

## Report on Lifelong Learning in 2022-2023

Lifelong Learning ("Adult Ed") opportunities in '22-'23 were successful and well attended, maintaining quality programming while also capturing our members' varied interests!

- Our Torah Study is as popular as ever, frequently having 40-50+ people join together Saturday mornings via Zoom. This is a much larger group than we ever had in person! Come learn with us!
- Our new Reading Rabbis program occurs once monthly on Tuesdays and is a great addition to our programming, with a core group of returning learners each month. All members are welcome!
- Our Kol Hakavod ensemble, under the direction of Cantor Gostein and assisted by Music Program Assistant Sara Kaye, is as strong as ever! Singing with and leading our community at both High Holidays and our annual Shabbat Shir Shalom (ultra-musical Shabbat), as well as Shabbat services throughout the year, we had around 60 adults participating over the course of the year!
- Our Recipes and Reminiscing programming is still highly attended. We came together in the fall
  to make rugelach for Rosh Hashanah, in the winter to make smoked salmon (on his smoker at
  the home of Paul and Amy Mesches thank you Paul!), and in the spring Rabbi and Lori
  Freedman taught us how to make some of their favorite eastern European and Israeli dishes.
   We plan on more cooking (and tasting!) opportunities this next year!
- Other popular classes included Let's Talk About It Israel: A Simple Guide, Origin of the Israelites, Trope Club, Finding Your Way to Pray, Silk-Painted Tallit class, and The Living Breath of God - thank you to Rabbi Steinman, Michael Gostein, Cantor Gostein, Kelly Finkel, and Dr. Rosa Schnyer!
- Our Book Club, led by Jacqueline Fox, meets virtually the last Tuesday of every month and has read 12 books this year thank you!
- Ten students attended Introduction to Judaism under the coordination of our then-student rabbi, now Rabbi Melissa Lefkowitz, with Rabbi Steinman and Cantor Gostein's involvement as well.
- Artist in Residence Dan Nichols entertained while simultaneously filling our spiritual cups in December, and also led the educational program entitled "O. My. God."

• Our recent congregational trip to Israel was a great success! Members traveled together while learning and making lifelong memories.
