

SHIVAH ASSAR B'TAMMUZ, TISHA B'AV AND THE THREE WEEKS **JULY 9 - JULY 30**

uring the summer months, we mourn the destruction of both Temples in Jerusalem, which took place on the ninth of Av, and the events that led to their destruction. We fast on the seventeenth day of the month of Tammuz, Shivah Assar B'Tammuz, because, according to tradition, it was on that day that the enemy penetrated the walls of Jerusalem prior to the destruction of the Second Temple. The Talmud, however, writes that these were not the only tragedies that befell the Jewish people on this day. On the seventeenth of Tammuz four more tragedies occurred: the first tablets containing the Ten Commandments were broken by Moses after the sin of the Golden Calf; the daily sacrifice was suspended during the time of the First Temple; the wicked Apostumos burned the Torah; and an idol was erected in the Temple.

Additional tragedies also befell the Jewish people on the ninth day of the month of Av - Tisha B'Av. On this day, the spies (meraglim) returned to the Jews in the desert with a negative report about the Land of Israel. In addition, it was on this day that the city of Betar was destroyed and tens of thousands of Jews were killed, and the wicked Turnus Rufus plowed the site of the Temple and its surroundings. Tradition asserts that the expulsion of the Jews from England in 1290 and the expulsion from Spain in 1492 also took place on Tisha B'Av.

Our mourning for the destroyed

Temples and for the other calamities which occurred on these days extends beyond the fasts themselves. The period between these two fasts, traditionally called The Three Weeks, includes several practices of mourning. During these three weeks we do not get our hair cut, attend weddings or involve ourselves in large joyous gatherings. During the nine days which begin on the first of Av, July 22, and continue until midday on the tenth day of Av, July 31, we are additionally forbidden to eat meat and drink wine (except on Shabbat), to go swimming, or bathe for pleasure and to do any laundry or dry cleaning that is not absolutely necessary. The Talmud writes that when the month of Av begins, our mood should reflect our mourning for the destruction of the Temples. On Tisha B'Av itself, besides fasting, we are prohibited from washing our bodies, wearing leather shoes, anointing ourselves, and having marital relations. It is forbidden, as well, to study Torah on this day excepting the sections of the prophets and the Talmud that discuss the destruction. We do not wear tefillin until Mincha and the custom is to sit on low chairs as mourners do until midday. Our observance of mourning also forbids us from greeting friends on Tisha B'Av.

We mourn the Temples that were destroyed over nineteen hundred years ago and we pray that we will be worthy to see rebuild Temple God the our lifetime.

KETER TORAH AWARD BESTOWED

At the conclusion of the morning service on the second day of Shavuot, Audrey Lookstein was presented by Rabbi Haskel Lookstein with the Fifth Annual Judith Kaufman Hurwich Keter Torah Award. These are their remarks:

KETER TORAH AWARD PRESENTATION BY RABBI HASKEL LOOKSTEIN SHAVUOT II – MAY 30, 2009

Someone - I believe it was Rae Gurewitsch - spoke up. saying; All the suggestions are good but I think this year Audrey should be honored. It's her 50th year as rebbitzen and it's the perfect time. I tried to protest again, but

the Executive Committee was unanimous - it must be Audrey Lookstein. said: OK but I can't get her to do it; maybe Rae ought to try. So Rae did, and after a few days of protest, Audrey agreed. clinching argument for the reluctant honoree was that this honor would not people money - maybe a three day weekend; but obligatory no

Educating me in the ways of the Sisterhood was not simple, but she

was the best possible teacher and mother-in-law anyone could have. She was non-judgmental, complimentary and we loved each other. We could laugh and cry together,

sheps nachas from four of her thirteen grandchildren who are Ramaz students and from the others who are day school alumni or students. In fact, this was the deciding factor in Audrey's accepting this honor: She knew it would bring all of her children, sons-in-law and grandchildren together for Yom Tov. I told you last year from this pulpit that she was once asked by some on-line source to create a password. I looked over her shoulder to see what she chose - "children!"

The Ramaz family has always been her family and she reluctantly agreed to be the guest of honor at the Ramaz Dinner a few years ago only because she realized it would benefit the school.

