# ARE YOU IN GREAT SHAPE? A QUESTION FOR THE NEW YEAR

#### A ROSH HASHANAH MESSAGE

#### by Rabbi Haskel Lookstein

In May, I called a member of our congregation and, in the course of the conversation, I asked him: "So tell me, how are you?" He replied: "I am in great shape for the shape I'm in." At first I laughed at the clever turn of language, but then as I reflected on it, I realized that there is something of a philosophy of life contained in that bon mot.

Personally and collectively, we all have our share of problems. The question is how do we respond to that share? Do we bemoan our fate, complain and lash out at all those around us and sometimes even at ourselves? Or, do we take the hand that God deals us and determine how we play that hand? In the final analysis, we often have very little control over the hand we are dealt, but we have almost total control over how we deal with the hand.

As we confront a New Year in an atmosphere of uneasiness as Americans and as Jews, we ought to concentrate not so much on what our problems are but rather on what solutions are available. It would be great if we lead a problem-free existence, but that only happens after 120 years. Life consists of dealing with problems forthrightly, with both confidence and faith.

I related the above *bon mot* to an elderly friend. His reaction was instructive. He said that when he ponders his own difficulties he thinks about all the problems that he *doesn't* have and thanks God accordingly.

So, the next time somebody asks you how you are doing, think about the possibility of responding "Thank God, I'm really in great shape for the shape I'm in."

May we all be inscribed and sealed for a year of health, happiness and peace, and may we be able to be grateful for all the problems and ills which we don't have and work constructively to resolve the ones we do have.

# L'HITRA'OT X PLANS FOR THANKSGIVING MISSION TO POLAND AND ISRAEL TAKING SHAPE



We are very excited about the forthcoming KJ Mission to Israel and the optional addition of a pre-trip visit to Poland, scheduled for this fall's Thanksgiving period.

Here is the plan:

Over the weekend preceding Thanksgiving, we will leave for Poland from Kennedy Airport.

One day will be spent in Warsaw — visiting the Jewish cemetery, the ghetto areas, the Nozyk Synagogue, the Rapaport Memorial, Mila 18 and Umshlagplatz, with a possible visit to Treblinka, time permitting.

A second day will be spent in Lublin, seeing the Yeshiva of Chachmei Lublin, the Lublin Ghetto, and Majdanek.

And, finally, a third day will include Cracow, visiting the Ramah Synagogue, the accompanying cemetery, and other places of historical importance in that city. There will also be a half day at

Auschwitz/Birkenau.

David Bernstein, Dean of the Pardes Institute and a former history teacher and youth director in both Ramaz and KJ, will accompany us as the scholar on this Heritage Seminar's section of the trip.

We fly from Poland to Israel on Wednesday night, going from the land of destruction to the land of redemption. Joining us there will be those who flew directly to Israel from the United States. Spending Thursday, Friday, Shabbat and Sunday in Israel, we will be touring, amongst other places, Ir David and Ramat Rachel, which include sites from the First Temple era, the Second Temple period, and modern battlefields and 1967.

In Israel we will be based in the Inbal Hotel. Of course, we will hear talks and shiurim by outstanding Israeli personalities.

## RABBI SAUL BERMAN TO SPEAK AT TESHUVA SHIUR

#### TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 30, AT 8:00 PM

Rabbi Saul Berman will deliver the Congregation's annual Teshuva Shiur on Tuesday evening, September 30 at 8:00 PM in the Riklis Social Hall.

Rabbi Berman's shiurim have been extremely well-received and he has delivered this shiur at KJ over the past several years.

A graduate of Yeshiva University and its Rabbi Isaac Elchanan Theological Seminary (RIETS), Rabbi Berman holds a law degree from New York University and a degree in Political Science from the University of California at Berkeley. He also studied at Hebrew University and Tel Aviv



University in Israel.

