Bay Area Jewish leader joins CSI as executive director

INTRODUCING GORDON GLADSTONE

Gordon Gladstone, Sherith Israel's new executive director, is that odd Jew who can tell stories about raising pigs, stacking bales of hay, spending hours on a tractor mowing pastureland and rabbit-hunting. "My growing-up stories are not typical Jewish stories," laughs Gordon, who grew up in rural New Jersey and on a 60-acre dairy farm in Wisconsin. "But I can tell you that being the only Jew for miles in either direction triggers a really powerful Jewish identity."

But farm life is only part of Gordon's story. He is a fourth-generation Reform Jew. One great-grand-father had his name on a pew in New York's Central Synagogue. Another great-grandfather was a founding member of a Reform synagogue in Allentown, Pennsylvania. Gordon's parents, who grew up in New York, didn't have to work at being Jewish, he explains. "It was around them all the time."

When Gordon started college at the University of Wisconsin in Milwaukee, he took the opportunity to fortify his Jewish identity by becoming active in Hillel. His involvement and interest in Jewish life was so deep that after graduation he and his wife, **Jodi**, traveled to Israel to learn Hebrew. Their six-month program grew into two-and-a-half years on a *kibbutz* near Ramle.

CSI TO REACH OUT TO PARENTS OF YOUNG CHILDREN TO CREATE JEWISH CONNECTIONS

Many San Francisco Jewish families with newborns and toddlers don't know how to approach Jewish life. Often newcomers to San Francisco with demanding full-time jobs, they tend to remain unaffiliated with the Jewish community. Yet many hunger for a Jewish touch in their busy lives.

A \$150,000 grant (\$75,000 per year for two years) from the Jewish Community Federation of San Francisco, the Peninsula, Marin and Sonoma Counties will enable Sherith Israel to reach out to unaffiliated families with young children. The grant will fund two years of programming, called Sherith Israel Littles, to interact with young families at times that work for them in locations they frequent such as playgrounds and neighborhood bookstores.

Sherith Israel's goal is to establish relationships with couples and singles who have children up to three years old. "We hope to reach families who have not yet engaged in Jewish life, who are often new to the city and have no family in San Francisco," notes CSI education director Nancy Sheftel-Gomes. "Our birthto-three program will help these Jewish parents become part of a Jewish community and expand their social contacts."

Activities will be designed to meet parents' busy schedules. There will be fun Jewish-themed programs for the children and engaging facilitated conversations on topics of Jewish interest for adults.

A MOMENT WITH RABBI JESSICA ZIMMERMAN GRAF



IF NOT NOW, WHEN?

The famous Chinese curse, "May you live in interesting times," seems to apply to our times. The front page of the newspaper reports a new story of abuse by one of our cultural, intellectual or political leaders almost daily. How could this have gone on for so long? How could this have been covered up in plain sight for years? In these last months, people from all parts of our society have courageously come forward to tell their stories. From actresses to restaurant workers, Olympic gymnasts to Supreme Court Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg, victims are finally speaking out.

The newly revealed sexual harassment charges against so many of our respected public figures and powerful social leaders are astounding. The 19th century British politician, Lord Acton, wrote in a letter in 1887, "Absolute power corrupts absolutely." For too long, our society has allowed people to abuse positions of power. The spontaneous #MeToo movement that appeared on Facebook indicated just how widespread the experience of abuse has been in our society. Only now are we realizing the extent of the cover-up.

In a New York Times article, "The #MeToo Moment: Dream Crushers," Jodi Kantor, one of the journalists who broke the Harvey Weinstein story, explains what happened as she did her research. "In the course of the reporting, the moral gravity of the story shifted once we began to find out about incidents as recent as 2015. That, for us, was the journalistic 'aha' moment to say, these allegations never stopped coming."

