SHIVAH ASSAR B'TAMMUZ, TISHA B'AV AND THE THREE WEEKS JULY 19 - AUGUST 9

uring the summer months, we mourn the destruction of both Temples in Jerusalem, which took place on the ninth of Av, and the events that led to their destruction. We fast on the seventeenth day of the month of Tammuz, Shivah Assar B'Tammuz, because, according to tradition, it was on that day that the enemy penetrated the walls of Jerusalem prior to the destruction of the Second Temple. The Talmud, however, writes that these were not the only tragedies that befell the Jewish people on this day. On the seventeenth of Tammuz four more tragedies occurred: the first tablets containing the Ten Commandments were broken by Moses after the sin of the Golden Calf; the daily sacrifice was suspended during the time of the First Temple; the wicked Apostumos burned the Torah; and an idol was erected in the Temple.


Additional tragedies also befell the Jewish people on the ninth day of the month of Av - Tisha B'Av. On this day, the spies

(meraglim) returned to the Jews in the desert with a negative report about the Land of Israel. In addition, it was on this day that the city of Betar was destroyed and tens of thousands of Jews were killed, and the wicked Turnus Rufus plowed the site of the Temple and its surroundings. Tradition asserts that the expulsion of the Jews from England in 1290 and the expulsion from Spain in 1492 also took place on Tisha B'Av.

Our mourning for the destroyed Temples and for the other calamities which occurred on these days extends beyond the fasts themselves. The period between these two fasts, traditionally called The Three Weeks, includes several practices of mourning. During these three weeks we do not get our hair cut, attend weddings or involve ourselves in large joyous gatherings. During the nine days which begin on the first of Av, August 1, and continue until midday on the tenth day of Av, August 10, we are additionally

forbidden to eat meat and drink wine (except on Shabbat), to go swimming, or bathe for pleasure and to do any laundry or dry cleaning that is not absolutely necessary. The Talmud writes that when the month of Av begins, our mood should reflect our mourning for the destruction of the Temples. On Tisha B'Av itself, besides fasting, we are prohibited from washing our bodies, wearing leather shoes, anointing ourselves and having marital relations. It is forbidden, as well, to study Torah on this day excepting the sections of the prophets and the Talmud that discuss the destruction. We do not wear tefillin until Mincha and the custom is to sit on low chairs as mourners do until midday. Our observance of mourning also forbids us from greeting friends on Tisha B'Av.

We mourn the Temples that were destroyed over nineteen hundred years ago, and we pray that we will be worthy to see God rebuild the Temple our lifetime.

Keter Torah Awards Bestowed Upon

At the conclusion of the morning service on the second day of Shavuot, Gabriella Major Desdner and Susan Blinken were presented by Rabbi Haskel Lookstein with the Eighth Annual Judith Kaufman Hurwich Keter Torah Award.

These are their remarks:

A TORAH WAY OF LIFE

n the one hand I feel like I am giving my Bat Mitzvah speech that I never had, and on the other as though I am accepting a coveted Oscar. The truth is that this Keter Torah Award, which I am absolutely humbled by, cannot be compared to any other type of award. First of all, my predecessors who received it were wonderfully deserving and very special, great Jewish women and so is my partner, Susan Blinken. Mazel Tov to you, Susan!

Therefore, I am honored and very grateful to stand here on our very special Yom Tov, Shavuot, in our makeshift but beautiful synagogue.

Being that it is Shavuot, Z'man Matan Torahteinu, I have been thinking about how much my family's life has been connected to the Torah.

The Babylonian Talmud Tractate Shabbat Page 88a states:

And they stood at the foot of the mountain; Rav Avdimi bar Hama bar Hasa said, this teaches that the Holy one Blessed be He held the mountain over them like an overturned tub and told them: "if you accept the Torah-well and fine; otherwise, you will be buried right here."

How is it that the Talmud tells us that the Jewish people did not accept the Torah, but it was forced upon them? Where is the choice here? Choice is not as important as it may sound. Hashem forcing the Torah on the Jewish people can be compared to all the circumstances life throws on us that we do not get to choose. However, we do have the choice as to how to live up to our obligations. We also learn that the Torah is so central to our lives that without it the world would turn to chaos.

So now I am going to attempt to show you how the Torah has been so central to my family's life. And how, despite whatever circumstances life handed us, particularly those we did not choose, (like the children of Israel at Sinai, who had the Torah forced upon them), we struggled to live up to our responsibilities, to choose to keep the Torah central to our lives, despite all of life's challenges and quite often against all odds.

