RABBI HASKEL LOOKSTEIN'S SHABBAT SHUVA DISCOURSE: "CHESED AS THE DEFINING CHARACTER TRAIT OF THE JEWISH PEOPLE"

On Shabbat Shuva afternoon. September 14, following Mincha at 6:15, Rabbi Haskel Lookstein will deliver the annual Shabbat Shuva Drasha (discourse). His subject will "Chesed as The Defining Character Trait of The Jewish People."

The Rabbi will discuss why chesed plays such an important role in Judaism and how it is responsible for creating a religious personality. What are the sources of this mitzvah in the Torah? What are its limits? Can chesed ever be selfish? Does chesed also include contributing to PACs which help to elect government officials who will be friendly to the

Jewish people? These and other questions will be explored by the Rabbi during his discourse.

theme of chesed is particularly appropriate for the period of teshuva (repentance). In fact, understanding the role of chesed in the building of a religious personality may be one of the best paths to repentance. At least it would seem that way from an analysis of this subject by Rabbi Shlomo Chaim HaKohain Aviner, upon which the discourse will be based.

We invite the community to attend the drasha in order to better understand this subject and to be inspired by it in the months to come.

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KJ ISRAEL ACTION COMMITTEE ROARS INTO ACTION WITH SENSATIONAL CLOTHING AND TOY DRIVE!

Born out of the renewed commitment to Israel generated by the April 15th Washington rally, and under the leadership of its Chair, Raanan Agus, the Israel Action Committee has stormed the Congregation this spring and summer with action alerts, informative reports and focused initiatives.

From late June through mid-July, Israel Action Committee publicized a drive to collect new and gently used items for distribution in Israel to trauma shelters, children's transition homes, poor Israeli immigrants, and ordinary citizens who have fallen on hard times. Blankets, linen, toys, and clothing for men, women and children were collected, and over the course of four backbreaking hours July 16th, literally 200 institutional sized bags of donations were triaged and sorted by a team of three dozen volunteers led by Faith Charles, yielding approximately \$40,000 worth of quality articles that completely covered one side of the Riklis Social Hall. It was an unforgettable night for all volunteers, including a welcome contingent from Rebbetzin Jungreis' weekly "Hineni" class held at KJ.

REMEMBER TO BLESS GOD FOR THE GOOD A Rosh Hashanah Message By Rabbi Haskel Lookstein

The Mishna in the ninth chapter of the tractate of Brachot states that just as a person blesses God over good things so must he or she bless God when bad things happen. The reference in the Mishna is to the blessing that we make when we hear bad news or, God forbid, experience a death in the family or among our friends. We recite the blessing baruch dayan ha-emet (blessed is the true —and fair —judge). The Mishna takes for granted that we recite blessings over good news.

Were we to be rewriting the Mishna today we might very well state it just the other way around. In the same way as we acknowledge God's role in bad things by reciting baruch dayan haemet so we should remember to thank God for the good things and say *baruch* ha-tov v'hameitiv (blessed is He who is good and makes things good). I had occasion a few weeks ago in eulogizing the late Dr. William Major to point out how he expressed his gratitude to God every time something good happened in his family or in the community. It was one of his defining characteristics. We would do well to learn from his example.

The past year has been an extraordinarily difficult and tragic one for all of us. Quite apart from the personal tragedies we have experienced, we endured the terror attack on the United States which began on September 11 but whose reverberations we have felt throughout the last twelve months. When we look

at our brothers and sisters in Israel we are horror struck by how difficult their life has become because of their scourge of terror. Just the other day Rabbanit Malke Bina told me that her husband, Ray Aharon Bina, the head of the American program at Yeshiva HaKotel, tells the boys that if they get stuck over Shabbat in the north they should not take a bus on Sunday morning but rather wait until Sunday evening. He tells them this because, statistically, Sunday morning is a favorite time for terrorist action by the savages who have been perpetrating these attacks for almost two years.

As bad as things are, however, we have to look for all of the wonderful things that we have experienced and thank God for them: for the marriages that have been created; for the babies who have been born; for the surge of patriotism in America since 9/11; for the eclipse of post-Zionism in Israel and a new sense among Israelis of why Israel must exist as a Jewish State and not simply a state for Jews.

For all of this and much more we should thank God and we should pray that during the coming year we will have many occasions on which to recite the bracha:

ברוך אתה ה' א־להינו מלך העולם הטוב והמטיב

"Blessed art Thou O' Lord our God, King of the universe who is good and who makes things good."

May we all be inscribed and sealed for a year of health, happiness, safety and peace.

You let us understand that the sentence "All Jews are responsible for one another," is not only a proverb, it is *your* way of life.

We want to thank all the friends who helped you and us in this mission.

We wish we could always take part in your projects.

THE MIKVEH ON THE EVE OF YOM KIPPUR

Every year on the eve of Yom Kippur, there is a custom for men to immerse in the mikveh in preparation for this holy day.

One does not have to be a holy person to participate in this activity. On the contrary, for those of us who are just trying to be observant Jews, it is an added inspiration and preparation for a great day of introspection.

Our practice at KJ is that we observe this custom as a group before the morning service. All MEN are invited to assemble at the mikveh, 234 West 78th Street (East of Broadway) at 7:15 AM on Sunday, September 15. Everyone will have the opportunity to immerse and then we will return to KJ for Shacharit services.

- Refraining from wearing leather shoes (wear a pair of non-leather footwear).
- Men are strongly encouraged to wear a white kitel.
- Candlelighting available prior to 6:47 PM in the Synagogue House and Gottesman lobbies before Kol Nidre on Sunday, September 15.
- Food Drive each man, woman and child is urged to bring unopened cans or boxes of food to be distributed to needy Jews. Drop them in the lobby barrels on your way in Kol Nidre night.



In Memoriam LOLA GROSS

A large gathering came on very short notice on Sunday morning, August 4, to the Main Synagogue of our congregation to bid farewell to a matriarch of our community. Lola Gross' passing marked virtually the end of an era of giants in our community and founders of KJ and Ramaz.

A woman of uncommon strength, wisdom and ideals, Lola Gross was the loving wife of the late Alexander Gross who played such a vital role in the development of Ramaz. Her children. Alice Smokler. Administrative Director of KJ. and Steven Gross, past chairman of the Board of Trustees of Ramaz, followed her in their commitment to this community. Her grandchildren are also devoted members supporters of the congregation and Ramaz. Mrs. Gross and her husband were refugees from Nazi Europe who established themselves firmly in America and raised a family that is loyal to the religion and people whom the Nazis tried to destroy.

We extend heartfelt condolences to her children, Alice and Leonard Smokler, and Georgette and Steven Gross for whom we mourn together the passing of this great Jewish lady.

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In Memoriam DR. WILLIAM MAJOR

The patriarch of one of the leading families congregation passed away after several years of struggling with illness and infirmity. Willy Major was a fixture at KJ who absolutely loved every moment he spent in shul and who gloried in his children and his grandchildren as they all grew up in our community. His wife, Gabriella was his constant source of love and support, encouraging him to do everything possible to maintain his activity and involvement. He loved to daven, to study Torah, and to shep nachas from his children and grandchildren growing up in KJ and flourishing in Ramaz.

The entire men's section of the Main Synagogue was filled to capacity on August 2, at his funeral.