We know from our own ancient sacred texts that power and corruption are not new. But we also know that courage, resistance and a call to act ethically are an integral part of our tradition. In Pirkei Avot (Ethics of the Fathers), Rabbi Eliezer teaches, "The honor of your fellow should be as precious to you as your own." And Rabbi Hillel famously instructs, "That which is hateful to you, do not do to your fellow. That is the whole Torah. The rest is commentary; go and learn." The modern corollary to the teachings of these ancient rabbis comes from a 20th-century rabbi, Abraham Joshua Heschel. He wrote, "In a free society, some are guilty and all are responsible."

Indeed, in our free society, all of us are responsible for the news that continues to bombard us. We have all contributed to an insidious culture of dishonor and abuse. We silenced stories or didn't listen when someone tried to talk. We used disrespectful words that contributed to a culture where abuse is permitted. We helped hide behaviors we knew were wrong, closing our eyes and allowing them to continue.

Sh'ma! Listen! Our tradition instructs us to hear one another-and to bear witness to the experiences of others. Living a Jewish life means accepting the responsibility to listen, as others have the courage to share their own experiences. And it means speaking up and speaking out. If not now, when? ■

PEOPLE OF THE BOOK

"Now Eli's sons were scoundrels; they paid no heed to the LORD." — 1 Samuel 2:12

Hophni and Phinehas, sons of Eli, high priest at Shiloh before Saul became Israel's first king, used their positions to take the best of Israel's offerings for themselves. They also "lay with women who performed tasks at the entrance of the Tent of Meeting" (1 Sam. 2:22). Because they ignored their father's rebuke, "the LORD was resolved that they should die" (1 Sam. 25). When the Philistines defeated Israel in battle, Hophni and Phinehas died. The Philistines also captured the Ark of the Covenant, which was in their possession. Abuse of power ultimately brings consequences.



Music plays an integral role in Jewish worship and life. Cantor David Frommer has enhanced the Sherith Israel music program. We asked him about highlights and what lies ahead.

Q: You demonstrate incredible enthusiasm at every Shabbat or holiday service. Just how important is music to Jewish worship?

A: I learned from Rabbi Ed Feinstein that speech is the language of intellect, and music is the language of emotion. I think that really sums up the importance of music in both religious and secular culture. Words allow us to understand ideas, but music allows us to feel ideas. Each of those experiences strengthens the other. A birthday party can have plenty of kind wishes exchanged, but it just doesn't feel complete until everyone sings "Happy Birthday." Music is all the more essential in Jewish worship because the words we say are usually in Hebrew, which most of us don't understand. And yet, when we sing together during worship, we start to feel more connected. A fascinating study tracked the heartbeats of choir members and found that over the course of a concert or rehearsal, their hearts started to beat together. What an incredible example of music's power to unite us.

Q: You're about to record a CD with Shabbat music. Why?

A: Last spring and summer, we recorded a CD with music for the High Holidays to familiarize congregants with the melodies. We mailed it out to congregants with their High Holiday tickets, and the reviews were very encouraging.

We decided to focus the next CD on the Saturday-morning service because it's one that people don't attend as often as Friday-evening services. It has a beautiful liturgy of its own and offers a wonderful opportunity to find peace and renewal before the next week starts. This new CD will help not only our adults learn these prayers, but also our religious school students and their families—especially those who are preparing to become bar or bat mitzvah. Three more CDs will focus on Friday night; holidays such as Sukkot, Chanukah and Pesach; and lifecycle events. The more familiar congregants become with our music, the richer their experiences will be.

Q: Which changes in music at CSI stand out for you—and what more can we expect?

A: Perhaps our biggest change was merging our High Holiday professional octet with Koleynu, our congregational choir. It's been really successful because the two groups complement each other perfectly. The professionals offer technical expertise while our volunteers infuse the music

with their love and *ruach*, or spirit, of Jewish prayer. We had a total of twenty singers, and they had the chance to work not with only our own Jonathan Dimmock, a world-class organist, but with Eric Choate as auxiliary choir conductor and accompanist for the High Holidays. Eric at the piano and Jonathan at the organ allowed us to offer more varied accompaniment and complex choral arrangements.

