From Rabbi Haskel Lookstein

t one of the beautiful weddings that was celebrated this past summer, the father of the bride, a cherished and widely respected member of our congregation, began his talk at the wedding dinner with a quotation from the *Modim* prayer that we say three times a day:

המוב כי לא כלו רחמיך, והמרחם כי לא תמו חסדיך


"How good You are, O' God, for Your compassion never fails; You are compassionate, for Your loving kindness never ceases."

CHATAN TORAH: ASHER LEVITSKY

Our Chatan Torah honor this year goes to Asher Levitsky. Asher comes from a family tradition of service to the Jewish community. Asher was born and raised in Wilkes-Barre, PA, where his father was active in the Jewish community, following in the footsteps of Asher's paternal grandfather, who was a leader in the Montreal Jewish community during the first four decades of the 20th century. Asher never knew his grandfather, but when he asked his father what his grandfather did, Asher was told that the question was not what his grandfather did for a living but what kind of person he was.

By profession, Asher is of counsel to the law firm of Ellenoff Grossman & Schole, where he practices corporate and securities law. By avocation, he is a chef and a true KJer. Asher's kiddushim, for which he cooks everything, are well known. And he truly serves KJ. Asher is a past president of the Men's Club and the Couples' Club, a predecessor to Kesher. He has been Gabbai of our parallel High Holiday service in the auditorium for 25 years. He is also our weekday Gabbai, our Shabbat Mincha Gabbai and our Hashkama Minyan Gabbai. Asher has served as Sukkah Meal Chairman for decades and he was instrumental in creating our Seudah Shlishit program for which he continues to seek sponsors on a weekly basis. Asher is also one of the regulars for reading the Torah at Shabbat mincha and weekday mornings, a skill he learned since he joined KJ. We know what kind of person Asher is continued on page 8



CHATAN BEREISHIT: WARREN GRAHAM

Warren Graham is a Ramaz High School graduate, Class of 1972. Both his daughters, Donna and Liane, are also Ramaz alumnae. Warren and his beloved wife, Shoshana, (a Tel Aviv native) have been members of KJ and the KJ/Ramaz community for over 20 years.

Warren is the son of the late Cantor Edward Graham z"l, and Dorothy Graham, who proudly traces her maternal lineage to the Vilna Gaon, an 18th century Talmudic genius and Torah scholar.

During his years in Ramaz, Warren excelled in the School's then-fledgling softball team and football club. But most importantly, he was the star of the checkers team. He was also most active in the Soviet Jewry movement. Warren was also a camper, and then a "bimmy" (a kitchen worker) in camp Massad Bet, the Ramaz summer retreat of its day.

Warren earned his undergraduate degree at the University of Buffalo, where he graduated, *cum laude*, with a double major in History and Political Science. He then went on to receive a J.D. at Fordham University School of Law

Warren practices in the field of Bankruptcy, Corporate Restructuring and Creditors' rights, and has been a participant in some of the largest cases in the country, as well as a number of crossborder insolvency cases. Warren has been affiliated with several law firms over the years, and now serves as Special Counsel to the law firm of Salon Marrow Dyckman Newman & Broudy LLP,

Our Chatan Maftir, Jeffrey Esses, is a graduate of the Ramaz class of 1993. Jeffrey and his wife, Linda, are the proud parents of two beautiful daughters, Sophia and Julia, both students in the Ramaz Lower School. He is a graduate of the Boston University School of Management. In 2001, Jeffrey joined his father, as VP of Sales for LJR Solutions Inc.

Jeffrey's involvement in and dedication to the KJ and Ramaz community began as a child, watching the example set by his parents, Barbara and Abraham Esses. Paving the way for Jeffrey to become one of the young leaders of our community, he attended KJ every Shabbat with his father, grew up in Junior Congregation and served as Gabbai of Teen Minyan. Additionally, while in high school, Jeffrey helped co-found the teen Tikun Leil Shavuot program and served as President of the Ramaz Business Investment Club.

