WHEN STRESS IS GOOD A ROSH HASHANAH MESSAGE BY RABBI HASKEL LOOKSTEIN

Several years ago I picked up a book on stress, hoping that it would give me some insight into how to avoid excessive stress in a life and profession in which stress seems to be somewhat endemic.

The book made many suggestions which I promptly forgot. But one has remained with me and I find it very helpful. The author stated that when a situation arises which is totally beyond one's control there is no point stressing over it. Just relax and accept it.

He gave a graphic example: You are in a traffic jam. The cars are not moving. You have a very important meeting with people who are waiting for you and with whom you cannot possibly get in touch. Essentially, you have two choices: you



can pound your fists on the steering wheel, tense up every muscle in your neck and shout expletives from the privacy of your car which you would not want anybody else to hear; or, you can sit back, tune your radio to WQXR or some other music station, and listen to the music while watching all of the other drivers around you banging their fists on their steering wheels, tensing up every muscle in their necks and shouting expletives in the privacy of their cars which they would not want anybody else to hear.

In other words, when you can't do anything to change the situation just let it go and don't get yourself all stressed out over something beyond your control.

It's good advice which I have tried to follow on any number of occasions and which I recommend to others. Stress in situations which you cannot change doesn't help anybody.

However, some stress is actually good for us, like the stress that we feel when we know we should be correcting something which is actually within our control. An example is the High Holy Day season which is upon us. Judaism teaches us that when it comes to human behavior everything is in our control. If we have made mistakes, we can correct them. If we have hurt people, including members of our own family, we can apologize. If we have said things about people which are unkind, unfair, or even simply insensitive, we can change our mode of speech and we can do concrete things to correct the sins and errors of the past. If we have failed to help another in distress, we can resolve to do better the next time.

This is the season of the year when we have an opportunity to confront our own weaknesses and failings and effect a real change in our behavior. Such change is totally within our control and whatever stress is involved in effecting such change is healthy stress.

The late Rev. Reinhold Neibuhr coined an expression which has become the slogan for alcoholics anonymous. It is relevent far beyond substance abuse. "God, grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change, the courage to change the things I can, and the wisdom to know the difference."

May we all be blessed with a year of health, happiness and peace.

RABBI SAUL BERMAN TO DELIVER A TESHUVA SHIUR "TESHUVA FOR ISSUES IN FRIENDSHIPS" MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 17 AT 8:00 PM



A leading Orthodox teacher and thinker, Rabbi Berman has made numerous contributions to the Jewish community. Ordained by Yeshiva University, at which he also earned a B.A. and an M.H.L., he also completed a J.D. at New York University and an M.A. in Political Science at the University of California at Berkeley. He served as a congregational rabbi at Beth Israel in Berkeley, CA; Young Israel of Brookline, MA; and Lincoln Square Synagogue in New York. Rabbi Berman served as Chairman of the Department of Judaic Studies of Stern College for Women of Yeshiva University for 13 years, where he still serves as an Associate Professor of Jewish Studies. He is an adjunct Professor at Columbia University School of Law. In 1997, Rabbi Berman founded and became Director of Edah, an organization devoted to the invigoration of Modern Orthodox ideology and religious life.

Rabbi Berman will speak about the imperative of t'shuva as it relates both to sins committed against God and against one's fellow person. Indeed, repentance in the area of interpersonal relationships has its own unique laws and dictates beyond the general components of t'shuva. This lecture will specifically examine the notions of t'shuva and repentance in relation to the sensitive areas of wrongs committed by friends towards each other.



"Churchill and the Jews" with Author Sir Martin Gilbert Saturday, October 27 at 8:00 pm





Sir Martin Gilbert was born in London in 1936. As a young schoolboy, he saw a war-damaged city slowly return to life. After two years in the British Army he studied history at Oxford University and in 1968 he was appointed the official Churchill Biographer, a task he continues to this day. He has lectured at the White House, the Ottawa House of Commons, the Academy of Sciences in Moscow and Kiev, and in universities and public forums throughout the United States. He was knighted in 1995, having written 78 books, and is at present working on number 79. His histories of the First World War and Second World War are best-selling classics.

The story of Churchill's long and positive relationship with Jews and Zionism; his often unpopular support for the Jewish National Home in Palestine; his wartime efforts to help the

Jews in Nazi-dominated Europe; his post-war support for the State of Israel; his friendship with individual Jews; and his understanding of Jewish communal and national aspirations.

The Officers of the Congregation are very pleased to announce that three outstanding members of the community will be honored as Grooms of the Law for the celebration of the completion of the Torah on Simchat Torah. Their installation will take place before the Musaf service on Shemini Atzeret.