As many of you may know, I was born in Debrecen, Hungary. I was 2 years old in 1944 when my mother, grandmother and I were deported to a concentration camp near Vienna, Austria. It was not a gas camp, but it had all the other terrible

features, like shaving off my beautiful

curls. My concentration camp experience reminds me of

the story of Ruth. My mother could have hidden me in the village but could not have been able to hide my grandmother. So as Ruth said to Naomi, she said to my grandmother: I will go with you. Wherever you we'll go... She unfortunately died in the My mother

camp. My mother was incredible. Working in construction on rooftops in bone-chilling cold weather, she pushed to keep me alive, to get me a piece of bread. Her courage, her will power, and determination were mostly responsible for my life.

Miraculously, we were reunited with my father, who, unbeknownst to us, worked in a labor camp My parents lost most of their close families (parents, siblings, nieces, nephews, in-law's.). From the ashes they rebuilt and slowly reestablished their lives in Hungary. These years were during the Communist era when Jews gave up their religion for one reason or another unless they were Chassidic Jews. However, we continued to keep a strictly Kosher home (we needed to travel almost an hour to buy Kosher meat). My father, since he no longer had his own business, had to work on Shabbat, as everyone else did in order to survive. However, he went every Shabbos morning to a Hashkama Minyan at 6 AM and then walked over an hour to work and an hour back. Since there was no Jewish elementary school any more, I was hometaught to read Hebrew, to daven and everything about the Shabbat, the Holidays, etc. by my mother and father.

We continued life in this manner until the outbreak of the Hungarian revolution in 1956, when we had an opportunity to escape Communism (another threat) and flee to the free world so that I could grow up as a young Jewish girl (until then I had no Jewish friends because most Jewish kids my age did not survive) and live in a free country where we could practice Judaism to the fullest extent without any fear

Although emigrating without any financial means, knowledge of the English language or marketable professions for my parents was very tough, the eventual benefits and results have been very positive and heartwarming for my family.

We settled in New York and luckily my shul has been KJ from the very first Shabbat in America. Our shul has truly been home for me and my family.

My parents, thank God, had the *z'chut* to see me marry a wonderful person, a religious Jew, a physician We established, thank God, a wonderful family. My father's greatest *naches* was to see our children receive a Jewish education at Ramaz and have each one spend a year of Torah study in Israel. My late husband, Willy, *zichrono livracha* - or Papa to the grandchildren - was an ardent Zionist, who just loved learning Torah and spending all the time he could in Israel.

Living a Torah way of life, having *menschlichkeit*, ethical and moral values, were the key tenets which were strongly etched into our lives. Thank God, together

A CULTURE OF KINDNESS

t is a great honor and privilege to be the co-recipient, along with Gabriella Major Dresdner, of this year's Judith Kaufman Hurwich Keter Torah award.

In accepting this award, I want to acknowledge and thank the true Keter Torah, or crown of Torah, in this community, the exemplary group of women who comprise and do the work of the KJ Sisterhood with continuing acts of kindness. And how appropriate it is to discuss kindness on Shavuot!

The Midrash asks, why was the book of Ruth written? The answer, the midrash says, is solely because of the acts of kindness described in the Megillah. These acts of kindness demonstrated thousands of years ago, are mirrored every single day in our KJ community.

When I became Sisterhood President five years ago, I thought, "How will I ever follow and match the acts of chesed of my predecessors?"

My two personal missions during my presidency, were: to continue their legacy with acts of kindness large and small; and, to incorporate the concept of Repairing the World, or *tikun olam*, into as many of the Sisterhood's activities as possible.

The accomplishments of our Sisterhood rest not with me alone, but with the extraordinary group of women, both on our board and in our community, who continually step up to the plate, volunteer and make what we do successful. The honor and privilege of serving this community has been all mine.

Being Sisterhood President, was the best non-paying job I've ever had. And, I have been truly blessed here, by having made lifelong friendships. Just as Naomi guided and mentored Ruth, I have been the beneficiary of guidance, counsel and tremendous mentorship by the women of this community, as I now have the pleasure of mentoring others.

My term as President was supposed to be for just two years, but in the absence of a willing candidate, I eagerly agreed to commit to a second term.

On Erev Rosh Hashana, shortly after making that commitment, I was diagnosed with a serious health issue. I was prepared to step down, concerned that my situation would compromise my ability to serve the Sisterhood. But Rabbi and Audrey Lookstein encouraged me to stay on. I believe this was a huge act of chesed, and their unfailing support provided me with purpose and the perfect distraction I desperately needed at that time. So I dug my heels in and got to work.

Their act of kindness kept me positive and focused throughout my illness and more importantly, their kindness gave me an opportunity. By continuing as president, I was able to do something for others, while so many in this community were doing things for me.

I experienced acts of kindness all around me. Especially by my family, the jewels in my personal Keter Torah.

My husband Robert, or as Rabbi Lookstein likes to call him, "the Regent Prince of the Sisterhood." But he is so



much more than that. Robert is the one who leads by example in our family. He maintains the highest form of integrity in all that he does, and lives his life doing perpetual acts of kindness every day for others. He is a model of true courage when caving is not an option. He is my guiding light.