Community - She is one of the primary

leaders in AMIT - founder and first president of the Gayle Schechter Chapter here in Manhattan, former National Vice President and Chair of its National Board and, currently, co-chair of AMIT's President's Council.

And, to top it all off, Audrey was a loving and beloved friend of the late Judith Kaufman Hurwich. On every visit to Israel, Judy and Audrey spoke and usually saw each other. There was a very strong bond between the two.

Finally, anyone who knows me, knows that whatever I have been able to do in this community I could not have done without the wisdom, guidance, encouragement and love from Audrey. This has been truly a shared fifty years of service.

and I can't possibly imagine life in KJ had I not been blessed with her presence and guidance for so many years, up until her death in 1997.

There have been many, many KJ officers during these years - past and present - who have been caring and concerned with our well-being. It is a blessing to know that this care and concern is what makes KJ unique in the annals of American synagogue life. We do not take it for granted.

KJ in half a century has certainly evolved and changed. However, the role of the Rabbis has never changed. My late father-in-law, Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein, of blessed memory, set a pattern of rabbinic service wherein interest in and devotion to each individual in good times and bad was the major responsibility and privilege of the rabbi *and* his wife. And it is a blessing of unlimited value to us both.

Our children tell me that they never minded growing up in what is sometimes known as a glass house. I think they're telling the truth, but I'm not sure that it applied all the time. We are blessed to see that they conduct their lives in their own communities in ways that reflect what they saw and experienced in our home and community. I am also gratified that they are instilling in their children those same values and patterns of life, and often I think they are even going us one better. How blessed and grateful we are that they are all here to celebrate with us - this honor as well as some birthdays, graduations and anniversaries. We thank them all with much love.

So, Ruth said it very succinctly when she insisted on casting her lot with her mother-in-law, Naomi. I guess I've taken a little longer to share some of my thoughts. But, finally, I thank both God and my own father, who brought my husband and this opportunity to me, and I am grateful to all of you, the KJ community, for your support, encouragement, friendship and love.

SALUTE TO RUDY ARJUNE

Following the induction of new members and the tribute to our anniversarians, Rabbi Lookstein spoke movingly about Rudy's love of the Synagogue and Ramaz and the higher calling to which Rudy responds every day by doing God's work in God's house. Rudy was presented with a beautifully framed montage featuring professional photographs of KJ taken by Howard Katz. Inscribed on a plaque within the montage was the following: May he who cares for the House of the Lord be forevermore blessed by the Lord. A visibly moved and delighted Rudy then had the opportunity to reflect upon reaching this 25 year milestone. (Both Rabbi Lookstein's words and Rudy's comments can be found on pages 8-9)

PRESENTATION OF NEW DOCUMENTS

Upon the conclusion of the special acknowledgement to Rudy, KJ President Eric Feldstein presented the new Governance documents to the Congregation. The original documents date back to 1903 and were last revised forty years ago. The new documents represent years of work by David Lobel's Constitution Committee with support of attorneys at Weil Gotshal who ensured the quality and the integrity of the documents.

The new governance documents offer the following:

- 1. Restructuring of the classes of membership (elimination of "regular," "associate" and "junior members;" provision of family membership).
- 2. Incorporation of the resolution passed by KJ members in May 2001 with respect to sanctioning persons who refuse to consent to the issuance or receipt of a Get.
- 3. Providing that each Officer shall be a Trustee, and providing certain extensions of the term limits on Trustees for persons who serve as Officers.
- 4. Providing for an Executive Committee to be formed, which shall have oversight of the day-to-day operation of the Congregation in line with authority delegated by the Board of Trustees.
- 5. Expressly allowing for indemnification of Trustees, Officers and employees of the congregation and related insurance.
- 6. Inclusion of a process for the appointment of religious officials.
- 7. Providing that all issues of halacha shall be determined by the Rabbi .


The motion to adopt the new documents was approved by the membership.

PRESENTATION TO RUDY ARJUNE AT THE 137TH ANNUAL SYNAGOGUE MEETING APRIL 29, 2009

wenty-five years ago, in 1984, we were in desperate need of a superintendent to manage the synagogue and the Ramaz School buildings. God smiled upon us and sent us a shaliach in the form of Stanley Gurewitsch, who was then a Vice President of KJ, serving under then President Benjy Brown. Stanley found a young Rudy Arjune, who was an employee in one of his buildings and who was highly recommended by the super for whom he was working. Stanley should become a shadchan because he created a marriage between Rudy and KJ/Ramaz that was literally made in heaven.

