Shabbat at Beth Am

Jewish tradition commands us to observe Shabbat each week, and at Congregation Beth Am it's central to our identity. Be it worship, study, community, music and more; there are a host of ways to join Beth Am for Shabbat.

Shabbat at Home

Celebrating Shabbat at home is equally important and worthwhile. In our hectic lives, Shabbat can be countercultural, an opportunity to slow down, spend time with friends and loved ones, do things we enjoy, or just appreciate the majesty of the world around us. Havdalah

The end of Shabbat is traditionally marked by a ritual called *Havdalah* during which songs are sung and blessings are said over wine or grape juice, spices and light (a special twisted candle is used), separating Shabbat from the rest of the week.

Blessing for Lighting Shabbat Candles

Baruch atah Adonai Eloheinu Melech haolam, asher kid'shanu b'mitzvotav, v'tzivanu l'hadlik ner shel Shabbat.

Blessing Over Wine/Grape Juice

Baruch atah Adonai Eloheinu Melech haolam, borei p'ri hagafen.

Blessing Over Challah