CHATAN TORAH Natalio Fridman

Our Chatan Torah was born in Buenos Aires, Argentina, to parents who left Poland immediately before World War II at a time when the United States was closed to immigration from Eastern Europe. Natalio Fridman came from a family of talmidei chachamim. On his mother's side, his grandfather was an Av Beit Din and the Rabbi of Stanslivay in the Provence of Warsaw. Natalio was educated in Buenos Aires where he received a civil engineering degree at the University of Buenos Aires. During his college years he was very involved in the United Jewish Appeal and active in the University's Zionist center and head of the student division of Argentinian Friends of Hebrew University.

When he came to the United States, he began working on engineering projects involving bridges and water structures. After receiving a Professional Engineering license Natalio began consulting in computerized design structures. In 1972, he founded Consist in Brazil, a company which has grown into a worldwide computer software and services organization with headquarters in New York Ciy.

Natalio's wife, Anne, a Ramaz alumna, has a Master's degree in psychology from Columbia University, as well as an MBA from NYU. Anne and Natalio are the proud parents of David, a Ramaz alumnus and a Yeshiva University graduate who currently works as an equity research analyst.

Natalio is the President of American Friends of Ariel Institutes, the rabbinic training and Jewish educational program of Rabbi Shear Yashuv Cohen, Chief Rabbi of Haifa. He has served on the Boards of Trustees of the Fifth Avenue Synagogue and KJ. He and Anne have been regular worshipers in our synagogue for almost 20 years and have been very involved in and generously supportive of the religious, educational and communal services of both KJ and Ramaz. It is an honor for the congregation to salute Natalio Fridman as our Chatan Torah.



CHATAN BEREISHIT David W. Shipper

Born and raised in Lawrence, Long Island, David Shipper received his yeshiva education at Hillel (now known as HAFTR). He holds an undergraduate degree in journalism from New York University and a JD - earned at the age of 23 - from New York Law School. He has served three terms as President of New York Law's Alumni Association and sits on its Board of Trustees.

David is a third generation member of KJ. His maternal grandparents, Leon and Hertha Sigall, of blessed memory, were longtime members. Leon was also a Trustee of the congregation. David's parents, Herbert K. Shipper, of blessed memory, and tibadeil l'chaim tovim, Judith S. Shipper have also been longtime members of the congregation.

It is a special privilege for us to honor David as Chatan Bereishit because he is a Manhattan coordinator of Hatzolah. He also serves on the Executive Board of - and is counsel to - Chevra Hatzolah, the citywide organization which oversees the fourteen geographical divisions and one thousand volunteers of the organization. David interacts with various city, state and federal agencies, advocating on behalf of Hatzolah and the Jewish community at large. When he is not volunteering his time, he is a partner in the firm of Shipper & Shipper. He was admitted to the practice of law both in New York and Florida and concentrates mainly in the areas of transactional real estate and trusts and estates.

There is another, less known reason why we are so happy to honor David as Chatan Bereishit: Forty-four years ago, we gave the same honor to his grandfather, Leon Sigall, of blessed memory.

Reared in Rye, New York, David is a graduate of the Westchester Day School (founded by KJ member Mortimer Propp who was our Chatan Torah last year) and an alumnus of the Ramaz Upper School, Class of 1986. It was at Ramaz that he met Robyn Price, Class of 1989, whom he eventually married in 1998.

David received his B.A. from Harvard, and undergraduate degrees in business and law from Harvard as well. THE MIKVAH ON THE EVE OF YOM KIPPUR

Every year on the eve of Yom Kippur, there is a custom for men to immerse in the mikvah in preparation for this holy day.

One does not have to be a holy person to participate in this activity. On the contrary, for those of us who are just trying to be observant Jews, it is an added inspiration and preparation for a great day of introspection.

Our practice at KJ is that we observe this custom as a group before the morning service. All MEN are invited to assemble at the mikvah, 419 East 77th Street (between 1st and York Avenues) at 6:30 AM on Friday, September 21. Everyone will have the opportunity to immerse and then we will return to KJ for Shacharit services.

SUKKOT

- All meals with bread or *mezonot* should be eaten in a Sukkah.
- Lulav and Etrog will be used beginning on Thursday, September 27, but are not used on Shabbat.

You may purchase a Lulav and Israeli Etrog through KJ by contacting Rabbi Elie Weinstock in the synagogue office. (Reservation forms have been sent to all members under separate cover.) Deadline is Sunday, September 16.


Sara Filler Outreach Administrator


