A WORD FROM RABBI FELLMAN

It's been a long twoand-a-half years since we all first heard about COVID-19. And while we're not in the clear yet, we've come a long way



together, finding creative solutions to what at first seemed insurmountable challenges.

Throughout the pandemic, our Streaming Services Working Group (SSWG) has been meeting regularly to develop and evaluate COVID policy and protocols that provide the safest worship experience possible. We've focused on finding the right balance, based on medical science, public health, and our values. Each discussion, decision, and message has been grounded in

pikuach nefesh (safeguarding life), *shmirat haguf* (health and welfare – literally "guarding the body"), and *k'vod hatzibur* (honor/respect for the community).

As immunization rates increased and hospitalizations declined this summer, we modified our Shabbat masking policy to be "mask friendly," to provide a more welcoming environment. Now we turn to the High Holy Days, which are quickly approaching. We look forward to seeing you this September at our Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur services (if not also before for Shabbat or our Back-to-Shul event on the 11th of September).

Based on input from our medical adviser, Dr. Jeremy Golding, and a thorough discussion of the needs of congregants and our continuing commitment to the values above, we have set the following policy for in-person participation and attendance for the High Holy Days:

- Full vaccination—either two doses of Moderna or Pfizer vaccine, or one Johnson & Johnson plus a booster—is required for attendance, with proof on file with the BI Office.
- Masks are encouraged but not required. If you come without a mask, we strongly request that you take a rapid antigen test before attending services. Should you test positive, please join us remotely on Zoom. Free test kits will be available at our September 11 membership event, while supplies last. (Note also: If you have Medicare Part B, you may get up to 8 free rapid tests per month at participating pharmacies.

- The sanctuary will have a designated seating area for those who prefer to sit with others who are masked. We expect all to respect the signage for seating areas.
- As is our current practice, seating is first come, first served, with pods of chairs for couples and family groups arranged with space between groupings to avoid crowding.
- Solo service leaders may lead without masking.
- Torah readers and those with bima honors will be required to mask for their honors while on the bima.
- Members of the High Holiday Quintet may sing without masks but will be required to take a rapid test each morning before singing at services.
- If you are not feeling well for any reason, please, out of consideration for your fellow congregants, join us on Zoom.

Should trends worsen, we will update the attendance requirements as needed. We look forward to welcoming you back for what all of us hope will be a healthier, fulfilling New Year at Congregation Beth Israel.

BALANCING VALUES, RESPECTING DIFFERENT OPINIONS GREG WEINER, BETH ISRAEL PRESIDENT



The Babylonian Talmud tells of a debate between the houses of Hillel and Shammai that lasted three years and had to be settled by a divine voice with an obscure message: "These and these are the words of the living God, but the halacha is with the house of Hillel."

The centuries of debate on the passage exceed my competence. But the basic question driving much of the commentary – how could contrary arguments both be the words of the living God? – illustrates the need for prudential judgment in a world in which the full and exact truth can rarely be known with precision.

The Streaming Services Working Group's recent conversation on COVID protocols for the High Holidays didn't exactly rise to the level of a debate between Hillel and Shammai. For starters, the meeting took about half an hour rather than three years, and there were no fundamental divisions among the group.

What did take place, though, was a balancing of values, all of which partook of the truth despite some tension among them. It's true that the pandemic continues and that we value life. It's also true that the congregation's spiritual health requires minimal barriers to participation. And so on.

Having laid some of those values out, we sought a course that would maximize each of them. As Rabbi Fellman explains in her column, during High Holy Day services, there will continue to be a section of the sanctuary reserved for people who prefer only to be around others who are wearing masks. We urge those who prefer not to wear masks to take an antigen test (supplies of which will be available at our Back to Shul Barbecue on September 11) in advance and to join us on Zoom if result is positive.

Is it a perfect solution? No, because the situation involves competing values, all of which are valid – "these and these are the words of the living God" – but not all of which can be perfectly achieved. It represents a balance that welcomes all of us to join in prayer as a community.

