KJ is very proud to welcome to our rabbinic family Rabbi David Flatto, a gifted teacher of Talmud and Judaism at Ramaz and a doctoral candidate in Jewish studies at Harvard. David Flatto is an alumnus of our Upper School. He was just cited by Jay Reidler, a Presidential Scholar from last year's senior class, as the teacher who had most influenced him. This is quite a compliment for a young man who had taught Jay Reidler for only six months when the nomination was first made.

Rabbi Flatto will serve as an Assistant Rabbi at KJ, with special responsibilities for rabbinic scholarship. He will teach the Dr. William Major Memorial Talmud Shiur every week. He will lead our Shabbat afternoon Talmud class every other Shabbat. He will lecture at our Seudah Shlishit program, and he will deliver occasional sermons from the pulpit.

We are very happy to bring Rabbi Flatto's scholarship and inspiration to the service of this community.

#### **Open Beit Midrash**

On Thursday nights, from 7:00 - 9:00 PM the Riklis Social Hall and Jess Ward Library will be filled with learning. We encourage all those who want a place to learn for a set time, either alone or one-on-one with a *chavruta* (study-partner) to come to the Open Beit Midrash. One or more of our rabbis will be on hand to answer questions and help with texts, and there will be food and other refreshments to keep you going.

Following the first hour of learning and preparation will be a Talmud class taught by Rabbis Eliezer Rubin, David Flatto, and David Billet as well as guest lecturers on a rotating basis.

#### Adult Bar and Bat Mitzvah Program

The class, on Thursdays from 7:00 - 8:00 is part of the Open Beit Midrash program and is taught by Rabbi Elie Weinstock in the Jess Ward Library.

#### WELCOME TO RABBI DAVID BILLET



We are happy to welcome a Rabbinic Intern this year, David Billet, who is in his fourth year of semicha studies at Yeshiva University's Rabbi Isaac Elchanan Theological Seminary. Duvie Billet, as he is called, is a graduate of Yeshiva College and a former student, for two years, at Yeshivat Har Etzion.

Rabbi Billet, who comes from a rabbinic family — his father is Rabbi Heshie Billet of the Young Israel of Woodmere — will give shiurim at KJ, including alternating with Rabbi Flatto on Shabbat afternoons. He will speak from the pulpit on occasion, and he will offer presentations at our Seudah Shlishit program and during other weekly shiurim. He will also teach the women's Talmud class on Monday mornings.

We welcome Duvie Billet to our community and we hope that he will benefit greatly from his year at KJ, even as he no doubt will contribute a great deal to our congregational family.

After the Laws of Prayer class, students can learn one-on-one at the Open Beit Midrash with a partner about synagogue etiquette; tallit and tefilin; Torah and Haftara reading; giving a Dvar Torah; and other fundamental parts of this traditional rite of passage. For those who want to learn more about the practical laws of prayer, then the first hour of the class if for you. The second hour participants will learn for their personal Bar or Bat Mitzvah ceremony that will take place at one of our Intermediate services.



CHATAN TORAH Dr. Sasha Englard


Dr. Sasha Englard was born in Antwerp, Belgium. He and his family escaped from the German-occupied area of France to the non-occupied zone of the Vichy French government. They then escaped to Spain in order to avoid deportation to a concentration camp. Sasha came from a family of *talmidei chachamim*, pious, communally-minded Jews who were also known for their acts of *chesed*.

Perhaps that was what led him to study medicine after receiving his Bachelor's Degree from CCNY. He received a Ph.D. from Western Reserve University School of Medicine in Cleveland, and was appointed to the faculty of the Albert Einstein College of Medicine here in New York, where he now serves as Professor Emeritus of Biochemistry.

Dr. Englard was the recipient of many honors and fellowships, and he is the author of dozens of articles and chapters of books relating to his field.

Married to the former Frieda Gruenstein, they fled the Holocaust in 1936 as refugees from Germany. Frieda has a Bachelor's Degree from Hunter College; she studied at both Herzliah and the Jewish Theological Seminary, and holds a Master's in counseling from NYU as well as an MSW from Hunter. A graduate of the American Association for Psychoanalysis and Psychotherapy, Frieda practices as a psychoanalyst. She has been a constant source of support to Sasha in his career.

Dr. Philip J. Wilner, the son of Holocaust survivors, is a graduate of the Ramaz Upper School, Class of 1975. He received his B.A. from Columbia College, an M.D. from Columbia's College of Physicians and Surgeons and an MBA in Health Care Administration and Policy from the Zicklin Business School of Baruch College.