There are three factors that make this a heavenly marriage for Rudy and for us.

- 1. Rudy is very smart. He is a quick learner; a self starter; a phenomenal organizer who anticipates needs. He knows more Hebrew words by now than a lot of Ramaz alumni and that's not a rap on Ramaz; it's praise for Rudy. Kinos for Tisha B'Av; Megillas for the Festivals; Hagaddahs for Pesach; purchase of chametz, Machzorim for the High Holy Days; Sechach (and good weather!) for the Sukkah; a mechitza for special occasions. Long before Riva, Lenny or the rabbis are thinking about these things, Rudy has planned for them.
- 2. He has excellent technical knowledge and skill in building systems and management of his men. During the course of his twenty-five years, he has saved our institutions tens of thousands of dollars by preventive maintenance, by doing a lot of plumbing and electrical work himself and by helping us to avoid mistakes. In these days of cost-cutting, he has been of tremendous help in rescheduling his staff to get the job done right without costly overtime. He was extremely vital to the planning of the systems in the new Middle School building across the street and he is continuing that role in planning for the current renovation of our synagogue and the school buildings.
- 3. His greatest quality, however, is not his head or his mind, but his heart: his

boundless love for our shul and for our school and for the KJ/Ramaz family that he serves. He talks about "my children," "my shul," "my school." His relationship to KJ/Ramaz is like the best kind of marriage. It's not a job; it's a calling. Rudy says very often that he knows he is doing God's work and he believes he is serving God by making sure that the shul and the school function well and that the children are safe and that the people are able to daven (that's his word!). Where do you get that kind of commitment? It can't be bought. There isn't enough money in the world to pay for it. It has to come from the heart of a wonderful person who worries about everything and anything that affects our community because it's his community and it's his calling.

And so, Rudy, we want to thank you and we do so with a prayer that we recite every Shabbos morning. I say *Shabbos* because Rudy doesn't speak Sephardit; he doesn't know from *Shabbat*; he only knows *Shabbos*.

Rudy, in case you didn't get all of the Hebrew words, let me use the translation from the new Koren Prayer Book that we are about to introduce into our synagogue. In the beautiful translation of the Chief Rabbi of Great Britain, Jonathan Sacks, we pray:

May all who faithfully occupy themselves with the needs of the community be blessed by the Holy One. May He give them their reward; May He remove from them all illness, grant them complete healing, and forgive all their sins (even Rudys have sins) May He send blessing and success to all the work of their hands, together with all Israel their brethren; and let us all say: Amen.



o many kind and wonderful things have been said about me this evening, except that nobody has yet praised my skills as a public speaker. So I am glad that I won't be letting anyone down.

It seems that I am being honored in gratitude for 25 years of service on behalf

of the Shul and Ramaz. But in truth, it is I who feel gratitude because the experience of being able to serve this community has been unique for me. I work in a house which exists only for the glory of God, and I am blessed to be surrounded day after day by those who labor in His service. It is my privilege to do so.

Whether or not 25 years in this environment has earned me the right to an award is for others to say. But I DO know that the day in and day out maintenance of the Synagogue

WHAT'S SO IMPORTANT ABOUT AIPAC?

s a newlywed couple in November 2008, my husband, Yariv Ben-Ari and I wanted to become involved in an organization as a couple. We had been activists in both the Jewish and pro-Israel communities. After several conversations about which new charities to support and which organizations we wanted to be involved in together, our thoughts turned to the Jewish community and specifically to our ties to Israel.

We are strong supporters of Israel. Yariv was born of Israeli parents and raised in New York. While in high school his family moved to Israel so that he and his brother, Udi, could both serve in the Israeli army. After serving in the army and living in Israel for about ten years, Yariv and his family returned to New York.

I became fascinated with Israel and started to become observant when I was about fifteen years old. After my junior year in college, I was selected for a program called Jewish Leadership Institute (JLI), which is based in Miami, Florida, where I grew up. JLI took a group of about thirty college students from all over the U.S. to Israel for one month. The group was based in Jerusalem where we studied Torah and Jewish studies each day. Our daily program included tours of museums and other historical sites with our guide. On the weekends we traveled to different parts of Israel and enjoyed Shabbat together. It was on this incredible trip that my love for Israel flourished.