Koleynu is one of the jewels of Sherith Israel's music program. I encourage our community to hear them in services on first Fridays and at other holiday celebrations throughout the year. We hope to add new members, so please consider joining us. Everyone is welcome—no music literacy required. I also want to add more volunteer congregants to our synagogue's musician ranks. Many congregants are talented instrumentalists and I'd love them to contribute during Musical Shabbat services, Friday-night dinners and religious school. We're not just looking for guitars. If you play a zither, a euphonium or any other instrument that no one has heard of, we want to know!

Q: How are we doing with Sh'ma Koleynu, our Saturday lay-led services?

A: We are so proud of our *Sh'ma Koleynu* Saturday morning lay leaders, coordinated by **Jacalyn Kornblatt.** They have embraced our mandate to create a service where congregants without a lot of experience singing or chanting Torah can feel comfortable. Several congregants have chanted Torah for the first time since their bar or bat mitzvah at this service. It's entirely due to the welcoming and supportive atmosphere provided by our lay leaders.

We also hold religious school on many Saturday mornings instead of Sundays. We'd like to make our b'nai mitzvah celebrations community-wide, recognizing that the religious school students of today will hopefully be the leaders of Sherith Israel tomorrow. When religious school does meet on Sunday, our *T'filah* mirrors the music and liturgy from Saturday morning, so b'nai mitzvah families can become more familiar with the melodies. Once students become bar and bat mitzvah, we hope they'll continue using the skills they learn by chanting Torah and Haftarah at our Sh'ma Koleynu services, along with the adults. Shabbat morning is a time for all generations to come together to celebrate their love of Judaism and to renew their relationships with each other and God. We believe we're heading in a good direction towards building a Saturday-morning experience that reflects the spirit of Sherith Israel.

At a turning point, Gordon and Jodi came back to the States to save enough money to move back to Israel and make *aliyah*. In 1999, after three years working at a Conservative synagogue in Kansas City, Gordon, Jodi and their infant son moved back to the *kibbutz*. Gordon studied to become an Israeli tour guide and worked in the educational travel industry with groups from BBYO and Birthright. Things were good for a year or so, but then history happened. The first dot-com bust, the Intifada and 9/11 all converged to devastate the Israeli tourist market. By the end of 2002, Gordon and his family moved back to the U.S.

A nationwide Jewish job search brought Gordon to UC Berkeley's chapter of Hillel International, which was looking for an Israel specialist to help students navigate the volatile campus politics caused by deteriorating Israeli-Palestinian relations. Gordon worked his way through the ranks at Hillel, becoming associate director and finally executive director. After six years he moved on to open the San Francisco office of J Street as the organization's founding regional director. "At first it was myself and my laptop; then it was myself and a laptop in a co-working space; and then myself and a couple of people in a co-working space," recalls Gordon, who oversaw all J Street activities from Santa Cruz to Seattle and as far inland as Colorado. His last J Street project was to lease their new office in Oakland.

"From J Street, I decided it was time to go back to real Jewish work again," says Gordon, who was selected as executive director of Shir Hadash in Los Gatos. "I discovered I really, really enjoy this work. It really suits who I am." He enjoys the nuts and bolts of organizational life, including a well-written budget. Gordon, who lives in El Cerrito with Jodi and their sons, **Gefen** (18) and **Nitzan** (15), likes to solve problems. "When you are an executive director, every day is a festival of big and small problems. There just aren't a whole lot of jobs

where you can go from staring at a spreadsheet to someone walking in and saying, 'I need you to come up on the roof,' and an hour later you're stacking chairs in the sanctuary for a memorial service. As a kid who grew up on a farm, that just feels very natural," he observes. Well respected by his peers, Gordon is president of the Bay Area Temple Administrators (BATA), the professional organization for synagogue administrators.

Gordon's Jewish work is rooted in the idea of community. He often looks to the ideas of Mordecai Kaplan, the founder of the Reconstructionist movement. "Kaplan's thesis is that Judaism is a civilization with numerous facets—the religion, the languages, the food, the folkways—which in their totality make up the ingredients of Judaism," he explains. "We make the world small for each other. At the end of the day the most powerful thing we can offer each other is that sense of intimacy and community."