I am grateful for my children: my daughter Alexandra, my son, Jared and my son in law, Mordechai Lerner. Alexandra's love of learning and knowledge of Torah and Tanach have taught me so much and given me a free Ramaz education in the process. Mordechai treats my daughter, his wife, and new baby with *kavod* and kindness every day.

Jared's curiosity continues to challenge us and make us laugh every day with his insights about the world around him.

My personal guiding lights -- my own Naomi, Aunt Naomi Bernstein, and my stepmother Karen Lazarowitz -- watch over us all. My father Jerry, who will be 80 years old next week, carries the eternal flame of collective worry for our entire family. And the new light in my life is my new born grandson Eliyahu Meir Lerner. What joy awaits me when I can start to do small and large kindnesses for him.

This evening, marks the 19th anniversary of my mother Elaine Lazarowitz's yarzheit. She was a wonderful role model - a woman who showed me what courage, grace, and resilience in the face of adversity truly means.

I am especially grateful for the legacy left by my maternal grandparents, Jean and Izzy Goldman, who lived by the credo, "Say little, do a lot" and who practiced doing so much for others and showed me how to try and do the same.

The legacy we leave behind is defined by our deeds and actions over a lifetime. My goal is to walk in the ways of Ruth, and show a measure of *her* resilience in the face of adversity, *her* determination, *her* grace under pressure; and most of all, *her* deep abiding love for family. Ruth faced challenges and came out the other side of her ordeal to merit being the progenitor of the line of King David.

As I stand here humbled, in awe of Ruth, and look around this congregation, I realize how, in the course of my life, during times of great joys and great sorrows this community has been a beacon of *gemilut chesed* for me and my family.

In a sense, the essence of *this* community is defined by its culture of kindness. And as the principle of *tikun olam* teaches us: "One small kindness for our community, is one giant kindness in repairing the world." My wish is that together, we continue to be bestowers of acts of kindness, as Ruth, Naomi and Boaz were, so long ago.

A CONTEMPLATION

Isaac Pollak, KJ's "Volunteer of the Year" shares his thoughts on this important mitzvah.

how me the manner in which a nation cares for its dead and I will measure with mathematical exactness the tender mercies of its people," observed William Gladstone, the British statesman. People who have learned how to care tenderly for the bodies of the dead are almost surely people who also know how to show mercy to the bodies of the living.

I believe what we do embodies that philosophy, perhaps even epitomizes it.

Take a walk back with me 1700 years ago and listen to how all this started.

In approximately 310-320 CE, Rav Hamnuna arrives one morning in the town of Duramatha (Harta or Argiz, currently a suburb of Baghdad) and hears the sound of a funerary horn, announcing that someone has died. When he sees that the citizens of the town continue their vocations and avocations he angrily denounces them.

"Don't you know," he tells the townspeople, "that the duty of arranging for the disposal of the dead devolved upon and involved the entire community and all activities need to cease?"

The townspeople respond, "Chavruta ika bashuka." There is a chevra, a group or fraternity charged with this duty. Upon hearing this Rav Hamnuna permitted the townspeople to go back to their activities. However what exactly this chavruta was charged with doing is not specified.

The next mention of a similar chevra is approximately 300 years later where we are told (Masachet Semachot) that some chavrot go to the "gathering of bones," likud atzumath. In what is referred to as Greco-Roman times, bodies were put in a cave or on a hollowed out rock shelf. Twelve months later, when the body had decomposed, the bones were gathered and put into an ossuary or osophogi; a limestone container (called a Gluskama in the Talmud) and a day of mourning was held, as that which motivated sin, the flesh, is now gone, and the soul can now rise to another level. The Yahrzeit we observe today is traced to this day of likud atzumot, or bone gathering, as well as the tradition to erect a tombstone a year after death.

It wasn't until the year 1626, when Rav Aron Berachia of Modena compiled the *Maavar Yavuk*, that we finally have for the first time the exact details of what one does at a *tahara* and what prayers accompany the process: A *tahara* is the process of washing and cleaning the body, going through the Mikvah process and dressing it in shrouds. There are no *tahara halachot*, but rather, a set of tenets that have evolved over the centuries.

I would like to share some personal observations in no particular order about being involved with *Chevra Kadisha* work for over three decades.

DEATH AS AN EQUALIZER

Chapter 2 in *Malachim Alef* (Kings I) starts with the following sentence:

ויקרבו ימי-דוד למות

"Now the days of David grew near that he should die." Just a few sentences earlier in the previous chapter he was

והמלך דוד זקן

"And King David was old," but as he nears his final days, he is referred to only as David and the title "King" no longer applies. When we approach death we can no longer hide behind titles and status; we are all equal in the eyes of our Creator.

When we uncover the body at the beginning of a *tahara*, everybody has the same status. The learned or the unlettered.