One final note: The house of Hillel prevailed because of its respect for the arguments of the house of Shammai. In the spirit of community, let's respect each other's choices. And let's celebrate the High Holidays together and with joy.

Shabbat morning services at BI are followed by Kiddush lunch. Our members and guests enjoy good food and good conversation every week. You can help make that happen by sponsoring an upcoming luncheon. WHAT'S HAPPENING WITH THE EDUCATION COMMITTEE REENA SLOVIN, VP EDUCATION



The first Education Committee meeting took place in July. In attendance were new committee members Nina Stoll, Akiva Lichtenberg, Justin Woolf-Sullivan, Shoshanah Zaritt, and Deb Martin.

We discussed Rimon recruitment and marketing activities including a new parent parlor meeting set for August 29. In addition, new congregant and marketing professional Alli Thresher is working with Dale to make our Rimon publicity more creative, colorful, and engaging. Rimon is planning some joint programming with our new neighboring religious school at the Torah Center.

The committee is very excited to be pursuing Scholar in Residence offerings over the next two years that include music, worship, study, and eating together. These will all be in conjunction with the BI@100 programming efforts and will include Shabbatonim as well as stand-alone weekday programs. We are working with teachers, scholars, rabbis, and cantors associated with Hadar, Hebrew College, JTS and the Hartman Institute.

Deb Martin brought us up to date on the latest restructuring of BI's youth group - USY. Because the membership of our BI youth group is small as well as diverse in age and areas of interest, we've decided not to follow the traditional leadership structure of president and vice presidents. Instead, each member has picked an event or initiative that they would like to organize and lead. This has proven to be a very useful and successful restructuring venture.

RIMON – WE'RE READY FOR 5783 DALE ROSENBERG, DIRECTOR OF LEARNING AND ENGAGEMENT

Although you haven't heard much from Rimon this summer, we have been busy! We've got lots of new books and materials, new plans for the coming year, and I've been working with our new VP of Education (Reena Slovin) on recruiting families for Rimon.

We are all set for the start of another great year! We expect and hope to be in person all year for classes. Hebrew tutoring can be in person or on Zoom, at the families' discretion.

We've got a revised curriculum and a bunch of new activities planned. We're looking forward to working with our new Shlichah (Israeli Emissary) – Tommy Ben Basat. Tommy will be joining our classes to provide Israeli culture lessons and Hebrew games. I'm sure the Rimon students will be excited to meet her – I know I am!

Our program this year includes:



- ✓ Shabbat mornings where children learn prayers, Torah, and Jewish values. Older children can lead prayers and everyone joins in for skits and/or debates about the Torah reading
- ✓ Monday afternoon classes for children Grade 5 10, with Israeli cultural activities and lessons and "hot topics" learning and discussion
- ✓ Wednesday afternoons for Grades 2 through 7 practical and cocurricular activities, including crafts and cooking and folklore and video midrash
- ✓ Special events, including dinner in the Sukkah, Hanukkah Party, Tu B'Shvat Seder, Purim Carnival, and more
- ✓ Snack in Hebrew at every class. We will have a small snack and the students will learn the names of the foods in Hebrew and ask for them in full sentences.
- ✓ Half an hour weekly of Hebrew language tutorial via Zoom or in person at a time that works for each family
- ✓ Monthly Heroes and Themes each month will have a biblical character or historical person and a related theme that we focus on to learn about Jewish values and Jewish history

If you know anyone who is looking for a religious school, there's still time to register. We'll have lots more information at the Back to Shul Barbecue on September 11, as well as registration forms. Rimon begins on Monday, September 19.