A gifted psychiatrist, he serves as Vice President and Medical Director of Behavioral Health at New York-Presbyterian Hospital, where he is also Executive Vice Chair and Associate Professor of Clinical Psychiatry at Weill Cornell Medical College.

Phil Wilner is a Trustee of Ramaz. Behind the scenes he has been extremely helpful to us in resolving difficult problems and dealing with important communal issues. His advice and counsel are always well grounded and, invariably, right on the mark.

His wife, Judy Schaer Wilner, a yeshiva graduate herself, is a pediatric occupational therapist, specializing in the treatment of disabled infants and toddlers. She is a Consultant at the Bank Street College Family Center. Judy has been exceptionally active in working for Ramaz. She currently serves as Vice President of the Parents Council for the Middle School.

Their greatest pride - and ours, too - are their three children at Ramaz – Gabrielle, a 9th grader in the Upper School; Jacob, a 7th grader in the Middle School whose Bar Mitzvah will be

Raanan Agus is a graduate of the Ramaz Upper School, Class of 1985. He continued on to Yeshivat Har Etzion for a year, and received his A.B. in economics from Princeton. He received a joint JD/MBA degree from Columbia University, and has been at Goldman Sachs for ten years. He now serves as a partner at the firm in the Principal Strategies Group of the Equities Division.

Raanan has been extremely devoted to our community since he first came to KJ. He serves on the Board of Trustees of the Congregation and on the Executive Committee of the Board of Ramaz. He is on the Yeshiva University Investment Committee, and devotes an extraordinary amount of time to Israel advocacy, serving on the Israel Action Committee at KJ. Raanan is deeply involved in MIDPAC, and as a member of the AIPAC Northeast Region Council Board.

Fourteen years ago he married Dr. Nicole Schreiber Agus, a graduate of Flatbush and Princeton, who earned her Ph.D. from the Albert Einstein College of Medicine. Nicole is the principal investigator in a laboratory at Einstein and has published numerous papers in various scientific journals.

#### RABBI LOOKSTEIN ACCOMPANIES MAYOR BLOOMBERG ON SPECIAL MISSION TO ISRAEL

Last month, Rabbi Haskel Lookstein had the privilege of going on a mission to Israel with Mayor Michael R. Bloomberg. They were accompanied by former Mayor Ed Koch; Councilman Simcha Felder, a close advisor to the Mayor; Dr. Ester Fuchs (the mother of the Victor children at Ramaz); Jonathan Greenspun (married to Rose Sara Feinerman, a Ramaz alumna); Jennifer Falk, the Mayor's Deputy Press Secretary (and also a Ramaz alumna); and various security officers. He reported on this mission in his sermon the following Shabbat and also in The Jewish Week. Rabbi Lookstein reports below what happened and what this mission meant to Israelis and to New Yorkers.

It is perhaps coincidental that the mission took place in the week in which we read a haftara from Isaiah, 51 which begins with the words "I, surely I, shall comfort and console vou." We all know that whatever the Bible informs us about God is done so that we should know how to imitate those qualities. The Torah specifically commands us "v'halachta bidrachav (and you shall walk in His ways)." The Oral Law explains: "Just as He is merciful, so should you be merciful; just as He comforts mourners, so you should comfort the mourners; just as He visits the sick, so should you visit the sick."

That is exactly what the Mayor did on his mission. He performed the *mitzvah* of comforting the mourners and the *mitzvah* of visiting the sick. And he did it in a very public, demonstrative way which brought significant support to our brothers and sisters in Israel, and a very important message to the citizens of New York.

I won't go into details about the exhausting mission of thirty-six hours (taking off at 5:00 P.M. Monday, and returning at 5:00 A.M. Wednesday), except to say that the Mayor was a very gracious host. He took us on his private plane, at his own expense, and spared nothing to make sure that we would all be very comfortable.

What is important is that the Mayor, who by virtue of his being the elected head of probably the greatest city in the world, has a powerful pulpit through which to instruct by example and by words. He used that pulpit with great effectiveness on this mission.

He delivered two messages. The first was "Imo anochi b'tzara (I am with you in your time of pain and

suffering)." He did this at the site of the suicide bombing which had occurred exactly one week earlier. He and we lit memorial candles. The Rav

of the Kotel recited an *e-l moleh* and Meshulam Shulami recited *kaddish* for his daughter, Elisheva, age 16, who was a victim of this murderous act. Shulami's wife was still on the critical list in Hadassah Hospital when her husband was reciting this kaddish.

