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Shabbat Prayer and Celebration

We call Shabbat a delight, a day to refresh and renew. At Congregation Beth El, on Shabbat we join together as a synagogue family to rejoice in the gift of our lives, to reflect on the week gone by, and to sense God's presence through our prayer and celebration.

You are welcome to join us each week for Shabbat prayer on Friday evenings at 6:15 p.m. and Saturday mornings at 9:30 a.m. in the Stone Family Sanctuary. Rabbi Ron Shulman and Rabbi Avi Libman, Ba'al Tefillah David Lipsitz, and synagogue members lead us in warm, participatory services.

Friday Evenings

We welcome Shabbat each Friday at 6:15 p.m. taking leave of the busy routine of our week. We enjoy **Kabbalat Shabbat** with Hebrew prayer, song, and music. Our rabbis share insights of Jewish wisdom as we reflect on the week gone by. Following our service, we gather for friendship and refreshments at an Oneq Shabbat.

Each month we offer a variety of additional settings for celebrating Shabbat. We provide different opportunities for all of us, and for particular personal or family interests.

As Rabbi Shulman teaches, "Two things are all you really need to know in order to pray: who you are and what it is you feel today. In God's presence we stand and wonder and sway; taking from our lives and dreams the words we want to say."

As our style of communal prayer evolves, we strive to create innovative settings for personal prayer and meaning while honoring the liturgical rhythms and feel of Jewish tradition.


Aimee Ginsburg Bikel | The City of Light

Holiday Celebrations

We observe the sacred occasions of the Jewish year each season. Our prayer services and events for each Jewish holiday feature their unique ritual symbols and commemorations. Throughout the year, our observances include opportunities for all ages to share in the particular spirit and meaning of every holiday.

Observing Tisha B'Av - The Ninth of Av

We will observe Tisha B'Av with prayer and reflection on Saturday evening August 10, 2019 at 8:30pm. During the Evening Service for Tisha B'Av we recite the Bible's Book of Lamentations, Eikhah. We will also consider the meanings of this occasion for today with Rabbi Shulman.

Tisha B'Av is our calendar's date of mourning. On the ninth day of the Hebrew month of Av we recall tragic events in Jewish history and their legacies which have shaped our identity and values. Foremost among the events we remember are the destructions of the two Temples in Jerusalem. The Babylonians destroyed the First Temple in the year 586 BCE. The Romans destroyed the Second Temple in 70 CE.

We will also gather in observance of Tisha B'Av on Sunday, August 11th. Our g am Morning Minyan will include the prayer customs of this solemn day. We don't wear Tallit or Tefillin on the morning of Tisha B'Av as a sign of mourning.

At 9:45am we'll join together in study and discussion about issues in contemporary Jewish life as we reflect on the meanings of Jewish history for today.

At 1:00pm we'll return for a special Minhah, afternoon prayer minyan, during which we do wear Tallit and Tefillin.

Tisha B'Av is a full or partial day of fasting and introspection observed with emotion as we transform trauma into wisdom through ritual and conversation.

We'll celebrate Rosh HaShanah on Monday and Tuesday September 30 & October 1, 2019.

Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement, will begin with Kol Nidre on Tuesday evening October 8, 2019.

Yom Kippur will be observed on Wednesday, October 9, 2019.

At Congregation Beth El we provide a variety of services, settings, and activities for all ages to welcome the Jewish New Year and observe Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur. For more information, please refer to the 2019 | 5780 High Holy Day Guide.

Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur bring us together. During the High Holy Days we are reminded that we belong to a community of Jews with whom we share values and history. We greet and meet one another at the synagogue with the purpose of measuring the course of our lives and the condition of our world.

Our prayer is unique on the High Holy Days. The liturgy's themes address our vulnerabilities and fears, our strengths and hopes. We face the future mindful of the past and present in an honest process of introspection and repentance. On Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur we seek a familiar synagogue service while hoping we have changed. We merge our vastly different backgrounds, experiences, and memories into one whole and holy congregation.

We believe children and teens should not have to choose between fun and learning; instead, we are developing an integrated experience in which social programs are infused with content, and educational programs are infused with activities and friends. The formation of a new Jewish Learning department at Congregation Beth El signifies our commitment to creating a real and relevant learning environment. We believe that a more holistic combination of formal and informal education will help our children experience and connect with the beauty and wisdom of our ancient and ageless tradition while sharing in the joy of community. This cohesive strategy strives to leave a Jewish imprint on every child engaging with us at Congregation Beth El.

As we launch our new Jewish Learning program, we strive to support kids and youth to make friends and build their Jewish identities in all aspects of our school and synagogue programming. We do not believe social activities or educational programs should be separated. Rather, we want our children to connect with their Jewish identity, make friends, and be intellectually stimulated in all they experience, whether enjoying a Lag B'omer bonfire, playing gaga, bringing Jewish texts to life, competing in a synagogue campus scavenger hunt, joining together for prayer and celebration or taking a field trip to Disneyland. Lifelong Jewish Learning Viterbi Torah School K-8

For Grades K-8, Judaism is brought to life in our Viterbi Torah School (VTS) and Kadima/USY programs. At VTS, our teachers create inviting and interactive classroom environments in which foundational skills are built. In Kadima/USY, children experience what makes it fun and cool to be Jewish in a safe space.

