



From the Rabbi's Study...

Rejoicing on the New Year

It once happened on the eve of Rosh Hashannah that a certain tailor went to the market to buy fish and found only one fish. So he and the governor's servant vied for the purchase of the fish, each of them bidding up the price, until the cost of this plain fish reached a very high price. In the end, the tailor bought the fish. At mealtime, the governor asked the servant, "Why did you not serve fish?" The servant replied, "I went to the market where there was only one fish left and and I a Jewish man found ourselves vying for it until he bid the price up too high. I did not want to bring you a plain fish that cost that much." The governor said, "Go and bring me this man for apparently he owns a treasure that belongs to the kingdom." When the Jewish man arrived, the governor asked him, "What is your work?" The Jewish man replied, "I am a tailor." The governor asked, "How is that you, a mere tailor, presume to eat a fish that cost so much?" The tailor replied, "We Jews have one day that celebrates the New Year. When this day comes, should we not honor it?" The governor said, "Since you bring such a reason for what you have done, you are free to go." The tailor returned to his modest house for a large and joyous feast in celebration of the New Year.

This story speaks to the importance of celebrating our holidays with a spirit of joy. Celebrating the holidays is about more than coming to synagogue to pray. Rejoicing in our festival days in the same way as this modest tailor adds to the spiritual experience of our holy days. If performed with the proper spiritual intentions, dressing nicely, making your house beautiful, and eating a large festive meal with loving family and friends can all be significant parts of adding meaning to the experience of our holidays.

This story about the tailor and the governor also teaches us that finding spiritual meaning in our tradition takes a certain amount of effort on our parts. In order to experience the true spiritual joy that we are supposed to on the holidays it is important to make a personal commitment to this endeavor. In order for Judaism to be personally meaningful it is important to bring our passion to our Jewish journey in the same way that this modest tailor did (but hopefully without having to pay so much for a piece of fish). *Shanah Tovah!* May you have a Happy and Sweet New Year!



Message from Dasha Baker

Religious School Director

This summer I was trained to be a Youth Mental Health First Responder. The training was offered through the Union of Reform Judaism (URJ) and geared for those working with Jewish young people. Learning about causes, hearing testimony of people who had lived through self-harm and suicide attempts, discussing experiences with colleagues, and remembering the young people I have taught over the years was enlightening and very, very difficult.

Most of us have someone in their life suffering from a mental health challenge, some have experienced the devastation that occurs when those challenges cannot be met. The statistics on suicide, eating disorders, alcohol and drug use, depression, and anxiety among young people are frightening at best. As of 2016, twenty percent of youth ages 13-18 experienced severe mental disorders per year, the rates for youth ages 8-15 are thirteen percent. Those numbers are increasing.

Our Religious school is based on Jewish values. My first requirement for teachers is caring about and respecting the students. I can teach people effective classroom techniques and provide information about the subject, but I can't teach them to care. Providing an environment that incorporates examples have always been the foundation of our school and underlying classes and activities. Based on feedback from families and following the vision of our synagogue as a whole, concepts and values will now be front and center. Students will still learn skills and information, but those will be tools, not lesson goals.

B'tzelem Elohim means "in the Divine image" and is from the 6 day creation story in the first chapter of Genesis – that's the information and skills. The goal is for students to be able to articulate holiness through words, poems, art and leave knowing how to live understanding the holiness of every person for the rest of their lives. As Religious School Director, my training and skills are meaningless if they don't clearly exemplify that concept: every person is created *b'tzelem Elohim*, including you – the person I am helping through a crisis.

RECYCLING YOUR STUFF

Easily, recycle all the items in your garage basement or attic. No need to hire a junk car hauler. No need to drive stuff to the dump. You can stop procrastinating about clearing out your stuff because you don't know what to do with it.

Here are two easy ways to do recycling:

US.Letgo.com is an online marketplace and application to buy and sell locally from vintage clothes, antique furniture, home goods, used books and retro games, to electronics, preowned cars and studios for rent! No need to place items curbside or pay for town stickers. People just come to you and take the items away. The application is simple to use. Take pictures of your stuff and post. Easier than Craig's list.

Freecycle.org makes it easy to give away your unwanted, but reusable items to people in your local community and find free things that other people are giving away. Everything is always free with no strings attached. Freecycling works through local communities the most active of which have members who help grow the community by telling their friends and family.

Climate Energy Action FEEL BETTER ABOUT FLYING with Jet-Set Offset

As we continue to think about ways to reduce our carbon footprint, we look at renewable energy sources, better auto mileage or electric cars and other personal choices. Air travel is one of the largest contributors of carbon emissions across the world and yet, reducing or avoiding flying is not a very realistic option.

Recently, I discovered a program called Jet-Set Offset to which I can make a mileage based donation to environmental organizations every time I fly. Currently, there are 5 or 6 choices including Green Energy Consumers Alliance (northeast) or Mass Audubon, at the rate of one cent a mile. They continue to vet and add organizations.

