WHAT MAKES US HUMAN

A Dvar Torah by Rabbi Roy Feldman delivered on Friday, January 23, Parashat Bo

"I will harden his heart so that he will not let them go."

rere it up to him, Pharaoh may have let the Israelites free long before the tenth plague. God says that he will "harden his heart," effectively removing his free will, so that he will not let them go. How could - and, really, why would - God remove someone's free will? Furthermore, how could God then punish Pharaoh, holding him accountable for actions which were not his choice?

In his introduction to Pirkei Avot, Maimonides writes that taking away Pharaoh's free will was itself Pharaoh's punishment. Moreover, it was the natural consequence and perfect punishment in that the punishment itself "is the very sin which it punishes." To understand this cryptic comment, we must delve more deeply into Maimonides's view of free will. According to Maimonides, free will is a gift from God, and it is one of the features which distinguishes human beings from other animals. Rabbi Meir Simcha of Dvinsk, the Meshekh Hokhma, writes that free will is the tselem E-lokim which is mentioned in Genesis. That is, when God created man "in His image," that image was free will. Free will is the defining feature of humanity. It follows that taking away someone's free will effectively amounts to taking away his humanity.

We can now understand how hardening Pharaoh's heart was the natural consequence and most appropriate punishment given his crimes. One who takes away another's humanity reveals, ipso facto, a deficiency in himself, that his humanity, too, is lacking. Pharaoh dehumanized the Israelites through four hundred years of servitude and slavery and, in doing so, revealed that he was sub-human and likened to an animal. Removing his free will was the natural next step.

We ask those lighting candles to assemble at 7:15 p.m., fifteen minutes prior to the start of the program.



DEEDEE BENEL AND SHERRI LIBIN TO RECEIVE THIRTEENTH ANNUAL

The Officers and Executive Committee of the Congregation are pleased to announce that the Thirteenth Annual Judith Kaufman Hurwich Keter Torah Award will be presented to DeeDee Benel and Sherri Libin on the second day of Shavuot, Monday, May 25, 9:00 AM, at the Ramaz Upper School, Newman Education Center, 60 East 78th Street (between Park and Madison Avenues). The practice of conferring such an award is to appropriately recognize women in our congregation on the holiday when we celebrate the lives of two great Jewish heroines, Naomi and Ruth. It offers us an opportunity, as part of a religious ceremony, to express our appreciation for the services rendered to our community by women.

The award is named in memory of Judith Kaufman Hurwich, the daughter of Rita and Benjamin Kaufman, of blessed memory, the mother of our member - yibadeil l'chaim - Adam Hurwich, and the grandmother of two of our finest Ramaz Alumnae. Her family continues her tradition of association with KJ and Ramaz in fostering opportunities for women to study Torah.

eeDee Benel was born and raised in Brooklyn and attended Yeshivah of Flatbush as did her husband Victor. While Rabbi Lookstein often applauds DeeDee's many accomplishments, in his inimitable manner, he will also add, "Her one serious flaw, however, is that she's a Yeshivah of Flatbush graduate." Actually, the Rabbi knows that he is really complimenting DeeDee, albeit in a facetious manner. DeeDee credits her elementary and high school teachers and progressive Rabbis as her mentors, whose impact was so great as to be responsible for the path that



She recognized the challenges involved and felt charged to develop in our children, her students, a sense of responsibility to the Jewish people and the world. The verse in Isaiah, 6:8, referenced in our mission statement, "Whom shall I send and who will go for Me?" and I answered: 'Here I am, send me!" is one that DeeDee takes to heart. It guides her in designing and executing student missions to international locations such as Belarus, Berlin, Poland, Argentina and Israel and to far-flung



American destinations: Whitwell, Tennessee, New Orleans, and York, Pennsylvania. During the time Gilad Shalit was held captive for five years, DeeDee escorted students, to the Iranian Mission to daven Tefilat Shacharit on Wednesday mornings, and distribute informational cards to call attention to Gilad's plight. Shabbat Gilad was a memorable and glorious moment, when KJ congregants welcomed and celebrated Gilad and his entire platoon only a few months after Gilad was freed.

DeeDee also involves students in diverse chesed projects at various local agencies, aiding

needy populations and encouraging students to value each human being, to act on the principle:

חביב אדם שנברא בצלם

"Human beings are loved because they were created in the image of God" (Bereishit 9).