What drew Gordon to Sherith Israel? "I'm the great-grandson of a guy who belonged to New York Central. There's something about these old-line urban synagogues that really resonates with me." Once he started diving deeper into what's happening at Sherith Israel, he was even more intrigued. "This community is at an inflection point. It's an interesting challenge to take a 167-year-old congregation, with institutional memory and traditions, forward with a dynamic young clergy team like **Rabbi Jessica Graf** and **Cantor David Frommer.** I'm eager to be part of that conversation."

Gordon started his conversation with the congregation at a post-Shabbat dinner in early January where he asked members for their ideas going forward. "An executive director is only ever a steward. Our job is to figure out what the community wants and then to facilitate the path forward," he notes. "If we do our job well, most people don't notice. When things work the way they should, they don't attract attention."

OH CHANUKAH, OH CHANUKAH! Sherith Israel glowed with light and rang with song as we celebrated Chanukah. **Bill Shore** and grandson **Elliott Shaykin** lit the chanukiah, and our congregational choir, Koleynu, filled the sanctuary with music, including the always popular "Chanukah in Santa Monica." After services, our new program manager **Peter Bonos** and his klezmer band, Orchestra Euphonos, entertained at dinner. When he's not playing trumpet, Peter works with our clergy, staff, congregants and presenters to coordinate events at Sherith Israel. He is also the staff member responsible for communications and promotional campaigns for programs on our website, emails and printed materials.

NEW DIRECTIONS

I am excited to welcome Gordon Gladstone to our team as Sherith Israel's new executive director. Gordon assumed his position on December 11, and he is deep into work with the clergy, board, staff and lay committees. As you can tell from the front-page article in this newsletter, Gordon brings a wealth of Jewish organizational experience and a depth of Jewish knowledge to Sherith Israel. If you haven't already met him, stop by the office and say hello.

As we welcome Gordon to Sherith Israel, I also want to acknowledge the tremendous job that Nancy Sheftel-Gomes did as interim executive director. Nancy rebuilt our staff and worked closely with the board, clergy and committees to keep things running smoothly for over a year and a half. Gordon was able to hit the ground running because of the amazing job that Nancy did, all while simultaneously holding down her position as education director.

After 19 years as education director, Nancy has informed us that she will retire at the end of June. During her tenure, she was responsible for creating our Shabbat School as part of the Religious School programming and expanding the Marin Day School Jewish curriculum by involving CSI clergy and staff in teaching and support. She also developed collaborative programming with Calvary Presbyterian and St. Dominic youth, supported assistant principal Natalie Weizman in

re-establishing an active youth group for our teens and created a program of continuous professional development for CSI religious school teachers. Nancy also helped guide our staff through two complete clergy transitions. Although Nancy will be retiring as an employee of CSI, she will remain an engaged congregant, as she has been for over 40 years, and will continue her volunteer service for our HaMotzi and Chicken Soupers programs.

In assessing how best to move forward after Nancy's retirement, at the urging of Rabbi Jessica Graf, the board of trustees has decided to seek a rabbi-educator to lead the religious school and all of our education programs. We believe that the key to Sherith Israel's long-term viability is growth, and religious school can be a significant part of that growth, as it is a major reason that families join synagogues. The new rabbi-educator will have the chance to build on the strong foundation that Nancy has put in place to create a more experiential learning curriculum and to work with our early childhood program, including our outreach to unaffiliated families. He or she will also be part of the clergy team for Shabbat services and other observances.

Rabbi Graf, along with CSI vice president Lindsay Braunig and CSI secretary Erik Migdail, who are co-chairing the search committee, traveled to Cincinnati to interview several members of this year's graduating class at Hebrew Union College. They will also interview candidates currently with other synagogues. We believe we have a lot to offer a young rabbi-educator—the chance to be part of a dynamic clergy team setting a new direction for the congregation. If one of the candidates meets our needs, we hope to make an offer as early as mid-March. I'm grateful to the board for its support of this initiative. The decision to seek a rabbi-educator to lead our religious school is a forward-looking investment in the future of Sherith Israel.

