Havdallah

Blessings over the wine, spices, candle and between the separation of holy and commonplace. The *Havdalah* service marks the separation between the end of Shabbat and the week.

Lift the cup of wine of grape juice, and recite the blessing:

Baruch atah Adonai, Eloheinu Melech haolam, borei p'ri hagafen.

We praise You, Eternal God, Sovereign of the universe, Creator of the fruit of the vine.

Hold up the spice box, and recite the blessing:

בָּרוּדְ אַתָּה יָיָ, אֱלֹהֵנוּ מֶלֶדְ הָעוֹלָם, בּוֹרֵא מִינֵי בְשָׂמִים.

Baruch atah Adonai, Eloheinu Melech haolam borei minei v'samim.

We praise You, Eternal God, Sovereign of the universe, Creator of all spices.

Lift the Havdalah candle, and recite the blessing:

בָּרוּדְ אַתָּה יְיָ, אֱלֹהֵנוּ מֶלֶדְ הָעוֹלָם, בּוֹרֵא מְאוֹרֵי הָאֵשׁ.

Baruch atah Adonai, Eloheinu Melech haolam, borei m'orei ha-eish.

We praise You, Eternal God, Sovereign of the universe, Creator of fire.

Hold the Havdalah *candle*, *and recite the blessing*:

בָּרוּךְ אַתָּה יְיָ, אֱלֹהֵנוּ מֶלֶךְ הָעוֹלָם, הַמַּבְדִיל בֵּין קֹדֶשׁ לְחוֹל, בֵּין אוֹר לְחְשֶׁךְ, בֵּין יִשְׂרָאֵל לָעַמִּים, בֵּין יוֹם הַשְּׁבִיעִי לְשֵׁשֶׁת יְמֵי הַמַּעֲשֶׂה. בָּרוּךְ אַתָּה יְיָ, הַמַּבְדִיל בֵּין קֹדֶשׁ לְחוֹל.

Baruch atah Adonai, Eloheinu Melech haolam, hamavdil bein kodesh l'chol, bein or l'choshech, bein Yisrael laamim, bein yom hash-vi-i l'sheishet y'mei hamaaseh. Baruch atah Adonai, hamavdil bein kodesh l'chol.

We praise You, Eternal God, Sovereign of the universe: You distinguish the commonplace from the holy; You create light and darkness, Israel and the nations, the seventh day of rest and the six days of labor. We praise You, O God: You call us to distinguish the commonplace from the holy.

Rabbi Jennifer Weiner:

We have separated between holy time and not yet holy time. Last Shabbat, our holy time was shattered with the sounds of gunshots fired in Tree of Life's sanctuary. Eleven people lost their lives and others were injured including First Responders answering the call of crisis.

Tonight, we gather together as a community of many faiths to stand up to the hate and to support those still enduring the aftermath of the tragedy in Pittsburgh's Jewish community.

We invite to the bimah eleven members of our community to light eleven memorial candles, one for each victim killed at of Tree of Life.

Taharah (taharot, pl) is the ritual preparation of a body for burial. It's a sacred task that takes a special individual. These will be particularly difficult taharot, given the brutality of the deaths. It's my hope that in praying for those who are conducting this holy act, we find a bit of solace for ourselves.

Version of the *Kaddish*, praising God, that mourners recite during the bereavement period and to mark the anniversary of a death of a loved one.