William Gladstone is only echoing what we have been doing for the previous 1800 years.



"It's only death and it's happened to everyone that has ever lived," quipped Benjamin Franklin, adding his famous phrase,"In this world nothing can be said to be certain except death and taxes." And in the 21st century, if Benjamin Franklin were alive today he would have added, "Don't forget to cancel your credit cards before you die."

A story to illustrate: A woman died in January 2009. Citibank billed her in February (and March) for their annual service charges on her credit card, and added late fees and interest onto the monthly charge! The balance was \$0 when she died, but that turned into \$60, so a family member placed a call to Citibank.

Here is the exchange:

Family Member: "I am calling to tell you she died back in January."

Citibank: "The account was never closed so the late fees and charges still apply."

Family Member: "Maybe you should turn it over to Collections."

Citibank: "Since the account is two months past due, it already has been."

Family Member: "So, what will they do when they find out she is dead?"

Citibank: "Either report her account to the Frauds Division or report her to the Credit Bureau, maybe both!"

OF THE CHEVRA KADISHA

Family Member: "Do you think God will be mad at her?"

Citibank: "Excuse me?"

Family Member: "Did you get what I was just telling you, the part about her being dead?"

Citibank: "Sir, you'll have to speak to my supervisor!"

Supervisor gets on the phone:

Family Member: "I'm calling to tell you she died back in January with a \$0.00 balance."

Citibank: "The account was never closed so late fees and charges still apply."

Family Member: "You mean you want to collect from her estate?"

Citibank: (stammer) "Are you her lawyer?"

Family Member: "No, I'm her greatnephew." (Lawyer info was given)

Citibank: "Could you fax us a Death Certificate?"

Family Member: "Sure." (Fax number was given)

After they get the fax:

Citibank: "Our system isn't set up for death; I don't know what more I can do to help."

Family Member: "Well, if you figure it out, great! If not, you could just keep billing her; she won't care."

Citibank: "Well, the late fees and charges will still apply..."

(What is wrong with these people?)

Family Member: "Would you like her new billing address?"

Citibank: "That might help."

Family Member: "Odessa Memorial Cemetery, Highway 129, Plot Number 69."

Citibank: "Sir, that's a cemetery!"

Family Member: "And what do you do with dead people on your planet?"

(Absolutely priceless!)

And we wondered why Citibank was going broke and needed the Feds to bail them out!

AWARENESS OF SELF

Every one of us who has done *taharas* has a story that has touched him or her in a unique way, and this is one of mine that I would like to share with you.

Approximately 15 years ago, I was in

Hong Kong when, after Shacharit one morning, the Rabbi asked if anyone had any Chevra Kadisha experience and would be available to help in a complicated Tahara later that afternoon. I volunteered. A young Israeli engineering student in his early 30s had died of a blood disease and the local rules mandated that the blood had to be drained from the body. It was then to be refilled with embalming fluid and sealed. Only then could we clothe the body in shrouds before it could be shipped back to Israel in a sealed coffin for burial. All this had to take place in a special government hospital under Chinese medical supervision with an attending doctor from the Israeli embassy. It took about four hours and when it was over I just walked for a long time and couldn't concentrate on work that evening.

This young, very handsome man is often in my mind, especially on the seventh day of Adar, when I recite Tehilim in his memory and others for whom I have



performed a Tahara in the previous 12 months. In situations such as this, life is suddenly thrust into the forefront. Life is more savory. It's as if we were saved from imminent danger. I struggle to find the right words to express this.

You see yourself in a new and intense way. You rediscover yourself with a certain clarity. In a way, you are able to see who you are for the first time, outside familiar surroundings, alone, distinct, whole. You feel the texture of life as you would feel the texture of material that you would rub between your fingers. Your self-awareness of life is raised to a higher level.

When this happens, your day is different, your frenzied schedule of multitasking takes on a different hue, your kids and your wife get extra hugs and kisses, and, when you look around you and say "Thank God." You say it with a quiet

intensity that was not there previously.

I would sometimes come home exhausted and drenched from a late night Tahara, tiptoe into my kids' room and just lay down next to one of them and listen to their gentle breathing for a while and let the rhythm of life settle about me.

We become very vulnerable, especially if the *tahara* was on a young child, or a teenager, or on the person who sat next to you yesterday in shul; but this vulnerability enables us to be empowered. It may tear us apart, but it may reassemble us in ways that astonish. So I ask myself, "Who is doing a *chesed* and who has a *chesed* done to him?" More on this subject in a moment.