The Conservative Movement's Rabbinical Assembly is once again offering an online study session after Shabbat is over on September 17, to help us prepare for the upcoming High Holy Days. BI is a sponsoring congregation, so we can all attend the program! There will be sessions led by some of the leading lights of the RA on topics ranging from "Is Sinning a Remediable Condition?" to "God's Blessing as a Source for Our Spiritual Work" to "The Music of Selihot and the Yamim Noraim." Project Zug Presents: The Days of Awe and Fear with Rabbi Avi Strausberg

Project Zug is offering another fascinating course to help us prepare for the High Holy Days through chevruta study and group discussion. This year's class considers the role of fear - in our text, liturgy, and lives. What does it mean to fear God? How can a posture of fear and trembling enhance our religious experience and how can it



be harmful? We'll study texts and we'll also reflect on our own experiences of and attitudes towards fear.

The course began with a live Zoom lecture from Rabbi Strausberg on Monday, August 29 at 7:30 p.m. Don't worry if you weren't able to attend - it will be recorded. We're having three meetings as a group on Zoom, with opening and closing remarks and studying in hevruta. These group sessions are scheduled for Wednesdays: August 31, September 7, and September 14. The course will end with a concluding live Zoom lecture on September 21. If you didn't sign up it's still possible to join in now.

As fall settles in, Beth Israel's USY is excited to begin its first year piloting our new Peer Programming Leadership model. This model, developed in tandem by former Acting Vice President of Education and USY parent Deb Martin, Youth Advisor Rowan Mason, and Director of Learning and Engagement Dale Rosenberg, moves us away from a traditional Board structure of President and Vice Presidents and encourages our smaller close-knit group to spread leadership tasks amongst the whole group and plan events for which the teens feel personal excitement and interest.

- Kenny and Andy Kalvinek are heading a USY outing to go bowling, tentatively planned during the week of Chanukah
- EmmaChaya Lipton-Praver will be planning and leading a USY Hamantaschen Bake Sale to benefit our social action projects
- Julie Cohen and Miriam Rosenbaum will be ending our year with a splash in a JCC Pool Party with Temple Emanuel Sinai!

Look in a separate mailing coming to your home for order forms for the annual Rosh Hashanah Challah sales and High Holiday Youth Booklets. These two fundraisers are being lovingly organized by the incomparable Lydia Borenstein. The



proceeds from these two activities should serve to fund the bulk of our youth programming for the year.

In addition to these offerings, our teens will be celebrating the holidays with their reading of the Jonah haftarah on Yom Kippur afternoon, so please plan to come to the Mincha service on Yom Kippur and hear our youth share this prophetic book with us all. USY will also participate in our Interfaith Sukkot Dinner and Study program on October 12th.

USY is also planning on engaging in Social Action all year. Last year we focused on food insecurity in Worcester and beyond for the whole year through a three-pronged approach of learning, action, and teaching and it was a great success, promoting deep learning and engagement with a singular topic. We will follow that model for a social action project this year, with the teens choosing what they would like to focus on for the year. Our work will culminate in bringing teaching to the community at the end of the year.

We're looking forward to a great year and can't wait for the amazing learning and growing USY will do together in 5783.

TOT SHABBAT

Tot Shabbat is excited to return to shul this fall! Our kickoff Tot Shabbat will be on Saturday, September 3rd in the BI Preschool room, starting at 10:30 a.m.

Our gatherings offer children and families a period of center-based learning, an interactive and joyful children's t'filah service, as well as snacktime often paired with a parsha play, Hebrew games, and more with the older Rimon students. Center-based learning invites children to



interact hands-on with curated activities in a relaxed setting and empowers young learners to explore freely and make their own discoveries. The Social Action committee will conduct a number of drives this year to help our community. Please be as participatory and generous as you can. Below are the events we have planned so far:

HIGH HOLIDAY FOOD DRIVE 9/18 - 10/6

We will be collecting pantry stable food items in non-breakable containers. Think beans, soup, rice, pasta, peanut butter. Items do not have to be kosher, but must be unopened.

THANKSGIVING DINNER WITH TURKEY 11/6-11/20

Turkey collection 11/20 from 11-12.

We will try for all the items of the feast-stuffing, vegetables, rice, instant mashed potatoes, canned milk, etc. with a finish of frozen turkeys or chickens on 11/20. Gift cards are also terrific.
