

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

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

At this most meaningful time of the year, I wish you and your family, and Temple Judea, *shana tova*. For me, a core message of the High Holy days is a time to reflect and re-order my spirit, considering the year that has passed and the unknowns ahead. Never has the message been stronger that the future is not ours to predict, and never has the value of our tradition, and our Temple, been cherished more.

At the time of last year's High Holy Days, I learned from Rabbi Siegal of a wonderful book about these Days of Awe called, unforgettably, "This is Real, and You Are Completely Unprepared." It introduced to me the story that King David knew that the Temple would be destroyed in the future, and worried, How will Israel make atonement then? God's response was that Israel should stand before God as a single spiritual unit ("ba'agudat achat"), make confession and seek forgiveness. Of this important concept of Israel as a single spiritual unit ba'agudat achat – Rabbi Alan Lew, the author, says, "The first thing we do during the High Holidays is come together; we stand together before God as a single spiritual unit. We do this out of a very deep instinct. . . [O]ur need for each other is immense. We heal one another by being together. We give each other hope. Now we know for sure-by ourselves, ain banu ma'asim, there is nothing we can do. But gathered together as a single indivisible entity, we sense that we do in fact have efficacy as a larger, transcendent spiritual unit, one that has been expressing meaning and continuity for three thousand years."

So what does it mean to stand together as a spiritual unit when we are distanced, and when the building where we gather is closed? Is the concept of *ba'agudat achat* undermined? On the contrary. Recall that the message to King David is in the context of his worry of what happens once the physical temple is unavailable. It is then that the spiritual unity of Israel comes to the fore, and is even more important.

We see that at our own dear Temple Judea. The unity of our participation, our faces, and voices, online is strong, in our flourishing and vibrant Zoom services and digital clergy messages. Whether in the form of on-line torah study, virtual life-cycle events, driving by the Temple to pick up a havdalah kit or a machzor, or from new athome traditions of candle-lighting and challah-baking, we are finding new ways to be a community. Where we can act carefully and safely, we can provide beautiful in-person experiences for children, as at our summer camp and Margaux School, and we can provide deeply meaningful online Jewish education for older children, in our J-PLEx program. We are grateful to have the ingenuity, dedication and deep spiritual commitment of staff and clergy who will bring us together - as a single spiritual unit, ba'agudat achat - in our online High Holy Day services.

This unity of ba'agudat achat is not just for the High Holy Days. It will serve us well over time, in the health and vibrancy of Temple Judea as we continue to endure the stress-test of a pandemic. It is precisely when the physical doors are shut that we are called upon to stand together in other ways. Now is the time to renew and deepen the reciprocal bonds of our engagement, as individuals, with Temple Judea, and with Judaism.

The Jewish new year always brings a feeling of hope, of excitement and of newness. This year, more than any I have known, we need it. As we all know, the year 2020 and the Hebrew year 5780 brought with it a pandemic that some futurists and scientists had predicted, but not one of us expected to unfold as it has. With the indefinite closing of schools, businesses, our sacred synagogue, and the unfathomable loss of life to COVID 19, our lives and our society have certainly changed. The number of people who are ill continues to rise, and there are many people over 60 or who have underlying health issues who have been isolated for going on 6 solid months. As of the writing of this article, there is still no end in site, at least not in South Florida, where we do not even know when schools will reopen.

That is the bad news. The good news is that our Jewish tradition is full of reason to find hope for renewal in the face of tragedy, loss and sadness. We just finished observing the day that Jews mourn the loss and remember the destruction of the First and Second Ancient Temples in Jerusalem. We also attach to that day, called Tisha B'Av, other atrocities that have faced the Jewish people throughout history, and there have been many. Yet, the Shabbat after that day in our Hebrew calendar is called Shabbat Nachamu, Sabbath of comfort, bringing words of comfort and hope to our people. After the destruction of the Second Temple, the Rabbis had to essentially rethink and recreate what Judaism would be, since there was no longer a place to go to bring the sacrifices or perform the rituals as they had done before. And, do



you know what the rabbis of old invented? They created the prayer service, substituting the different prayers in place of the animal sacrifices and creating something called "service of the heart" or what we would call, prayer, in place of a material thing to offer to God to bring us closer to the Eternal One. I, for one, am glad to have prayers and what has developed into a spiritual life that Jews can access all over the world, not only in Jerusalem and that one can do anytime or anywhere, not only in the synagogue.

This Pandemic has given us all a new challenge to rethink and recreate what that "service of the heart" will look like. In place of being in the sanctuary at Temple Judea, sitting next to our family or friends, we instead, lie on our couches or even in bed, watching a screen filled with familiar smiling faces that help us to connect our thoughts and begin to make sense of a world that sometimes makes no sense.