YOUR CHEVRA KADISHA MEMBERS

Approximately 33 years ago there was a call to set up a *Chevra Kadisha* at KJ. A year later I joined. Rabbi Israel Rosenberg was our teacher and guide. The very first time I attended -never having seen, much

less handled a dead body- Dr. Mortimer Blumenthal AH, in his own gentle way, literally took me by the hand, told me to stay close to him. He hovered over me constantly monitoring me to be sure I was OK. Martin Rochlin AH, was always there in those early days with vim and

passion, full of heart and voice. No task was too difficult for him, and sometimes what we do is quite difficult. Mordie Mann AH, who almost never missed a *tahara* and, even in his 80s, insisted on coming and helping in whatever way he could. There were those among others who have helped us for longer or shorter time periods including Dr. Larry Steinberg, Harvey Geisler, Eugene Roshwalb, Dr. Danny Potaznik, Michael Jesselson, Alan Brown, and our very own Rabbi Haskel Lookstein.

We tend to keep in the background and remain quiet about our activities. But I am accepting this honor for our members and you should know who they are. I often think that what defines us is what we are willing to give of ourselves and, ladies and gentlemen, these folks have given and given.

Here is what happens: A call from the

synagogue alerts us that a tahara is needed and a Yahoo group e-mail is sent to our members. Responses come within minutes with their availability and a mutually convenient time is scheduled among us and the funeral home, ideally as close as possible to the time the of the funeral It sounds simple, but we all have commitments and working spouses and children and schedules, and death doesn't come on schedule. I often tell people: Don't die during Pesach or the week sandwiched between Christmas and New Year's. I have had both my sons (Zamir and Ovadya) participate in a tahara when they were as young as 15, when they were needed; especially during Pesach.

Within minutes we put it together, and everyone is willing to make a sacrifice and give of themselves. One person drives one and one-half hours from a weekend in the Hamptons, participates in the *tahara*, and drives back; another opens his Blackberry during intermissionat the theater with clients, leaves his clients with his wife and grabs a taxi to meet us at the funeral home; and yet another, while en route to a milestone graduation, has the taxi change routes so he could participate in the *tahara* of a young man who died in his sleep leaving three young children.

Please meet these very special

members of the Men's C h e v r aKadisha. Benjamin Brown, 33 vears; Dr. Robert Podell, over vears; Kenneth Rochlin, 20



years; Samuel Attias, 16 years; Jay Lunzer, 15 years; Larry Adolf,12 years; Isaac Hoffman, 9 years; Jonathan Hornblass, 9 years; Morris Massel, 3 years; Larry Present, 3 years; Benjamin Rubin, 2 years; Rabbi Josh Lookstein, 2 years; Aaron Gordon, 2 years.

Of course, let us not forget the Women's *Chevra Kadisha*, so capably run by Sue Robins and Tova Bulow for 28 years, with dedicated members who also perform *taharas* in a most selfless fashion.

וכל מי שעוסקים בצוכי צבור באמונה הקדוש ברוך הוא ישלם שכרם

"And all those who faithfully occupy themselves with the needs of the community. May the Holy One, blessed be He, give them their reward. May He remove from them all illness, grant them complete healing, and forgive all their sins. May He send blessing and success to all the work of their hands, Amen."

A VERY PERSONAL OBSERVATION

And when the time came for Israel to die he summoned his son Joseph and said:

שים–נא ידך תחת ירכי ועשית עמדי חסד ואמת

"Do me this favor, place your hand under my thigh as a pledge of your steadfast loyalty and kindness - a true kindness, please do not bury me in Egypt."

Jewish tradition defines true kindness as a good deed for which there is no reciprocal favor -- such as tending to the needs of the dead. (I have often pondered the inherent contradiction of *chesed* and *emet*. At times the epitome of *chesed* is not to be truthful; perhaps a discussion for another time.) The dead cannot thank you, and there is no earthly reward. (And as a *Chevra Kadisha* colleague quipped, "Neither can they complain of poor

service.") Adherence to this sacred practice is one reason why the volunteer burial society in a community is known as *Chevra Kadisha*, the Sacred Society.

WHO IS DOING THE CHESED TO WHOM?

While the traditional meaning is that the person doing the *tahara* is doing the *chesed*, after many years and having performed many *taharas*, I would like to think that this *chesed* goes both ways. Let me explain: In Tehilim 89 we read:

חסדי יהוה עולם אשירה, כי אמרתי, עולם חסד יבנה,

"Of Hashem's kindness I will sing forever for I said, 'Forever will [Your] kindness be built."

Maimonides suggests that this tells us that the world is built on *chesed*. None of us could have done anything to earn the gifts of life and consciousness. God owes us nothing, yet chose to bring us into this world and thus give us something. We are a religion of gratitude; our day starts with *Modeh Ani*, grateful am "I" before You. We don't say *Ani Modeh*, "I" am grateful, perhaps suggesting that there is no self, there is no "I" without gratitude, and that one does not become human until "I" gratitude is conveyed.