Finally, I want to report some wonderful financial news. Thanks to better-thanbudgeted Annual Fund revenues and dues receipts, an extremely generous year-end gift from the Hills of Eternity cemetery, and some one-time expense savings, we will report a balanced budget for 2017. There are a lot of people to thank- Julie Lekach House and Joan Libman for their Annual Fund leadership: treasurer Katie Zier and assistant treasurer Karen Zelmar for their eagleeyed attention to fiscal details; and the Hills of Eternity board for its generosity. Most of all, thanks to all of you, the Sherith Israel community, for making support of our synagogue a priority.

There is a palpable sense of excitement and optimism around the synagogue. The future of Sherith Israel is bright, and I invite you to help us build that future together. ■

"As families become more rooted in their Jewishness, they'll be motivated to initiate Jewish family activities at home and ultimately consider membership in Sherith Israel's synagogue community," adds Nancy. "Young San Francisco parents are starved for community, support and tradition. We can deliver this. The program model we'll use has been successful across North America."

Sherith Israel Littles begins in July and will be coordinated by a part-time program director. In addition, two part-time "peer connectors"—CSI parents of young children—will guide program participants and help them make connections within the community. We'll also build partnerships with bookstores, our sister Reform synagogue Congregation Emanu-El and other organizations like the San Francisco Jewish Baby Network. Surveys in May of 2019 and 2020 will track changes in parents' attitudes about their participation in Jewish life.

Sherith Israel member **Beth Cousens**, associate vice president for Jewish education and engagement at the Jewish Federations of North America, helped write the grant. The mother of two children under four, **Milo** and **Sela**, Beth notes that becoming a parent is a time of tremendous human need for information, for new friends whose life fits your new life and for answers to big questions.

"Judaism and the Jewish community can answer the needs of new parents. Jewish wisdom offers a great context for exploring the big questions," comments Beth. "Sherith Israel is like a family. With our new Sherith Israel Littles program, people who feel even a little bit Jewish will have the opportunity to become part of this community, this family."

Nancy agrees. "All our educational efforts are about bringing children *and parents* closer to Judaism," she says. "This grant will enable us to build personal relationships with many young families and help them find a rewarding place in Jewish life."

Sherith Israel's Isaiah window proclaims our commitment to social action: "Feed the hungry, clothe the naked and shelter the homeless." While our building talks the talk, a dedicated group of lay leaders is making sure we continue to walk the walk. Stacy Passman, co-chair of CSI's social action committee, sees our Isaiah window as "our mission statement"—the biblical directives to care for those in need and to treat the stranger as ourselves as a "core part of Judaism."

For more than a quarter-century, feeding the hungry has maintained a key role in our social-action agenda. HaMotzi involves hundreds of volunteers in providing weekly meals to two homeless shelters. Our Chicken Soupers volunteers provide meals and prepared food to homebound seniors and critically ill individuals.

IMMIGRATION AT THE FOREFRONT

Following the lead of former CSI rabbi **Julie Saxe-Taller**, Stacy and her co-chair, **Karen Alschuler**, have broadened our social-action work to include a multi-pronged approach to immigration. We have partnered with Faith in Action, an interfaith consortium of faith communities, to accompany people who are subject to deportation to their hearings. Over the past several months, CSI members have joined volunteers from other faith communities at deportation hearings to demonstrate community support for individuals threatened with deportation or incarceration. At least one immigration judge cited that support as a reason for releasing the immigrant without posting bond.

The social action committee also continues working on a plan to declare Sherith Israel a "sanctuary congregation." Following the committee's initial presentation to the Sherith Israel Board of Trustees last summer, it continues to develop a proposal with the goal of making a recommendation to the board at its February meeting. Stacy emphasizes that the proposal will not include housing people at CSI. "We don't have the facilities to do that here."

LEGISLATIVE ADVOCACY

The committee also wants to increase Sherith Israel's involvement in legislative advocacy regarding immigration issues, particularly at the state level. Stacy anticipates that Sherith Israel will partner with Faith in Action and Reform CA, a group of Reform congregations from throughout California.

