#### A WORD FROM RABBI FELLMAN

The High Holy Days may be behind us but as I think to what images

and memories I am taking with me into this year, I think about Simchat Torah.



My grandmother's yahrtzeit is Simchat Torah. I remember

my father telling me that it would be fitting that on the day his mother, Bernice Kremer (nee Goldberg) died, we would be encouraged to dance as we ended and started the Torah again. We would have to celebrate both the completion and start of the Torah but also her life. My Grandma Bena was a lover of Judaism, a proud parent and grandparent, and an excellent challah baker. It is her challah recipe that I use each week and my grandparents' challah dish that sits on our table on Shabbat and holidays.

Being a Rabbi with a Rabbi parent, I had sort of come to terms that Jewish holidays, especially the ones in Tishrei, would not be spent gathering with extended family. We each needed to be in our own communities and time for our larger family would have to take place at other points during the year. Maybe that is another reason that I make a point of baking challah and using that dish, as well as incorporating tunes written by my father into my service leading. Both of those actions make my family feel a little closer.

This year, it felt like a happy confluence that my younger sister, Devora Bena (named after Grandma Bena), named her son at his bris just before Simchat Torah. My parents came up to celebrate the birth and naming of their newest grandchild and because of the distance from their home, my parents stayed through the Shemini Atzeret/Simchat Torah holiday.

As a gift to the new parents (and maybe also as a gift to our family), we took their three older children and my parents back to our house for the two-day chag. Besides feeling like a living version of the classic story "It Could Always Be Worse\*," it gave us the opportunity to mark Grandma Bena's yahrzeit together.

On Simchat Torah morning, Grandma Bena's 35th yahrzeit, Ari and I held the corners of my Tallit as my parents stood under it with 7 of their grandchildren and recited the Torah blessings together for their Aliyah. I can think of no better way to honor them, their legacy and those who came before than this embrace of Torah, community, and family.

Of course, at supper that night, when my parents mentioned how meaningful it was to have that experience, some of the grandkids piped up "I had forgotten about that already." But **we** hadn't forgotten – and I will forever carry that passing of Torah and love of family in my mental bank of Shabbat and chag memories and strive to create more opportunities to honor those who came before and keep them close to us.

# BI CARES UPDATE DEB FINS, CHAIR BI CARES COMMITTEE

We currently have 10 active members on our BI Cares Committee. We have reached out to about 15 congregants in response to requests or calls to the office. The requests for assistance have included tech help, information needed about community services, wishes for outreach from the shul to not be forgotten, specific errands or tasks that needed to be done as well as ongoing companionship. Many of our members have sent cards to those recuperating. In addition to these requests, I know that others, both on this committee and not, reach out regularly to members of our community and/or assist with needed issues. We also know that our members have sprung into action when there has been a major trauma facing a family although that has not specifically been a task of this committee. BI Cares gets involved only when there is a specific referral.



The BI Cares Committee has received positive feedback from congregants even when it turns out that assistance is not needed. People have felt good about being contacted. One family made a donation in honor of our help and here is an excerpt from a thank you note that we received from another:

#### SPONSOR KIDDUSH AT BI – FOR AN OCCASION OR JUST BECAUSE

Shabbat morning services at BI are followed by Kiddush lunch. Our members and guests enjoy good food and good conversation every week. You can help make that happen by sponsoring an upcoming luncheon. # RIMON, A PLACE FOR FUN AND LEARNING DALE ROSENBERG, DIRECTOR OF LEARNING AND ENGAGEMENT



This year, the first day of Rimon happened to coincide with International Talk Like a Pirate Day, so we had a lesson on Jewish pirates during our first session. The rabbi also introduced the various kinds of Jewish texts, as illustrated by cookies with decorations! Since then, we've studied some of the themes of the High Holidays, Jews and tattoos, Jewish views on hospitality, and much more.

Every Shabbat we learn about the parasha of the week and have a demonstration, skit, or debate about an issue raised in the weekly reading. For Breishit, we learned about the biblical story of the creation of the world with props and treats representing what was created on each day.



We also sing songs connected to the parasha most weeks. For Rainbow Shabbat, we learned about the story of Noah and the great flood as well as diversity of gender identity and sexual orientation. Rimon showed our commitment to inclusion by decorating the lunch tables on Rainbow Shabbat, making clear that all our welcome!

Our special holiday activities have included our "annual" Interfaith Sukkot Dinner. The annual aspect had been interrupted by the pandemic and we were so happy to get back to this tradition this year – the first time since 2019. Rimon practiced *hachnasot orchim* (welcoming guests) by serving a tasty chili dinner to Muslim and Christian guests and then we heard views of hospitality in each of our faith traditions. We ended the dinner with the ever-popular edible Sukkot, made from graham crackers and icing.