Having received an inestimable gift of *chesed*, we are called upon to bestow *chesed* ourselves and this is the way we walk in God's ways. By creating human beings in His image, God has chosen to need us. We are called upon to help narrow the enormous gap between the Real, where human dignity is often trampled upon in countless ways, and the Ideal, where the presence of God is manifest

I often see our work as helping to bridge this gap. In the process we are the recipients of *chesed*. We appreciate life in a different manner. Anyone who has done a *tahara* never sees life the same way. We get so much more than what we give. We appreciate so much more what we have.

Our work is somber (there is no conversation during a *tahara*), even sad, and often very difficult, but it is neither discouraging nor depressing. "A good death and a good funeral," writes Thomas Lynch, a poet and undertaker, "is one that gets the dead where they need to go and the living where they need to be."

May God give the members of our Men's and Women's *Chevra Kadisha*, and all holy societies, the strength to persist in their efforts and may we have as few opportunities as possible to demonstrate the inspiring ability to combine the attributes of *chesed* and *emeth.*. Thank you for listening to me about a grave subject we tend to avoid. I can only echo the words of the great Rabbi Akiba, who concluded a funeral with the words, *Lech La'batachim La Shalom*. Go to your homes in peace.

THE NEXT AIPAC GENERATION SPEAKS

This year's AIPAC reporters, Sammy Major (Ramaz '11) and Jonathan Deluty (Ramaz '12) were two of more than 10,000 pro-Israel activists from all 50 states who attended the recent AIPAC Policy Conference in Washington, D.C. - the largest in AIPAC's history. Here, they weigh in on some of the issues that are front and center when discussing the U.S. Israel relationship.



hen you hear something enough times, you begin to believe its true, no matter how absurd and false you know it to be. That's one of the biggest challenges I, as a pro-Israel advocate, face. We've heard those key phrases too many times: apartheid (if you type in apartheid in a Google search engine, "apartheid Israel" is the fifth option that

pops up, and the only country), human rights violations, occupation, and so on. We've heard so many times how Israel is guilty of these crimes that we've stopped being outraged every time we hear it. We've stopped being surprised. Maybe we've even started to believe it, not because we think we've been told the truth, but just because we've heard it so many times that there's got to be some truth behind it, right?

This is the danger we face. To forget how wrong Israel's detractors are. To forget why we defend Israel.

Yes, we all have our subjective, personal reasons for loving Israel. My family spends time in Israel at least once a year. I will be there next year, studying in Yeshiva.

But it's more than that. We defend Israel because, objectively, it's the right thing to do. Israel is the only country in the Middle East that shares the core democratic values of the United States. The values that we cherish as Americans, and the values we cherish as human beings.

"America's commitment to Israel's security flows from a deeper place, and that's the values we share." Those are not my words, but the words of President Obama. "As two vibrant democracies, we recognize that the liberties and freedoms we cherish must be constantly nurtured."

These shared values are the basis of the relationship between our two countries. But those who criticize and condemn Israel work day and night to shatter this invaluable relationship that benefits both countries.

That's why it's my job - and yours, too - to do everything we can to ensure that the bond between the United States and Israel remains iron clad. That means meeting with members of Congress and educating them on these issues. Believe it or not, not everyone is as aware of the facts regarding Israel as those of us in our little silver box. Last year, at the end of the AIPAC policy conference, instead of meeting with my representatives I went to meetings with members of Congress that had only a few people going. These senators and congressmen have few pro-Israel constituents in their districts, so they do not have the same awareness regarding Israel as, for example, a senator from New York. They do not have the awareness we'd like them to have; they do not have the awareness we need them to have.

I met with one congressman's chief of staff who, because of other issues at the time, did not know the basic facts regarding the U.S.- Israel relationship. He didn't know why foreign aid is beneficial to both countries. He didn't know why stopping Iran from achieving nuclear capability was not only a priority, but a necessity, for both our countries. I did the best I could to explain to this staffer why these issues are so important for both the U.S. and Israel. And I'll keep doing it. And I'll keep thanking my representatives for their continued support for Israel and the U.S.-Israel relationship because I know how important that relationship is. I know that my voice, and my vote, counts just as much as the next one. And I know that if I use my voice, not only to convince members of congress, but to convince you to do the same, then our combined voice will be louder than that of those trying to destroy the bond between the U.S. and Israel. Because of my love and appreciation for both the United States and Israel, it is vital that I, along with each and every one of you, own up to my responsibility to defend Israel and ensure that the United States and Israel remain partners in spreading peace and prosperity.

ecently, Rabbi Yossi Weiser forwarded a column to me from the Washington Post, written by Charles Krauthammer, the well known, Pulitzer Prize winning syndicated columnist, political commentator, and physician.. It is heavily critical of President Obama's speech regarding the 1967 lines, but while reading it, one line in particular really struck me, and I

think it is a very valid point. Not specifically directed at President Obama, Krauthammer writes: "The very idea that Judaism's holiest shrine is alien or that Jerusalem's Jewish Quarter is rightfully or historically Arab is an absurdity. And the idea that, in order to retain them, Israel has to give up parts of itself is a travesty." Regardless of political views, on this day, we Jews have an obligation to remember that there are powerful forces out there trying to wrest from us our holiest site, the Temple Mount.