Yariv had already become involved in AIPAC and was a member of its Real Estate Committee, frequently assisting AIPAC by arranging for our law firm, Herrick, Feinstein LLP, to host AIPAC events. Incidentally, Yariv and I met at Herrick where we both practice Real Estate Law. I had attended several AIPAC events. When discussing which organizing to support as a couple, the discussion was short and the answer was immediately obvious to the both of us - AIPAC.

I joined Yariv on the Real Estate Committee of AIPAC. This is a group of supporters who are all contributing members of AIPAC and have the additional common interest of being real estate professionals. Jay Haberman is the AIPAC Area Director for Manhattan and the Real Estate Director. He quickly welcomed me as a new member of AIPAC and the Real Estate Committee.

We had heard about the AIPAC Annual Policy Conference in Washington, D.C from many sources. Friends and fellow KJ members who attended the Policy Conference in previous years told us just how powerful and energetic an event it With all the enthusiasm and excitement surrounding the conference, we quickly decided to attend. We did not really know what to expect, but when we arrived at the convention center in Washington, D.C. very early Sunday morning, May 3rd, we were completely blown away. The entire convention center was reserved for AIPAC for the three-day Policy Conference! (Just by way of comparison, the convention center in Washington, D.C. is comparable in size to the Jacob Javits Center in New York. I took the bar exam at the Jacob Javits Center along with thousands of other aspiring lawyers, and there was still more than enough room for the international jewelry convention simultaneously taking place there!)

From the moment we walked through the doors of the convention center, we knew we were in for something special. It was incredibly organized -- no small accomplishment in light of the more than 6,500 activists from all 50 states in attendance. This was a remarkable turnout, especially in a year where financial concerns are on everyone's minds.

KJ had a contingent of over 90 enthusiastic supporters. It was so wonderful to see so many of our KJ family, including Rabbi and Mrs. Lookstein, Rabbi Weinstock, and our executive director, Lenny Silverman, together with his father and brother.

After registering, we received our security passes and our hour-by-hour itineraries for the next two days. Our days were filled attending plenary meetings, indepth seminars, listening to speakers and lobbying on Capital Hill. We were able to pre-select the seminars that interested us via the internet. There were over 100 different topics of interest to consider. These seminars were conducted by ambassadors, members of the Knesset, government officials from both the U.S. and Israel, military officials, foreign policy experts, political experts, authors, lobbyists, and AIPAC professionals. The

purpose of these meetings and seminars was to continue to educate us on the problems and challenges facing Israel and to strengthen our sophistication and effectiveness in our lobbying efforts.

The Monday night Gala Banquet took place in one gigantic ballroom (actually three huge rooms opened up) with enormous monitors for all those attending the Policy Conference. The banquet was catered by our very own Foremost Caterers! This Gala Banquet had more than half of the current U.S. Senators and Congressmen in attendance. More Senators and Congressmen attend this AIPAC event than any other event in Washington, D.C., except the State of the Union address. These are people who are bombarded daily by their constituents and extremely busy with a new President, a weak economy, a war in Iraq, not to mention their other legislative work in Congress, and they voluntarily came in droves to the AIPAC banquet. No other organization in Washington, D.C., can claim the impact on Congress that AIPAC has acheived. In addition, over 250 journalists from around the world were present to cover the events inside the Convention Center. Finally, despite final exams on many campuses, 1,200 college students attended, including 193 (mostly not Jewish) Student Government Presidents. The energy and passion for Israel that such a group musters was palpable throughout the entire convention center.

The Policy Conference was also filled with world-renowned speakers, including Vice President Joe Biden, Chief of Staff Rahm Emanuel, Senate Foreign Relations Committee Chairman, Senator John Kerry, the "Number Two"s from both parties and houses (Senators Dick Durbin and Jon Kyl, and Majority Leader Steny Hoyer and Republican Whip Eric Cantor). addition, Israeli President Shimon Peres delivered a major address, and Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu (live via satellite) and Opposition Leader Tzipi Livni also spoke at the Policy Conference. Regardless of political party and affiliation, the speakers had one common message- a strong belief in the importance of re-affirming and strengthening the U.S.-Israel relationship and protecting Israel from the grave threats it faces daily to its security.