Raised in Petah Tikvah, Rav Gilad studied in Israel's finest yeshivot, including HaYishuv HeChadash in Tel Aviv, Mercaz HaRav in Jerusalem and Yeshivat Har Etzion in Gush Etzion. While enrolled at Yeshivat Har Etzion, he served as a combat soldier in the Armored Corps rising to the rank of Captain. After completing his army service he earned his Teacher's Certificate from the Yitzchak Herzog Teachers College and Rabbinical Ordination from the Chief Rabbinate.

Since 1983, Rav Gilad has served as rabbi of Kibbutz Lavi and provides religious services to all neighboring settlements. In 1993, he founded Yeshivat Ma'ale Gilboa,

where he continues to be Rosh Yeshiva. Committed to the idea that yeshiva students should not take advantage of Torah study to avoid civic duties, students serve a full, three-year military service as part of their five-year program.

THE MIKVAH ON THE EVE OF YOM KIPPUR

Every year on the eve of Yom Kippur, there is a custom for men to immerse in the mikvah in preparation for this holy day.

One does not have to be a holy person to participate in this activity. On the contrary, for those of us who are just trying to be observant Jews, it is an added inspiration and preparation for a great day of introspection.

Our practice at KJ is that we observe this custom as a group before the morning service. All MEN are invited to assemble at the mikvah, 419 East 77th Street (between First and York Avenues) at 6:15 AM on Tuesday, September 25. Everyone will have the opportunity to immerse and then we will return to KJ for Shacharit services.

YOM KIPPUR

- Avoidance of food, drink, washing, lotions and oils, and marital relations
- Refraining from wearing leather shoes (wear a pair of nonleather footwear)
- Men are strongly encouraged to wear a white kitel

July 11, 2011, is a day few of us will forget. The fire that destroyed our beloved sanctuary brought an outpouring of emotion from a tearful community. A year later, to the day, the KJ/Ramaz community came together for an evening of prayer and reflection, which was followed by a presentation by Rabbi Haskel Lookstein and Kenny Rochlin, Director of Institutional Advancement for the Ramaz School, of the details of the new inspiring and exciting plan to turn what was a catastrophe into a glorious opportunity for both the school and the shul. Plans were revealed to restore the Main Sanctuary of KJ to its beauty and grandeur, using fire-proof materials in full compliance with all modern safety codes; to build two stories on top of the synagogue, including additional classrooms for Ramaz and a new gymnasium, which will provide increased spaces for the needs of both Ramaz and KJ; and to complete the rebuilding of the Ramaz Lower School and meet the need for an expanded student population in the Early Childhood Center and Lower School. It was indeed an historic assembly, one in which all were focused on the promise of a bright future for KJ and Ramaz.



or the past 13 years, KJ has been the address for unaffiliated families looking for a Jewish education for



their children. The Jewish Youth Connection (JYC) is the Sunday morning Hebrew school founded by KJ members Susan and Scott Shay fourteen years ago with the goal of providing a substantive and meaningful Jewish education to unaffiliated families. They nurtured JYC with a single-minded devotion for a decade and saw the school grow from just a few students to almost ninety during this past academic year. Over a dozen JYC students have moved on to Jewish Day Schools or High Schools - a tribute to the caring, dedication and support of Susan and Scott.

Five years ago, the Shays decided to turn the management of JYC over to KJ. Rabbi Elie Weinstock now oversees JYC with the help of Scott, Susan, and the dedicated JYC staff.

JYC's curriculum includes Bible, Jewish history, customs, and holidays. Students participate in small classes, and there are also modules on Jewish History, the Holocaust, and the State of Israel for older participants. Students from second

through sixth grade are paired with a Big Brother/Sister for individualized Hebrew study, and there is a special track for students preparing for Bar or Bat Mitzyah.

"JYC has been great for our kids," enthused one parent. "They actually remind us to take them to Hebrew school and are excited to go to school on a Sunday. It is incredible!"

The new school year begins on September 9th at 9:30 a.m. All are welcome to sample JYC's start-of-the-year sessions and programs. Enrollment is open to all, and no synagogue affiliation or Jewish background is required to participate in JYC. No one is turned away due to lack of funds.