I was privileged to have the opportunity to be a part of the Ramaz delegation that attended the AIPAC policy conference in Washington, D.C. Firstly, I think it is more important than anything else to discuss what unites America and Israel, not what divides the countries. When our President delivers a speech in which he calls the bond between the United States and Israel "unbreakable," we can all rest assured that he means it. Many people may not know this, but American and Israeli security cooperation today is at an all-time high. That means that under the Obama administration, Israel receives more foreign aid from America than ever before. In fact, the Obama administration just recently gave Israel \$200 million dollars to fund its Iron Dome defense system. I encourage all of you to watch some of the footage online of the Iron Dome shooting down a rocket from Gaza in midair. When I saw it, my jaw dropped and I beamed with pride at my two countries. To know that my voice is heard when I lobby for this type of defense for Israel humbles me and fills me with gratitude towards this amazing country we live in. Oh and just something worth noting: since the Iron Dome was implemented last month, it has shot down 9 out of 10 Hamas rockets. That is a historic number, and something we should definitely take pride in.

At the Conference, the catch phrase that could be heard repeatedly was "we need to ensure the strong U.S-Israel relationship." And we didn't just hear this from AIPAC officials or strictly pro-Israel lobbyists. We heard this from President Obama, Speaker John Boehner, Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid, House Majority leader Eric Cantor, and the like. To hear the constant stream of pro-Israel rhetoric, to hear the calls for the release of Gilad Shalit, to hear the calls for Hamas to renounce terror, to hear the call for defensible borders for Israel; all of this reassured me that our country stands strong with Israel and will never forsake the Jewish state.

The moment that really solidified my trip, however, was not an official part of the conference. I was sitting with Ethan Fried in the convention center, waiting to lobby my Senator, Robert

Menendez, to sign onto the bill to provide \$3 billion in critical aid to Israel, when all of the TVs in the convention center turned to C-Span and showed Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu about to address Congress. That speech really encompassed what that trip was all about for me. The Prime Minister spoke very strongly to those elements that give Israel its Jewish character, and solidified why we American Jews support Israel. He said: "In Judea and Samaria, the Jewish people are not foreign occupiers. We are not the British in India. We are not the Belgians in the Congo. This is the land of our forefathers, the Land of Israel, to which Abraham brought the idea of one God, where David set out to confront Goliath, and where Isaiah saw a vision of eternal peace. No distortion of history can deny the four thousand year old bond, between the Jewish people and the Jewish land."

What was the Congressional response to this seemingly controversial statement? A thunderous standing ovation. The recognition of our connection to our land is respected in the United States unlike any other country in the world. I attended a session on the Global delegitimization of Israel. I learned that in Great Britain, Great Britain, the most modern country in Europe, it is considered politically courageous for a politician to stand before his constituents and say "I respect the right of Israel to exist." That's it? That's courage? That's the equivalent of me saying "I respect the right of the United States to exist." It means nothing, and yet that basic statement is considered courageous in even the most progressive liberal democracies. I am proud to say this: not the case in America. We in this country recognize the Jewish right to its ancestral homeland.

On the critical issue of Jerusalem, Prime Minister Netanyahu said this: "As for Jerusalem, only a democratic Israel has protected freedom of worship for all faiths in the city. Jerusalem must never again be divided. Jerusalem must remain the united capital of Israel." The response? Another standing ovation! Prime Minister Netanyahu, a foreign leader, received 26 standing ovations. This country has recognized that Jerusalem is not a settlement. It's our capital.

In light of this speech, Krauthammer's words ring even truer. Jerusalem is the capital of our great Jewish nation, and nobody will take that away from us. AIPAC policy conference was able to show me that because we live in such a great and free nation, we will continue to foster the U.S.-Israel relationship, and we will have the political support necessary to protect our small Jewish country and our eternal capital, Jerusalem.





UJA: PROGRAMS FOR KJ PEOPLE OF ALL AGES





The film is an intimate story that follows the day-to-day efforts of the family of abducted Israeli soldier Gilad Shalit to cope and bring Gilad home. This heartbreaking film provided unprecedented access to the

Shalit family, and showed

how private and anonymous individuals like Gilad rise to become national symbols. At the outset of the program, a poem was read aloud to the audience written by a student in the Shaindy Rudoff Creative Writing Program at Bar Ilan University. The poem

was provided by Judy Rudoff. It is entitled "Paris Square, Jerusalem," and describes the agony of Aviva Shalit, sitting in a tent near the Prime Minister's office in Jerusalem awaiting news of her son.