In April I flew Hartford to Atlanta, and through my Jet Set Account donated \$34.36 to Green Energy Consumers Alliance. It was easy; they calculate the mileage. You sign up for an account on the website : jetsetoffset.com.

The website has more information and frequently asked questions: You don't have to donate every time, you can change the organization you donate to, you get a receipt etc.

Unless we want to stop exploring the world or visiting far flung friends and family maybe this is one small way to try to reduce our impact of flying. Until we have solar powered electric planes....

Rekindle Shabbat!

Experience the gift of Shabbat by hosting a Shabbat meal for family and friends. Through a generous grant from The Harold Grinspoon Foundation, we have an exciting opportunity to “rekindle Shabbat”, and we have a team of congregants, Gloria Wald, Jennifer Metsch, Linda Kay, Ann Jacobs, eager to assist anyone who would enjoy hosting a Shabbat celebration in their home.

The rules for hosting a Rekindle Shabbat in your home are easy!

- 1. A meal during Shabbat.** You can host people for Friday night Erev Shabbat dinner, Shabbat brunch, or Saturday evening Havdalah. The event must include a least 8 people including the host family.
- 2. Cook it yourself or let someone else do the cooking.** The meal is paid for by the Grinspoon Foundation at a rate of \$22 per adult and \$12 per child, up to \$300 per event. With this money you can cook a wonderful Shabbat meal or you can get take-out or even have the meal catered.
- 3. A Jewish experience!** There must be a leader who will guide some type of Jewish content during the event. The Jewish content can be as simple as leading the blessings over candles, wine, and challah or leading the Havdalah blessings. Here are some other creative ideas for a more in- depth experience:
 - Teach some Jewish songs.
 - Lead a discussion on a Jewish-themed topic that your guests are aware of in advance.
 - Have story starters at the table which have a Jewish theme.

This is a wonderful opportunity to include children in the Shabbat experience.

- Organize a Jewish object scavenger hunt.
- Read stories from PJ Library books.
- Create a Jewish art activity.

Whatever Jewish content you want to have at your Rekindle Shabbat event, we will be glad to assist you.

Any individual or family who would like to host a Shabbat event will need to fill out the grant application on the HGF website. Here are the directions for filling out the grant application:

- 1.** The grant must be filled out two weeks in advance of the event.
- 2.** Go to the the HGF web-site for Rekindle Shabbat: <https://hgf.org/grants-awards/rekindle-shabbat>.
- 3.** Click on “apply here” at the bottom of the page to get to the grant sign-in page. If you don’t have an account, create an account with your e-mail and password.
- 4.** Once you have signed in, the grant will ask you a series of questions to determine eligibility for the grant. For the last of these questions, indicate that you are applying for this event as an individual. For those who live in Connecticut, they will allow you to apply for the grant if you are a member of Sinai Temple.
- 5.** On the first page of the grant application where you fill in your personal information, you will also need to fill out a W-9. The W-9 is needed for HGF’s purposes in order to process your reimbursement and will have no impact on your taxes. Click on the IRS link to fill in the W-9 on-line. Save it to your computer and then upload it to the Grant application. If you need any help with this step of the grant process, please do not hesitate to contact us.
- 6.** On the “Gathering Information” page of the grant application, you will have to estimate the number of attendees and the amount of money you are requesting for the event, and you will need to indicate the Jewish content of the event.
- 7.** After the event, a grant report must be filled out with the actual number of people who attended, and cost of the event must be indicated. A copy of the receipts for the meal must also be scanned and attached to the grant report.

One of our Rekindle Shabbat team members will be available to walk you through the process if you have any problems or questions.

Each person/family can host up to three times during the year and receive the grant money each time.

It is our hope that people will be excited to come together in the celebration of Shabbat, perhaps even reaching out to some congregants who are not as visible at Sinai or those in the larger community. There are some general guidelines, but, for the most part, you will be able to create an event tailored to you and your guests. Rabbi Master and the Rekindle Shabbat team will be available to help and answer questions during each step of the process

TEMPLE SECURITY UP-DATE

In these troubled times, temples and synagogues must address issues of security in ways that they have not in the past. In this regard, Sinai Temple has added some security features and procedures to the presence of police during High Holiday services.

The windows on the doors to the front entrance by the office and those for entry by the kitchen now have shatter proof glass to prevent someone from smashing a window to get in. The door by the canopy already has this type of glass.

In addition, we have added three security cameras that view the most frequent entry points to the Temple. These cameras can be monitored on a tablet or cell phone. During services on Friday nights, for Saturday morning Torah study, and for Saturday morning services, doors will be locked 15 minutes after the start time. A volunteer greeter will monitor the cameras for late-comers and to detect any unwelcome activity. We also have three radio phones that hook up directly to the Springfield police department for greeters to use in case a police presence is needed.

Safety and security need to be everyone's concern and we hope that you will cooperate with these new arrangements and offer your services as a greeter. We will be training greeters for both their welcoming and security functions. 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


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