GETTING MORE MEMBERS INVOLVED

Karen and Stacy are excited by the committee's growth—the mailing list now contains more than 50 people—and want to get even more people involved. "It would be great to have people who are available for different situations," says Stacy. 

Recording the sounds of Sherith Israel

PROFILE: JON KEILSON AND BECCA FELSENTHAL

Last year, just before the High Holidays, every Sherith Israel family received a CD of Cantor David Frommer singing the High Holiday liturgy. Without the help of sound engineer and congregant Jon Keilson, that CD might never have come to be. Jon recalls the night of the recording: The only light illuminating the darkened sanctuary seeped through the colorful stained-glass windows. Sherith Israel's historic synagogue was empty, except for three shadowy figures.

Then the emotional *Avinu Malkeinu* and other beloved prayers from the High Holidays filled the synagogue from the mahogany *bimah* to the plush balconies to our soaring dome. Cantor Frommer sang these traditional melodies and innovative selections for the Days of Awe as **Jonathan Dimmock**, CSI's music director, expertly commanded CSI's magnificent 1904 Murray Harris organ.

Listening intently, Jon made sure the sound levels and microphones preserved the moment. "It was powerful," he remembers. "No one else was in the room except for me, Jonathan and David. David is a very good vocalist, as Jonathan is with the keys. I could sit back, hit record, and listen."

wife **Becca Felsenthal**, and their baby **Judah**. Jon mixed, edited, and mastered the High Holiday recordings into a professional-quality CD, "Nashuva" (Let Us Return).

Producing "The Synagogue Sessions," as the CD is informally known, was moving and challenging, Jon says. He graduated from the respected Berklee College of Music in Boston and records his own material, but he had no experience with organ music. Sensitive microphones perched 50 feet above the sanctuary floor were needed to accomplish the task.

"Jon made the CD happen," Cantor David says. "I was really excited that we were able to capture the organ and not have to settle for a synthetic organ sound. What's incredible about singing in the sanctuary is you feel all of the history. We sing *Kol Nidre*, the same *Kol Nidre* worshippers heard 112 years ago."

Two more sanctuary recording sessions are planned for a CD of Shabbat music. This time, all the musicians—vocal, piano, organ, strings, percussion and woodwind—will perform together live. After that, there's talk of recording music for Jewish festivals and lifecycle events.

Music is not the only link that Jon and Becca have with Sherith Israel. They

and Judah have found a welcoming community, one especially open to worshippers like Becca, who have only one Jewish parent or chose Judaism later in life.

Becca grew up in Wilmette, Illinois, observing Jewish holidays with her father's side of the family. She and Jon were married by a rabbi. But because her mother is not Jewish, Becca felt it was important to become, as she puts it, "officially" Jewish. Under the mentorship of **Helaine Weinstein**, Becca completed Sherith Israel's Intro to Judaism course and went through conversion, attending the *mikvah* when she was eight months pregnant. Jon waited outside that day with Cantor David, who filled the *mikvah* with song and prayer.

"It was an emotional, spiritually significant experience," Becca says. "Then, to be able to stand before the congregation at Shabbat and have that moment celebrated was really wonderful."

"It was her own journey," says Jon, who grew up in a Conservative synagogue in Hewlett, New York. He is impressed by Sherith Israel's inclusiveness. "You can come from any background, and people want to hear your story and welcome you."

Now, Becca and Jon are connecting with other young Sherith Israel families they met in the Intro to Judaism class, as well as with the larger CSI community. It's quite frankly not what the couple envisioned when they moved to San Francisco from New York in 2014 for career opportunities. Jon is a director of product at TuneIn, which provides internet radio and podcasts. Becca is an attorney specializing in intellectual property. "If you had told me I'd be living across the country and would be involved in my local synagogue, I probably would have laughed," Becca says.

As partners and parents, they are carrying Jewish traditions that have passed from generation to generation for centuries. Fortunately, Becca adds, "Sherith Israel makes it very easy for us to be involved. The clergy, staff and administration do a really good job of reaching out. It has made the transition seamless."

That generosity began with the board's 100% participation,