Yeshiva University Appoints KJ Associate Rabbi Meir Soloveichik Director of Newly Established Zahava and Moshael Straus Center for Torah and Western Thought

Yeshiva University President Richard M. Joel announced the creation of the new Zahava and Moshael Straus Center for Torah and Western Thought. The center's mission is to develop a cadre of Jewish thinkers well-versed in the great moral, philosophical and theological questions of our age while disseminating genuinely Jewish ideas to the world.

While its primary focus will be serving students, the Zahava and Moshael Straus Center for Torah and Western Thought will also serve to enhance YU's role as "an intellectual catalyst and beacon for all Jews," Rabbi Soloveichik explained. To this end, the center will host, throughout the academic year, public forums at the University's various campuses that address great human questions that have engaged Jewish and non-Jewish thinkers. Visiting faculty will be invited to participate in these events and to teach in the student courses. In the first year, many of the center's programs, as well as much of the student coursework, will relate to the theme "Biblical Ideas and American Democracy."

Moreover, the center will stage a series of one-day learning events in Jewish communities throughout the U.S., Europe and Israel. These symposia and lectures will promote ideas-focused conversations about Jewish life and the Jewish future across the generations. "Ultimately, the goal of the Straus Center is not just to deepen our understanding of Judaism," Rabbi Soloveichik said, "but also to help us understand how Jewish ideas have, and can continue to, profoundly impact the world."

THE KILLING FIELDS OF EASTERN EUROPE

ather Patrick Desbois, president of Yahad-In Unum, has devoted his life to confronting anti-Semitism and furthering Catholic-Jewish understanding. Since 2001, he has led a truly historic undertaking of identifying and locating undiscovered mass graves of Jews killed during the Holocaust in Eastern Europe.

In less than two years, from June 1941 until the spring of 1943, an estimated 1.25 million Jews were massacred in the Soviet Union by the Nazi Einsatzgruppen. The Jewish populations of whole villages were slaughtered in hours; entire regions were annihilated in an afternoon. Unlike in the concentration camps, there were few survivors to tell the world what had happened.

As KJ's guest speaker at the annual Yom Hashoah observance on May 1, he spoke movingly about visiting small villages across the Ukraine and Eastern Europe to interview the residents there who witnessed the killings. Many of those he interviews have never before spoken of the massacres, but they respond to his status as a Catholic priest. One grave at a time, Father Desbois, is unmasking what was a continent of extermination. To further refute the claims of Holocaust deniers, at each site artifacts are collected and most significantly, video testimonies are recorded from eyewitnesses. These invaluable testimonies, which serve as important evidence of this genocide, are archived in Yahad-In Unum's Paris headquarters and are shared with the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Museum's permanent collection.

FACILITY USAGE POLICY

ne of the many benefits that KJ synagogue members enjoy is complimentary access to KJ worship and catering facilities in connection with celebrating a lifecycle event such as a brit milah, wedding, bar/bat mitzvah, aufruf, etc. Unlike most synagogues, KJ does not charge its members a "Facility Rental Fee" when a lifecycle event takes place at a time and at a location when our facilities would be open and running.

KJ does, however, look to a celebrating family to cover any incremental costs associated with the event that KJ would not otherwise have incurred. For example, if the Gottesman Center would ordinarily be closed on a summer Sunday, or if the Main Synagogue's air conditioning would otherwise be deactivated on

a spring weekday evening, or if maintenance and security crews would routinely close a facility at a certain time, and because of the event KJ now needs to open a closed building, activate a shutoff system, and/or keep workers past their work shifts, KJ will attempt to quantify and recoup from the celebrating family incremental costs that are associated with the event.

Specific details will be discussed with the KJ bookings agent on an event-by-event basis, but the general concept is that while KJ does not seek to enrich itself at the expense of its members' lifecycle events, neither can KJ subsidize celebrations by absorbing their additional operating costs.

THE ULTIMATE CHESED

wining a Bar/Bat Mitzvah simcha with a chesed element is now standard in our community, but no one could have anticipated the ultimate chesed that resulted from Alex Agus donating gifts he received in connection with his recent Bar Mitzvah to dedicate a rescue ambulance (called an "ambucycle")

to United Hatzalah of Israel. Able to reach victims in an average of 90 seconds (vs. more than 10 minutes for a standard ambulance), these ambucycles, and the dedicated volunteer corps of first responders who ride them, are literally responsible for saving thousands of lives in Israel since they were first introduced.

On the afternoon of March 23, 2011, medic Zev Sofer responded to the bombing outside Jerusalem's Central Bus Station using Alex Agus's ambucycle (see accompanying photo), and Zev was able to treat a grievously wounded 14 year-old boy who would otherwise have died from blood loss. "Shilo ben Ofra" is alive today thanks to Alex Agus's Bar Mitzvah chesed project, in partnership with medic Zev Sofer from United Hatzalah of Israel.