We, your clergy, do not claim to have the answers, but will continue to strive to ask the right questions and to work to keep our lives intertwined, even when we can not be in the same room together. By using Zoom and other forms of technology, we have enabled our congregation to see one another's faces each week as we pray, study and learn together. Though we can not hear you singing, we see your mouths moving and hands clapping and know that we are together in spirit.

Torah and Judaism is all about growth.

So we read the same Torah over and over again. Can we not grow and learn from relearning the same text year after year? Absolutely. Let me explain:

"Tati," Yael says, "Can we please read the PJ Library book, How to Heal a Broken Wing?

I respond, "Again, Yael, you want to read this book? Ok, even though we have read it 100 times in the last month. What's one more time?"

This time, Yael is not so interested in the plain meaning of the text, or pshat – simple meaning. Rather, she wants to know why a bird would fly into a window or what the tall buildings are called (skyscrapers) or "Are there special veterinarians that deal with broken wings from birds?"

Her questions show great growth in a book that is becoming profound and filled with meaning. Her level of understanding is increasing, and she is able to get something completely different from it only after one night of sleep. The growth that she is experiencing by reading a book is the gift of life.

As Jews, we can learn a great deal from our Jewish texts, be they biblical, rabbinical or modern. Before there was a self-help book, there was Torah, teaching us how to be our very best. We can change 5781 to be the best year yet, that is, only if we





GABRIEL'S SWEET DATE CHALLAH

BY TEMPLE JUDEA MEMBER AND MENSCH PRESIDENT, GABRIEL FELSEN

"This is a challah I came up with specifically because Rabbi Fisch (and others) isn't a fan of raisins. It's quite good usually, but also definitely a holiday challah. I have great memories of this challah at Saturday morning minyan and Rosh Hashanah as we usually try to gather as many of adult kids in their 20s and 30s living away from family in Miami to celebrate. I will warn you this is not really a beginner's recipe, so if you haven't baked challah before this is probably not where to start. If you have baked but feel rusty, this is a great excuse to reach out to your family or friend's baking expert!" - Gabriel Felsen

INGREDIENTS

2 cups warm water (warm but not hot) 2 (0.25 oz) packages yeast 3.5 cups all-purpose or bread flour 1 tablespoon salt 1/2 cup sugar 1 egg, beaten into 0.5 cup vegetable oil

DIRECTIONS

Add 3.5 cups flour to large bowl.

From the 0.5 cup sugar take 1 tablespoon of the sugar & combine it with the yeast & warm water.

Let yeast mix proof for 10 minutes until foamy.

Add the rest of the sugar to flour, then add salt to flour and sugar. Mix dry ingredients together in large bowl.

After yeast mix is foamy, add to dry ingredients. Mix together.

Beat together egg and oil. Add to large bowl mix. Mix well, should look like mashed potatoes. Start mixing in the next 3.5 cups of flour, until dough thickens.

Knead and mix together. Careful not to over knead, I usually aim for less than 10 minutes.

If dough looks too dry once mixed, add a little warm water. If dough is too sticky, add flour in small amounts until the dough is well-formed.

The dough should feel relatively happy and fluffy at the end. Add enough oil to the bowl to coat the dough and the bowl. Everything should be shiny.

Cover the bowl with a wet towel and let rise in a warm place at least for 2 hours. Punch down every 20 minutes if you let rise for 2 hours. If you let rise and enjoy!

3.5 cups all-purpose flour

1 cup vegan butter softened (to keep it kosher) 1 cup brown sugar 2 tablespoons cinnamon 8 oz pitted dates, coarsely chopped For the end: 1 egg, beaten

overnight, punch down every few hours.

After rising, the dough will be even more shiny and fluffy. Add just enough flour to remove shine from dough.

Cover a baking sheet with parchment paper and preheat oven to 375 degrees.

Cut or pull the dough in half to make at least two loaves. Each half can be made into the number of braids you want. Place the braided loaves on the parchment paper baking sheet.

Mix together butter, brown sugar, cinnamon and dates in a bowl and set aside.

This is the more complicated part. Using a cup or rolling pin, flatten each braid one at a time and fill with date/ butter/sugar, then carefully pull up sides and seal. This is a bit similar to making cinnamon rolls if you've ever done this before. Each braid should essentially be a tube filled with the mixture. Don't worry if they start to come apart, they will during baking usually anyway making for a nice split bread appearance. Braid together carefully as you are able.

Put in the preheated oven & let bake for 25 minutes.

After 25 minutes, turn the oven off and let the bread sit in the oven for 10 more minutes. After 10 minutes, take out.

Let the bread cool at least 30 minutes to an hour, then bless

We are so excited to continue this rewarding partnership with Casa Valentina.



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
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