Thanks to DeeDee, reading Megillat Esther at Lenox Hill Hospital for patients, their families, and doctors on call, hosting the Ramaz/KJ Yachad Shabbaton, and sending holiday gift packages to American and Israeli soldiers have all become Ramaz traditions, a natural part of our school's culture.

herri is a graduate of Yavneh Academy and Frisch Yeshiva High School. After marrying Alexander (Ramaz '92), Sherri moved to the Upper East Side where she and Alex joined KJ in 2000. Sherri and Alex are the proud parents of three current Ramaz students: Jacob (Grade 6), Noah (Grade 4) and Elliot (Kindergarten.)

Sherri began her service to the community by serving as Co-President of Kesher, followed by Ramaz Parent Council liaison.

Following the passing of her mother in June 2012, Sherri experienced the outpouring of concern and caring from synagogue and rabbinic leadership and wished to replicate a similar model within the Ramaz community. Since its inception in 1872, KJ has always embodied the concept of "Kehillah." It is more than just part of our name and is so much more than a congregation. We are not just a group of people who gather together for prayer. We are a community, and as such we are bound to the greater community.

Who can better appreciate the idea of Kehillah than a KJ audience? The idea of communal leadership is part and parcel of the history of our synagogue. KJ rabbinic and lay leadership have always understood the responsibility to the synagogue community and beyond.

A Special Message from Rabbi Lookstein

Dear Friends.

As we all know, the first order of business in preparation for Pesach is Maot Chitim. In our congregation, it is known as Passover Relief. Before we take care of our own food needs - or reservations for far-off places - we have to think of those less fortunate than we, and do everything we can **to help them not only have a happy Pesach but have an economically viable life.**

This is true, first of all, in our relationship with the larger Jewish community. A PASSOVER TIMELINE

STEP #1: Removal of Chametz – Cleaning the House

STEP #2: Kashering Appliances

Gas ovens, both the stove-top and inside (racks as well), should be cleaned with an oven cleaner, and then not used for 24 hours. After 24 hours, invert the metal spiders and turn the burners on to the highest setting for 15 minutes. (If using an electric oven, turn the burners on the highest setting for 15 minutes as well.) After this is done, cover the stovetop with aluminum foil for the duration of Pesach. The inside oven should be turned on to broil for one hour.

If the oven is self-cleaning, go through one cycle.

Microwave ovens should be cleaned, and not used for 24 hours, after which a bowl or cup containing a few ounces of water should be put in and 'cooked' until the water is vaporized into steam.

Stainless steel sinks should be cleaned with a cleaning solution, and not used for 24 hours, after which boiling water should be poured on every area of the sink and its parts. Porcelain sinks cannot be kashered. They must be cleaned and covered.

Dishwashers may be kashered for Pesach after standing unused for 24 hours. They should be put through three complete cycles, using soap in the first one.

Kashering Utensils

While it is preferable to have as many utensils as possible specially reserved for use only on Pesach, many utensils used throughout the year may be kashered for use on Pesach. Items that are 'kasherable' include: metal utensils used for hot and cold, providing they are not difficult to clean (i.e., a sieve, parts that are glued together), and glass utensils that were used strictly for cold food.

Items that may not be kashered are: glassware that is used for cooking, earthenware, pottery, porcelain, pyrex, and chinaware.

The easiest way to kasher utensils is to bring them to the KJ Kasher-In from 9:00 a.m.-12:00 noon on Sunday, March 29, or Monday, March 30 from 6:30 - 9:30 p.m. where Rabbis Daniel Kraus and Roy Feldman will supervise the immersion of

metal utensils in a large sink of rapidly boiling water.

It is also possible to kasher in the privacy of your own home. The procedure for kashering is as follows: Metal utensils should be thoroughly cleaned with a cleaning solution and then not used for 24 hours. Small utensils such as silverware or other cutlery should be immersed briefly in a large pot containing rapidly boiling water. If the pot is very large, more than one item may be immersed at a time. Each item should then be rinsed with cold water.

Pots are kashered by bringing water in them to a boil and then immersing a hot stone or iron such that the water will overflow onto the sides of the pot. Then rinse the pot in cold water. Items which came into direct contact with chametz, without the medium of water (e.g. a broiler, frying pan) may be kashered by heating them until they are literally 'red hot' or by placing them in a self-cleaning oven during the self-clean cycle.