The key policy and legislative initiatives resulting from the Policy Conference were: ramping up sanctions on refined fuel to Iran through new

legislation, developing key principles for negotiations with the Palestinians that respect the historic U.S. - Israel partnership and the right of Israel to exist as a Jewish State, and assuring support for the foreign aid budget, with a special emphasis on the \$2.775 billion pledged to Israel in the 10-year Memorandum of Understanding. Immediately following the last speech, thousands of Policy Conference delegates went to Capitol Hill where they and our lobbying agenda were welcomed in 508 separate Senate and House offices. (There are only 535 offices in all.) This is yet another indication of AIPAC's strength and impact on Washington.

The AIPAC Policy Conference is informative, uplifting, meaningful and purposeful, and it had a significant impact on Yariv and me. We look forward to getting more involved in AIPAC and to strengthening our deep connection to Israel. Most importantly, we look forward to welcoming you to next year's Policy Conference, where Yariv and I can show you the ropes and introduce you to the magic that is the AIPAC conference. You won't regret it!

UJA-Reaches Out to Middle and Upper Income Families Hit by the Recession One Point of Entry for Employment Services, Financial Assistance, Legal Aid, and Emotional Support

In this recession, many Jewish individuals who have enjoyed a lifetime of financial security suddenly find themselves making hard choices as they worry about paying the mortgage, affording day school tuition, or retiring without savings or secure investments.

The experience can be overwhelming. That's why UJA-Federation recently launched Connect-to-Care, an initiative whose primary purpose is to create a single point of entry for a full array of economic-related services:

Employment and career-transition services, including job networking opportunities, and career seminars

Financial consultation, debt counseling, and budget assistance

Legal services for those with mortgage and foreclosure problems

Supportive counseling and Jewish spiritual care.

With one simple call or email, Jewish individuals impacted by the economic crisis can access the Manhattan Connect to Care Center, where they will be carefully guided to one or more services offered through the Jewish Board of Children and Family Services, FEGS, and the New York Legal Assistance Group (NYLAG). The Manhattan center is one of seven regional centers that encompass Queens, Brooklyn, Staten Island, Nassau County, Suffolk County, and Westchester County.

The program is specifically designed to help individuals and families who may have never needed financial or counseling assistance before, especially those who have been devastated by job loss or seeing their once seemingly secure investments evaporate in the stock market.

YOM HASHOAH COMMEMORATED ON APRIL 20

s is KJ's tradition, the Yom Hashoah program began with a very moving candle lighting ceremony for all survivors of the Holocaust and their descendants. This set the tone for the rest of the evening, which in addition to

very moving songs by the Ramaz Upper School Chamber Choir and the Ramaz Adult Community Chorus, also included poetry readings by Ramaz Middle School students. Also featured was a brief dramatic monologue by Ramaz Upper School freshman Lily

Shoretz. She portrayed Deborah E. Lipstadt, Professor of Modern Jewish and Holocaust Studies at Emory University and author of Denying the Holocaust: The Growing Assault on Truth and Memory. Professor Lipstadt was sued for libel by British right-wing author and Holocaust denier David Irving because she referred



to him as "one of the most dangerous spokespersons of the Holocaust denial movement." Lily's absorbing performance captured the drama of the trial in the British courts that attracted worldwide attention as well as the emotion which came with the judgment in Professor Lipstadt's favor.

Our special guest that evening was Louise Von Dardel, the niece of the most famous Righteous Gentile, Raoul Wallenberg. He attained the collective gratitude of Jews worldwide by saving thousands of Hungarian Jews from the death camps. He vanished into the Soviet penal system in 1945, never to be heard from again. Ms. Von Dardel spoke of the futile search that has consumed the Wallenberg family for generations and the toll it took on all his relatives.

Joining Ms. Dardel that evening was Joshua Prager (Ramaz '89), a journalist at the Wall Street Journal, whose recently published article *The Wallenberg Curse: The Search for the Missing Holocaust Hero Began in 1945. The Unending Quest Tore His Family Apart* has shed considerable light on the consequences of Raoul Wallenberg's disappearance.
