Law Meets Life at Kol Rinah

Part of the rabbinical school application asked applicants to read a few books from a list provided, and one of the books I read was *Rereading the Rabbis: A Woman's Voice*, by Judith Hauptman. I remember being inspired by the way Dr. Hauptman, a Professor of Talmud at the Jewish Theological Seminary of America, read ancient texts closely to uncover the ways in which the rabbis of the Talmud were actually progressive, trying to improve the lot of women.

Five years later, I took a class with Rabbi Hauptman (she was ordained as a rabbi in the interim) in which we studied stories in the Talmud about aging. (I taught some of that material last year here at Kol Rinah.) It was a delightful experience realizing that one of the great scholars of Talmud in our generation was also a down-to-earth, kind, and warm person and teacher. It didn't hurt that she had become friends with my parents!

November 3-5 we will be welcoming Rabbi Judith Hauptman to St. Louis. She'll be with us at Kol Rinah for Shabbat (Friday night and Saturday), and then will be at B'nai Amoona Sunday. Her visit is sponsored in part by the Hereld Institute for Jewish Studies at JTS and the Rabbi Bernard Lipnick Foundation for Conservative Judaism and the Sara and Leo Wolf Adult Education Fund.



Her talks the whole weekend will be on the theme, "When Law Meets Life." Friday evening we'll have services followed by dinner and then learning with Rabbi Hauptman on "Law and Narrative in the Talmud." She'll be looking at examples of how stories in the Talmud that immediately follow laws show how the rabbi modified the law to adapt it to real-life circumstances.

Saturday morning, she'll be speaking and teaching during and after services on "Women's Voices in the Talmud," looking at how women made changes in law in the Talmud.

Sunday morning at B'nai Amoona, she'll teach on "How Criticism by One Rabbi of Another Leads to Halakhic Innovation," looking at anecdotes of rabbis visiting one another.

Lest you think Rabbi Hauptman has only spent her time in the academy, know that she also started in 2004 *Ohel Ayalah*, an organization that runs free Passover seders and High Holiday services for 20- and 30-somethings in New York.

She embodies "When Law Meets Life." I hope you will join us for an intellectually and spiritually stimulating weekend with a world-class scholar who is also one of the most charming and beloved teachers I know.

An Invitation To Do Jewish

Men's Club supports or sponsors more than 12 events each year. We always try to have a Jewish emphasis or twist for most of those events. Our goal is to do Jewish. Perhaps one of the most Jewish things one could do is to be a regular minyan attendee. So, consider the following.

In Numbers 14:27, the word edah (assembly or congregation) is applied to the assembly of 10 spies who returned a negative report on the land of Canaan. In Psalm 82, the same word, edah, is applied to the divine assembly: God stands in the divine edah (assembly); among the divine beings God pronounces judgment.

Therefore, the Rabbis extrapolated that a congregation or assembly is comprised of at least 10 Jews. And an assembly must be present when God is being sanctified. Examples of such sanctification are the recitation

of Kaddish (including Mourner's Kaddish), Kedushah and Barchu — none of which can be recited without a minyan — 10 adult Jews.

By the way, several of our weekday morning services at Kol Rinah, as well as some evening services are struggling to have a minyan, a divine assembly. Will you exercise your power of 10 and help make a divine edah, a divine assembly?

Weekday morning services begin at 7am, except for Sunday and holidays such as Thanksgiving, which begin at 8am. They meet in the chapel and are usually finished within one hour. Following the service, except Sunday mornings, breakfast is available in the Sara Myers Community Room.

Weekday evening services begin at 6pm, except for Saturday, which varies with the end of Shabbat. Evening services also meet in the chapel and usually last 45 minutes or less.

Use the Amherst entrance for minyanim.

It would be wonderful if you would pick one day a week — morning or evening — to become a regular member of a divine assembly — a minyan.

Please let us know if we can be of service to any of you as your membership committee.







During Rosh Hashanah, Rabbi Shafrin dropped by the ECC classrooms to blow the shofar. At our family program,

kids picked apples off trees and sorted them by color, sifted through a sensory bin of oats to discover symbols of Rosh Hashanah, and traced and colored apples and honey coloring pages. During Sukkot, Rabbi Arnow stopped by classrooms to show a lulav and etrog. Families also joined us on Sukkot for a pasta dinner in the sukkah. (see back cover)

Last year we held our book fair at Barnes and Noble. It was such a great success that we will be doing it again this year. On November 12, our Preschool Parent Organization is organizing a family event at Barnes and Noble. Just like last year, the book fair will be open for a week, during

Do you remember Middle School? How about High School? If not, here is a reminder—it's really hard; and I assure you, it's gotten harder. These kids are drowning in homework, overloading themselves with extracurricular activities/clubs/sports and barely have a minute to stop and breathe. They talk about being up all night writing papers, studying and trying to grasp concepts that I don't recall even being introduced to until college. And yet, these same kids come to the youth lounge for our

weekly meetings. They come in the door and they smile. They sit and talk to each other and they smile. They ask each other questions and vent to each other their trials and tribulations of the day. They eat, sometimes the first chance they have had all day. They smile.

As I watch them, I find myself smiling, and I realize that there is something significant about this space and this group we have created. Not only do these kids feel comfortable opening up to each other, they look forward to it. No matter how long their day has been, they show up Tuesday night and they participate in activities and discussions. They play games and create art. They learn and grow as young Jews. They aspire to do more, make a difference, change the world. And yes, they smile.

We have many exciting programs ahead of us including themed lounge nights, holiday celebrations, relaxing movie nights, a Shabbaton, community service projects and are even looking

ahead to 2018 and our annual Purim carnival! What will this year's theme be? Stay tuned!

In the next issue of The Voice I will write more in depth about USY and Kadima's Social Action/Tikkun Olam (SA/TO) theme for this year, "everyone deserves a childhood." When Maayan Gazit, our SA/TO VP introduced this to our group. I was both honored and humbled. This year, USY and Kadima will be working with Ranken Jordan Pediatric Bridge Hospital. Those of you who know me know that by day, I am a Social Worker for this incredible hospital—the only hospital of its kind in the country. 