Glass utensils should be cleaned with a cleaning solution and then immersed in water (a bathtub works) for three days, changing the water every 24 hours.

STEP #3: The Search For Chametz

One of the most beautiful and meaningful ceremonies associated with Passover is *b'dikat chametz*—the search for chametz. The ceremony is composed of five parts.

- 1. Reciting a special blessing over the mitzvah of the removal of *chametz*.
- 2. The search of the house by the light of a candle to find vestiges of chametz.
 - 3. The reciting of the formula of

nullification of *chametz*.

- 4. The burning or disposal of any chametz found during the search.
- 5. The reciting of a final, more inclusive formula of nullification.

The first three parts of this ceremony will be observed this year on Thursday evening, April 2, after nightfall, 7:54 p.m. The disposal should be on Friday morning, April 3. Children especially will be impressed by the ceremony. It should, therefore, be performed with enthusiasm and dedication.

The children should be asked to place pieces of *chametz* in the various rooms — a practice which ensures that the search will not be in vain. They can hold the candle and the feather and they should examine their own possessions, dressers and desks, for long forgotten relics of *chametz*.

Passover is a beautiful festival. It is a serious one, too. Both these aspects can be captured in advance of the festival by a careful observance of *b'dikat chametz*.

Disposal of *Chametz*

No *chametz* may be eaten on Friday morning, April 3 after 10:52 a.m.

STEP #4: The Sale of Chametz

The ritual sale of *chametz* must be completed by early Friday morning, April 3. There are those who prefer to perform the ritual in person. For those who cannot attend to the matter in person, there is a form provided on page 7 of this Bulletin which authorizes Rabbi Weinstock to sell your *chametz*. THIS MUST BE RETURNED TO THE SYNAGOGUE BY FRIDAY MORNING, APRIL 3, NOT LATER THAN 8:30 a.m.

STEP #5: The Burning of Chametz

On Friday morning, April 3, it is customary to burn chametz. Chametz should be removed from one's possession and burned by 11:55 a.m. The synagogue provides a large, contained fire for this purpose. No bracha should be said, since the one said before the search applies to the burning as well.

STEP #6: After Pesach

According to Jewish Law, chametz that was owned by a Jew during Pesach may never be eaten by a Jew. Therefore, it is preferable that after Pesach one buys food from establishments owned by non-Jews, establishments owned by Jews who properly sold their chametz before Pesach, or after a month (time that a store's stock has been used up) from any establishment.

"Let all who are hungry, come and eat..."

The cost is \$90 per person and \$60 for children ages 2-11. (Children under 3 may be seated with parents at no charge without their own meal.)



TWO RECENT PROGRAMS OF NOTE FROM THE MEN'S CLUB

hether it is a film screening, a Kiddush discussion, a Chug Ivri, or a Sunday Supper lecture, the KJ Men's Club offers programming for the entire community with a very broad appeal. Below are photographs from two recent Men's Club programs.

A film screening on Sunday, January 25, entitled Yearning to Belong, told the story of a Jewish beit din (court) whose members flew to a remote area in Uganda in February 2002 to conduct a formal conversion of over 300 Abayudaya (the Ugandan term for "Jews"), welcoming them into the community of world Jewry. The documentary recorded this momentous event as well as examined the difficult question of "Who is a Jew?" Producer Debra Gonsher Vinik, who has produced and written 14 documentaries, of which eight have been nominated for Emmy awards and three have won the honors for Best Religious Programming, was in attendance and able to speak of her experiences and further elaborate on the film.

At a Supper Lecture on February 8, Edwin Black, author of the just-released Financing the Flames: How Tax-Exempt and Public Money Fuel a Culture of Confrontation and Terrorism in Israel, exposed the robust use of US tax-exempt, tax-subsidized, and public monies to foment agitation, systematically destabilize the Israel Defense Forces, and finance terrorists in Israel. Sponsored by Stand With Us and in association with the American Association of Jewish Lawyers and Jurists, Dialog Press, and the Institute for the Global Study of Anti-Semitism and Policy, the lecture proved to be both informative and enlightening. Representing Stand With Us were its Northeast Regional Executive Director, Shahar Azani, and Regional Coordinator, Avi Posnick.

They provide a broad spectrum of care and serve as a resource on concerns of aging for both elders and caregivers.
