THE LISTS: SPEAKING NAMES TO GOD MESSAGE FROM THE (LAY) PULPIT

This week we begin the book of Exodus; it's called that because it contains the Exodus story, but in Hebrew its name is Sh'mot which means names. The first four verses list the names of the sons of Jacob whose families went down to Egypt. The Torah includes many geneological lists, in fact, from the long *begats* to the census at the opening of B'Midbar, laying out our ancestral line.

I've been thinking a lot about lists of names lately, specifically the ones our Temple Administrator forwards the service leaders before each Shabbat. She sends four separate lists, and like the lists of names in Torah, they teach us something important about our Jewish identity.

First, there is a list of simchas—upcoming birthdays and anniversaries. Reading these names aloud is a joyful moment during the service, especially when the one(s) celebrating are present and the room / zoom can wish them Mazal Tov.

Second, there is a list of those in need of healing. At every service, we set aside time to pray for people who are ill, inviting those present to say aloud the names of people they are thinking of. We sing "*Mi Shebeirach*", asking the One who blessed our ancestors to please help our loved ones. Our service leaders approach this portion of the service in varied ways, but the core intention is to say aloud the names of people we love who are sick, joining our voices to recite or sing this prayer for healing. Whether we ask G-d to intercede, or whether we simply lift up the hurt and despair in our hearts to G-d, this is a central component of our worship.

Finally, there are two lists of names of those who are no longer with us. One has names of those who were deported from Nymburk, Czechoslovakia and taken to death camps by the Nazis in June of 1942. We are connected to these souls because the Torah scroll pillaged from their congregation by the Nazis now resides in our ark. The other (fourth and final) contains the names of our members' loved ones who have died recently or at this time in seasons past. This list includes names of those maintained since our congregation was founded nearly 87 years ago because members asked us to be guardians of their memories. Here we look backwards rather than forwards and say the names of those who have died during the previous week before we rise as one congregation to recite the Mourner's Kaddish.

Maintaining these lists is an essential function of a Jewish congregation. We are indebted to Margaret Rice and dedicated member volunteers Maeve Sell and Ellen Grady who assist her in keeping careful track of our temple family, including those who are celebrating, those who are ill, those who are mourning, and those to whom our Torah scroll binds us. Many make donations on the occasion of a yahrzeit or when they add a name to the Mi Shebeirach list to support this recordkeeping effort.

*Our Tot Shabbat service takes place on the third Friday of each month at 6:30 p.m., followed by the regular Erev Shabbat service at 7:30 p.m. Please note: While the regular service is broadcast via Zoom, the Tot Shabbat service is strictly in-person.

All Friday Erev Shabbat Services (except Tot Shabbat):

The first Friday of the month is a Family Shabbat Service at 7 p.m. The rest of the month, Shabbat services start at 7:30 p.m. But it's best to check the BST <u>calendar</u> if you're unsure what time the service starts.

Need a prayer book? At Beth Sholom Temple, we use the *Mishkan T'filah* prayer book published by CCAR Press for our Shabbat services and *Mishkan HaNefesh* for High Holy Days services. We invite you to borrow one of our copies for your home worship. Just drop us a note at office@bstva.org, and our office manager or a temple member will help you arrange a time to pick up a copy. We're also happy to deliver one to your door. We are here to serve you and your family.

If you'd like to own a copy of *Mishkan T'filah*, you have a few options for purchase:

- 1. If you'd like a book that strictly includes the **Shabbat services**, CCAR offers that for \$38 (ISBN: 978-0-88123-104-5) here. That one includes the transliteration, so if you don't read Hebrew, you'll have phonetic pronunciations. If you prefer the book without transliteration (as our b'nei mitzvah students do), you can get that copy (ISBN: 978-0-88123-106-9) here.
- CCAR also offers a larger book that includes Shabbat, weekday and festival prayers for \$44 (ISBN: 978-0-88123-103-8) here. That version also includes the transliteration, but if you prefer not to have that, you can find an edition without transliteration here (ISBN: 978-0-88123-114-4).
- 3. If your eyes aren't what they used to be and you'd like a LARGE PRINT copy of Mishkan T'filah, you can purchase the Shabbat services book (ISBN: 978-0-88123-109-0) here and the one with the weekday and festival prayers (ISBN: 978-0-88123-110-6) here. Each book costs \$48 or you can purchase the two-book set (ISBN: 978-0-88123-108-3) for \$84 here. These are transliterated.
- 4. If **Kindle** is more your preference, you can purchase the Shabbat services volume for \$9.99 on Amazon <u>here</u> or the larger version, which includes prayers for Shabbat, weekdays and festivals, for \$19.99 <u>here</u>.

If you'd like to own copies of the *Mishkan HaNefesh* series for the **High Holy Days** services, you have options as well:

- 1. You can purchase the two-volume set (ISBN: 978-0-88123-208-0), with transliterated books for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, from CCAR for \$48 here.
- The LARGE PRINT version (ISBN: 978-0-88123-222-6) is three volumes, one for Rosh Hashanah and two for Yom Kippur, is transliterated, and can be had for \$100 here.
- 3. The **Kindle** version of the book for Rosh Hashanah can be found on Amazon here, and the one for Yom Kippur is here. Each one retails for \$9.99.

MUSIC AS MIDRASH with Cantor Wendy Shermet




Saturday, January 14, 7:00 pm Havdalah and Learning