We did another food project when studying Simchat Torah, making both edible Torah scrolls and caramel apples. But it wasn't all food! We unrolled a miniature replica Torah scroll and learned about scribal traditions.

We're enjoying learning from and with Tommy Ben Bassat, our new Community Shlichah, about Israeli life and culture. Tommy joins Rimon almost every week to teach an interactive lesson.

Now that the fall holidays are over, Rimon is settling into a more regular weekly schedule of Mondays and Wednesday afternoons and Saturday mornings. At each class we have snack in Hebrew, where the children learn the Hebrew

names of different foods and practice basic Hebrew sentences. Families also have the option of having an individual weekly lesson for their children in Hebrew reading, focusing on prayerbook Hebrew.

# CHAPEL RENOVATION UPDATE DEB FINS, CHAPEL RENOVATION CHAIR



As many members are aware, we have been using the Chapel again since shortly before Rosh Hashanah. The room is functional, but the renovation project is not yet completed. We are still awaiting the installation of the audio and video equipment (including assistive technology), reinstallation of artwork, completion of the new *amud* cover. We are also looking into possible relining of the ark and are waiting on a quote for that. The holidays certainly slowed things down.

Once the audio is installed, we want to have the service leaders come in to determine sound levels and if any acoustic remediation is needed. We have resources to cover that process as well. We continue to be within budget (even with some unforeseen expenses) and well under our total raised.

Feedback from members has been very positive. Dale Rosenberg has reported that it is lovely to be in there during Rimon's Saturday morning *tefilah* and other youth events. The Kabbalat Shabbat regulars have commented on how pleasant it is to be in this comfortable renovated space on Friday evenings. Members can also store their *tallitot* and *tefillin* in the chapel drawers as they previously did.

We do want to encourage members to keep the chapel in its current pristine condition as much as is feasible. Please do not leave coats, boots, umbrellas, papers, etc. in the chapel. We have both coatracks and a spacious coat closet for your belongings. We also suggest that food and drink be limited to non-carpeted areas of the shul.

Enjoy the renovated chapel! When the whole project is completed, we will have an official launch and thank the donors who made this happen.

Social Action is back in action this fall. First, we would like to thank everyone who participated in our High Holiday food drive. Thanks to your generosity we were able to collect 363 pounds of food. This bounty will be delivered by Rachel's Table to Friendly House Neighborhood Center.

# Book Talk with Jean Meltzer and Rabbi Fellman: A Discussion of the New Book "Mr. Perfect on Paper" Wednesday, November 2 at 7:30 p.m. on Zoom

This is just the thing for all who enjoyed last year's book *The Matzo Ball*, as well as those who missed it. Jean Meltzer has a new romantic comedy novel out called *Mr. Perfect on Paper* and once again, she and Rabbi Fellman will be discussing the book as part of the Worcester JCC Author Series. *Mr. Perfect on Paper* follows the story of Dara Rabinowitz, third generation Jewish matchmaker. Dara's version of matchmaking is a very popular app for Jews looking for matrimony, but Dara herself hasn't found her perfect match yet, although she has a comprehensive list of what she's looking for in a husband. Due to a scheme by her matchmaking *bubbe*, Dara goes on national television to find her match. After a number of mishaps, she seems to find the right man, the one who checks all her boxes. But what if her real *bashert* isn't the guy who has everything on her "must have" list, but instead a widowed ty personality who has a child and isn't even Jewish?

Like Meltzer's first novel, this is a lighthearted romantic comedy that also deals with some serious issues. Along with romance and comedy, Meltzer explores mental health challenges, the difficulty of finding time for dating while in a high-powered career, and issues around being an observant Jew in an interfaith relationship. # TGIF: Torah Goodness It's Friday with Rabbi Fellman Fridays at 10:00 a.m. starting November 4

Get a jumpstart on Shabbat with TGIF (Torah Goodness It's Friday), Rabbi Fellman's weekly parasha class. Starting on Friday November 4, @10:00 a.m. we'll once again meet in the BI Library (with a Zoom option for those unable to be physically present) to learn about the week's Torah reading.

Rabbi Fellman chooses a section of the parasha to discuss and provides us with the text and relevant commentary. We read it together and the rabbi offers insights and facilitates a discussion. The conversation is sometimes moving, occasionally contentious, often humorous in parts, and always engaging and enlightening.
