

#### Jewish Genealogy

- Jews have been tracking their ancestors for generations, and the Torah is loaded with genealogy
- We honor our ancestors yahrtzeits
- Where we came from influences are identity, our customs, religious beliefs, and future generations
- It's fun to search and discover

#### **Getting Started**

- Start with yourself / what you know
- Add your immediate family/ancestors
- Include those who are living
- Create a family tree and build on it
- Set up organized files/folders (digital and/or old school) best to do both
- Interviews and research (oldest first)

# Genealogy should be more than names and dates

- Stories, letters, photos, family heirlooms, occupations/careers, places, events
- Not just a collection of old information, also an ongoing quest for new information
- MOST IMPORTANT: It's about getting it right, and recording it so it can be shared accurately to current and future generations


#### What you will need:

- Storage: Computer, folders, boxes
- Camera, recorder, computer (smart phone can do all the above)
- Access to libraries, internet, research institutions, cemeteries
- Pedigree charts, family group sheets to collect and record/access information (software will help keep you organized)

- Reunion: (for MAC users) leisterpro.com
- Family Tree Builder: best free software
- RootsMagic: popular with genealogists
- Legacy: wider range of reporting features
- Family Historian: good option for beginners
- Family Tree Maker: discontinued
- Online Tree Builders: Ancestry and others



#### **Useful Search Tools**

#### Daitch-Mokotoff Soundex

- Phonetic algorithm invented in 1985 by Jewish genealogists Gary Mokotoff and Randy Daitch.
- Allows greater accuracy in matching of Slavic and Yiddish surnames with similar pronunciation but differences in spelling.

#### Documenting Your Research:

- Keep good notes: date and identify sources
- Genealogy program is recommended
- Make recordings of interviews
- Fact check information, is it true? Can you verify it with more than one source?
- Watch for name changes, spelling variants, given name patterns
- Good archival practices: NO tape, acid papers, keep photos/documents out of light, separated by plastic sleeves, use folders and binders

**DOCUMENT AND KEEP ORGANIZED** 

### **Interview Strategies**

- Be a good Interviewer:
- Ask permission, be respectful of people's skepticism, fears, and privacy
- Create a list of questions in advance
- Compose a form letter/email
- Contact people by phone or e-mail
- Interview oldest people first
- Make audio/video recordings
- Follow-up/verification

#### Getting it RIGHT

The keeper of family information is an important responsibility

 Sharing inaccurate information will be passed on, repeated, difficult to correct

 Identify and record your sources, ask for sources from others

#### **Common Myths**

- Our name was changed at Ellis Island
- We have the same name, we must be related some how
- It's spelled differently, we can't be related
- All the records were burned or destroyed
- My Bubbie said... My cousin told me...
- It says so on the grave stone or death certificate - it must be correct
- I found it online, it must be true

#### Hierarchy of Information

- Primary Information: Recorded at the time of event or submitted by an eye witness or knowledgeable person, DNA does not lie
- Secondary information: Derived by hearsay or long after the event occurred (try to confirm)
- Original Records: Original information that has not been derived from other records
- Derivative Records: Information that has been collected, repeated, reproduced, transcribed or copied form a previous source. (confirm and corroberate records/information)

#### **Gathering Information:**

- Collect stories, biographies
- Google search (Google Alerts)
- Family parties and events
- Jewish Light, Newspapers.com
- Funerals, shiva houses, eulogies
- Travel call on and meet relatives
- Post and match DNA

#### Where else to look:

- Synagogues: yahrzeits, plaques, histories
- Old Humashim, Siddurim
- Old Photos: collect, identify, label, scan, post online
- Obits, eulogies, news stories, books
- Cemetery records: headstones
- Websites: JewishGen.com, Ancestry.com, MyHeritage.com, Familysearch.org, newspapers.com, stevemorris.org
- Family records, genealogies, photos, data from other researchers, libraries/archives




