RELIGION AND STATE IN ISRAEL: AN UNORTHODOX VIEW OF AN ORTHODOX RABBI

CHANUKAH BEGINS FRIDAY EVENING, DECEMBER 19

Chanukah celebrates the miracles of the spiritual and military victories of the Maccabees against the Hellenist tyrants that imposed anti-religious rule and desecrated the Holy Temple in 165 BCE. The 25th of Kislev was the day the Maccabees entered the Temple following the battle and wanted to restart the Holy Service that had ceased under the foreign rule. The Maccabees found only one day's worth of oil that they could use to rededicate the Menorah. Yet that flask lasted until they were able to create new, pure oil – a length of eight days.

The victory established Jewish religious and political sovereignty in Israel during the second Temple times. This miracle of Jewish independence had not been seen since the destruction of the First Temple and the assassination of the governor, Gedalyah.

Primarily, we celebrate Chanukah with spiritual expressions: (1) lighting candles in commemoration of the miracle of the rededication of the Temple, (2) singing Hallel in praise of God's deliverance from our enemies, (3) adding *Al Ha-Nisim* in our prayers of thanksgiving in recognition of both aspects of the miracle of Chanukah. We also have physical pleasures and celebrations by having (4) special foods, (5) gift giving, and even (6) parties.

The Candles

The prevailing custom is for each member of the family to light his or her own menorah which will have as many candles as that night of the holiday plus the shamash. The shamash serves two purposes. Since the Chanukah candles are to commemorate the Menorah of the Temple, we apply the same rules to both: the candles and their flames become holy and as such cannot be used for any other purpose. We cannot read by their lights or use them to light another candle. The shamash, thus, saves us from both.

Time for Lighting

Candles must be lit after nightfall (about 40 minutes after sunset) and last for at least a half-hour. In cases of necessity, the earliest one can light is plag ha-mincha (about 60 minutes before sunset in the winter), yet the candles must stay lit until 30 minutes following nightfall. Hence on Friday afternoon, which this year is the first and last nights of lighting, Chanukah candles should be lit before Shabbat candles, and should be of a type that will last over an hour (this leads to many adopting the custom of using olive-oil based lamps). Candles and olive-oil lamps are available in the Judaica shop in the synagogue lobby. On Saturday night, the candles are lit after Havdalah.

Candle Arrangement

The candles are set from the right side of the Menorah as the candle lighter faces it. The Menorah should be placed in an area where it will not need to be moved after being lit. Safety is also a major concern so please do not leave the home with the candles unattended.

Lighting the Candles

The lights are lit from left to right – starting with the newest candle first. We begin by lighting the shamash then we say the blessings: (1) *ner shel Chanukah*, (2) *she-asa nisim*, and on the first night we add (3) *sheheche'yanu*. Once the blessings are said we light the first candle and begin singing the songs "Hanerot Hallalu" – which explains the reasons for the ceremony – and "Maoz Tzur" which describes all the salvations wrought by God for the Jewish People.

Publicizing the Miracle

We light the Menorah so we can publicize the miracle to as many people as possible. We start with our own family but we often place the Menorah in the window to proclaim our belief to others.

Moreover, we publicize the miracle

by singing the complete Hallel in the morning service and by adding *Al Ha-Nisim* in our daily *Shemoneh Esrei* and in *Birkat ha-Mazon*.

Material Pleasures

In addition to the spiritual nature of the holiday, we have added, in later times, the physical pleasures of special foods (latkes, jelly donuts), gift-giving (never a bad idea, especially Jewish books), and parties (that serve as a means for fellowship and for publicizing the miracle).

Chanukah is a time when we should renew our commitment in our devotion towards God. The brave Maccabees who risked their lives for religious freedom should serve as a model for us to celebrate those freedoms and our joy in service to God.

The Gift of Candles

Through the courtesy of the Kehilath Jeshurun Benevolent Fund, Chanukah candles have been sent to every recipient of the KJ Bulletin.

The proceeds of the Fund are used for deserving individuals who might not otherwise come to the attention of public charity.

Those who receive candles are urged to make a contribution to the KJ Benevolent Fund and send it to the synagogue office.

May you and your family have a happy Chanukah!



RABBINIC SEARCH PROCESS UNDERWAY

President Chaim Edelstein announced, together with Rabbi Lookstein, that the congregation is now considering candidates for a rabbinic position at KJ to lead the congregation into the coming decades. The criteria for the search are, among others: a rabbi with good rabbinic and general scholarship; a passionate, modern Orthodox centrist; a person with good skills and administrative experience; a people person; a strong religious Zionist; a rabbi who loves all Jews and respects the differences in the Jewish people; one who is sensitive to women's needs and issues in orthodoxy; a rabbi who is fluent in Hebrew, who loves Jewish education and who can take a leadership role in Ramaz; and, of course, a man with deep personal piety and commitment.

These criteria are easy to describe for a congregation like ours. They represent what Kehilath Jeshurun is and they reflect the tradition that has been established in our congregation by the late Rabbi Moses Z. Margolies, Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein, and, *yivadel m'chayim l'chayim*, Rabbi Haskel Lookstein. Finding such a person, however, will probably not be easy and we are prepared for the process to take some time.

In order to supervise the process, the President has appointed a Search

Committee composed of the entire Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees, to which have been added the Presidents of the Sisterhood, Men's Club, and one Co-President of Kesher, two representatives from Ramaz, and a small number of others who have played a leading role in congregational life. The goal has been to provide a broad representation of the KJ community, representing all ages and all interests.

The Search Committee has already interviewed one candidate. It will interview others as well. We would assume that the Search Committee will recommend one or two candidates to the general membership and we will invite those candidates to come for a Shabbat together with their family and experience KJ, and give KJ an opportunity to experience them. At the conclusion of the process, a membership meeting will be called to elect the candidate.

This entire process is something that is very new to this congregation. It actually has not been undertaken since the passing of Rabbi Margolies in 1936. We will, therefore, have to participate in a work-in-progress and we are confident that the results of that work will lead to a blessed appointment of a rabbi who, please God, will work with Rabbi Lookstein to lead the congregation from strength to strength.

SCULPTURES BY ERIC EIGEN FROM THE SERIES OUR BROTHERS' KEEPERS

There are three sculptures on display at KJ from the series *Our Brothers' Keepers: The Holocaust, Asia, and Australia* made by our member, Mr. Eric Eigen. They are located outside the Max J. Etra Chapel and in the Jess Ward Library.

When Mr. Eigen first visited the Holocaust Museum, Yad Vashem, in Jerusalem, he was inspired to make a sculptural version of The Forest of the Righteous Gentiles. Too many venues document the fact that there are no limits to Man's inhumanity. This was one of the few places that honored people who had refused to give in to evil. If more people could be inspired to follow these positive examples the world could become a better place.

The series *Our Brothers' Keepers* consists of eight sculptures: one for each of the inhabited continents, one for the Holocaust, and one piece (suspended from the ceiling) that represents those who died while helping others.


Caroline is a sixth grade student at the Ramaz Middle School.