Rabbi Berman served Senior Rabbi as of Lincoln Square Synagogue and Chairman of the Department of Judaic Studies at YU's Stern College. Additionally, he was on the faculty of the Columbia University School of Law. He is now a senior faculty member

and founder of Yeshivat Chovevei Torah. Currently he is the founding Director of EDAH, an organization devoted to the invigoration of Modern Orthodox ideology and religious life.

# RABBI HASKEL LOOKSTEIN TO DELIVER SHABBAT SHUVA DISCOURSE

"Shabbat and Yom Tov --An Analysis of Man in Relation To Himself, To Society and To God" Saturday, October 4, at 5:40 PM

In the spring I was sent a taped *shiur* by Rav Soloveitchik, of blessed memory, recorded on December 24, 1973. The purpose of my receiving the tapes was to elicit comments on a strong statement of the Rav in that *shiur* relating to the indifference of American Jews to the Holocaust while it was in progress. I wrote an article on his statement and its implications which should appear in a forthcoming issue of the journal *American Jewish History*.

In the process of listening to the tapes, I was both informed and inspired by a fascinating analysis of Shabbat and Yom Tov. The Rav distinguishes between a Yom Kadosh—a holy day—and a Yom Tov. In so doing, he explains some of the fundamental differences between

Shabbat and Yom Tov (Yom Tov includes both the three pilgrimage festivals as well as Purim and Chanukah) halakhically and suggests implications for man's role in the world in relation to God. He also develops a tension which Judaism recognizes — and requires — between man as an individual and man as he is enmeshed in the community.

The ideas in the Rav's *shiur* present a moral and religious challenge to every Jew especially during the High Holy Day season. I look forward to sharing the challenge with you in the Shabbat Shuva discourse on Shabbat afternoon, October 4, after Mincha which begins at 5:40 PM.

#### THE MIKVEH ON THE EVE OF YOM KIPPUR

Every year on the eve of Yom Kippur, there is a custom for men to immerse in the mikveh in preparation for this holy day.

One does not have to be a holy person to participate in this activity. On the contrary, for those of us who are just trying to be observant Jews, it is an added inspiration and preparation for a great day of introspection.

Our practice at KJ is that we observe this custom as a group before the morning service. All MEN are invited to assemble at the mikveh, 234 West 78th Street (East of Broadway) at 7:15 AM on Sunday, October 5. Everyone will have the opportunity to immerse and then we will return to KJ for Shacharit services.

#### **YOM KIPPUR - A day of denial**

- Avoidance of food, drink, washing, lotions and oils, and marital relations.
- Refraining from wearing leather shoes (wear a pair of nonleather footwear).
- Men are strongly encouraged to wear a white kitel.
- Candlelighting available prior to 6:14 PM in the Synagogue House and Gottesman lobbies before Kol Nidre on Sunday, October 5.

#### SUKKOT

- All meals with bread or mezonot should be eaten in a Sukkah.
- Lulav and Etrog are not used on Shabbat, but will be used beginning on Sunday, October 12.

Koby Mandell was only thirteen years old when he and his friend Yosef cut school to go hiking. Their bodies were found a day later. They had been brutally stoned to death by Arab terrorists in a cave in the Judean desert. The extreme cruelty of this act of terror shocked the world, and devastated their families. How does a family recover from such a loss?

The Blessing of a Broken Heart is at once devastating and life-affirming, shot through with immense pain and yet also with immense beauty and courage. Sherri Mandell's ability to find meaning in the depths of darkness and her determination to look for grace and love rather than succumb to hate

and despair are inspiring and humbling. She is broken-hearted, but not broken.

Sherri Mandell also authored Writers of the Holocaust and has written for numerous magazines and journals, including The Washington Post and The Jerusalem Post. She and her husband Rabbi Seth Mandell believe that the Jewish response to suffering is to live a fuller and more engaged life, helping others who have suffered the trauma of loss. In this way, they keep Koby's spirit alive in the world.