We are here, the Mayor told a large crowd, to be with you in your time of distress. We are with the victims, the injured, the rescuers (including ZAKA, the group that retrieves body parts after a bombing), the mourners, and with all the people of Israel. The response of inspiring and the crowd was spontaneous. As the candles were being lit people began to sing Hatikva. And then two groups of yeshiva boys standing on balconies, with their white shirts and black velvet kippot, who watching memorial were the ceremonies, spontaneously began to sing the Star Spangled Banner. The crowd joined in.

The merging of the ideals of two

nations was symbolized in the two anthems and in the Mayor's wearing of a special *kipa* (which I had the foresight to bring with me and give him on the plane), with a *dugma* of the flags of Israel and America. He put it on at the Kotel at 5:00 o'clock, and he was still wearing it five hours later after the memorial, a gathering at the Jerusalem City Hall, the walk through Ben Yehuda, and dinner at Café Rimon, after which we returned to his private plane. Only then did he remove it.

He had expressed his solidarity with suffering Jews earlier at Hadassah Hospital in Ein Karem. He and we performed *nichum aveilim* for Chana and Matanya Nathanson who were sitting *shiva* for their daughter Tehilla, age 2 — a *shiva* which began a little late because the parents themselves were heavily injured in the attack — and still worrying about their daughter Shoshana, age 5, who was critically injured. The scene of expressing the formula of comfort to two people sitting in wheelchairs with casts on their limbs was unforgettable.

The Mayor continued with bikur cholim in the pediatric ICU of the hospital visiting with children who survived — barely — what has come to be known as the "children's massacre."

There was a second message which the Mayor delivered from his pulpit: "Do not stand idly by while your brother's blood is spilled." He heard of the spilling of Jewish blood halfway around the world and he refused to continue with "business as usual." He took his private plane at his own expense and brought a small entourage to Israel in order to just show up (remember Woody Allen's remark:

"Ninety percent of life consists of just showing up"). He came to stand up and to say very clearly that "terror inflicted on you is terror inflicted on everyone." It didn't take long for his words to have additional meaning when we all learned two days later about the ninety-five Shiite Moslems who were murdered by their own brothers in Iraq in that tragic bombing of the Mosque. He stated something that Rabbi Arthur Hertzberg in his Op Ed piece in the New York Times didn't seem to understand: "You do not negotiate with a gun at your head; you fight back."

Mayor Bloomberg was THE RIGHT PERSON, IN THE RIGHT PLACE, AT THE RIGHT TIME, AND HE DID THE RIGHT THING. Those of us who know the history of American Jews, particularly during the Holocaust, know that American Jews in positions of power have not always stood up when Jewish blood was being spilled. Unfortunately, they often stood by instead of standing up.

Both of his messages "I am with you in your time of distress" and "Do not stand idly by...." were received enthusiastically in Jerusalem and in New York. The crowds that greeted him in Israel and applauded his words were quite overwhelming. The crush

on Ben Yehuda was not to be believed. I understand the media in Israel covered every aspect of his visit very approvingly.

The media in New York — all the newspapers, the radio and TV gave enormous coverage to this event. Even Polish TV at 11:00 P.M. carried it (I think it was the only place on which I appeared on television — somebody quipped that they probably thought that I was the Mayor). Everyone commented favorably. Everyone appreciated the sincerity of this effort.

Which brings me to a closing word about Michael Bloomberg. After spending thirty-six hours with him, I came to understand him as an extremely bright person, very capable, extraordinarily hard-working (he went from the plane at 5:00 A.M. on Wednesday to visit a wounded policeman in the Bronx and then traveled by subway in order to be in his office at 9:00 A.M. so that nobody should say that he was taking too much time off). He understands some of the intricacies of politics and perception and he is sensitive to them.

I thought he grew as a Jew on that mission. He began to look more comfortable in the *kipa* (he is blessed with a good head of hair to which to

attach a kipa — not like the writer of this article) and he got increasingly comfortable at the Kotel and at other ceremonies. Most important of all, he clearly identified with the Jewish people, with its plight, and with its tragedies. I guess we all grew Jewishly on that mission.

We hope that the Mayor will continue to use his pulpit effectively, purposefully, with courage, with compassion, with idealism, and with his Jewish *neshama*.






