"I don't know anyone as concerned with human rights as Bernie. As soon as he has knowledge of a violation committed anywhere, of any injustice that strikes any human being, there he is, sounding the alarm. I believe him to be the best informed, most passionate man in the world."