In the Viterbi Torah School (VTS), rabbis and teachers strive to develop responsible and knowledgeable individuals with positive Jewish identities who participate actively and joyfully in Jewish life. Our curriculum offers classes and programs to impart religious character, ethical awareness, and a love of Judaism. Our focus is to provide learning settings that tell the Jewish story as our students learn Hebrew, prayer, Jewish celebrations, texts, ideas, ethics, and values specifically designed for their age. While learning and experiencing together, our youth form friendships and create Jewish community. Special social experiences including Shabbat and holiday gatherings, moments of prayer, social justice programs, field trips and Kadima/ USY events, reinforce the skills and knowledge our students gain in the classroom. Congregation Beth El families will enjoy new opportunities to participate in supplementary family programming exploring Jewish ideas and customs.

We understand the commitment required to prioritize Jewish education and social experiences in a busy family schedule. Our program seeks to make every moment a student spends with us at Congregation Beth El a meaningful and enriching one.

Beth El Teens participate together in a safe, fun, and Jewish environment. Teens can connect with their peers and have authentic Jewish experiences. Our integrated educational and social programming prepares Jewish teens to be confident and thoughtful Jewish adults. Through Thursday Night Teens (TNT), the Madrich program, and United Synagogue Youth (USY), Grades 9-12 connect with peers and create experiences rooted in Jewish culture and values.

The wide array of programming available to Beth El Teens includes social justice programs, leadership development, holiday and Shabbat celebrations, and discussions of current and hot topics. Beth El Teens experience Judaism in the broader San Diego community through the Jewish Film Festival, collaborative events with other synagogues, and regional Youth group programming. The Madrich program offers opportunities for those interested in volunteering here at Beth El to assist in educating VTS students. Teens can also volunteer at local Jewish communal and organizational events.

Bar and Bat Mitzvah Program

Our children become Bar and Bat Mitzvah (Son or Daughter of the Commandments) at a formative time in their lives. As they become Jewish teenagers, this ceremony marks a transition for them from the learning and joys of their childhoods to the moral consciousness, religious privileges, and imperative of their responsibilities as maturing Jews.

At Congregation Beth El our Bar and Bat Mitzvah Preparation Program seeks to guide our students toward the development of ethical awareness as they master the synagogue skills and Jewish concepts for living and celebrating their lives.

Bar and Bat Mitzvah celebrations take place within the context of each child's family, our synagogue community, and Shabbat Services. Bar and Bat Mitzvah is a joyous event for every student's family and our entire synagogue family.

All B'nei Mitzvah candidates at Congregation Beth El are enrolled in a formal program of Jewish education, a Jewish Day School, or some other form of Beth El approved Religious and Hebrew instruction. 7th grade students meet on Shabbat mornings to enhance their prayer skills and attend Shabbat Morning Services. Before services, 7th grade students and their parents enjoy a Bar and Bat Mitzvah preparation class taught by Rabbis Shulman and Libman. Specific class dates will be made available prior to the first class. All class sessions will begin at 9:00 a.m.

Adult learning at Congregation Beth El welcomes everyone, aware that we each come to Jewish learning from our different personal backgrounds. For us, adult Jewish learning is about applying our intellectual and spiritual curiosities in order achieve new personal insights and Jewish literacy. For each of us to strive according to our own interests for deeper understanding about our Jewish identities, renewed religious or spiritual character, heightened ethical awareness, and a love of Judaism. As we each may desire, to be able to see the experiences of our lives through the lens of the Jewish People's story, ideas, and values.

Beth El Is Thursday, our BEIT Midrash program, offers courses that tell the Jewish story. Classes rotate throughout the year selected from a variety of subjects including Bible, Rabbinic Texts, Jewish Ethics and Values, Liturgy and Synagogue Skills, Celebrations and Observances, History and Modernity, Jewish Thought, Arts and Culture, and the Hebrew language. He is currently writing for a new HBO show called "Our Boys," based on the true story and the aftermath of the kidnapping and murder of three Jewish teenagers by Hamas militants in the summer of 2014.

CRYING HANDS: The Deaf Experience Under Nazi Oppression

In the 1980s, motivated by the uncovering of remarkable information in Germany, Marla Petal and Michelle Baron embarked on a journey to rescue the history of the Deaf Holocaust Experience. They have recently entrusted their extensive collection to The United States Holocaust Memorial Museum, sparking a groundbreaking collaborative effort with the National Technical Institute for the Deaf and researchers in Israel and Europe to gather dispersed testimonies and artifacts, ensuring the most complete archive possible is preserved and accessible for generations to come.

Through video testimony, contemporaneous photographs, and compelling works of deaf artists, Marla and Michelle, Museum staff, and members of Temple Beth Solomon Synagogue for the Deaf, introduce audiences to the once-vibrant European Jewish deaf community and invite all to witness the cunning immorality of Nazi eugenics and extermination efforts through their eyes. Those who once suffered the deadly stigma of disability have much to teach us today as we strive to create a more just and inclusive society.
