President's Message

There is an old saying... The third time is a charm. Perhaps in my case it has taken me three times to get it right. And right now, it feels right.

According to Jewish law, once something is done three times it is considered a permanent thing. This is called a "chazakah," a presumption of ownership, presumption of status. Let's say you decide to take on a new task. If you do it once and succeed — it's beginner's luck. A second time— still beginner's luck. If you return for a third time, then you can be trusted, that you have the experience, and perhaps you know what you're doing.

It is also said that the number three represents permanence. That's why we do things in threes, it adds strength, memory to our acts. (Many prayers are repeated three times; the Lulav is waved three times in each direction; etc.) From a Kabbalistic perspective, we know that three is the number of peace and integration. The number two symbolizes duality, difference, division—right vs. left, giving vs. restraint.

Three actually merges the two to create a new entity, Three, which represents the harmonious integration of one and two. That's Kol Rinah.

The Talmud points out that the Torah was given in the third month of the Jewish year, to a people that has three groups (Kohen, Levites, Israelites), and through Moses, who was the third child in his family (after Miriam and Aharon). The (Written) Torah itself is made up of three portions: the Five Books of Moses, the Prophets, and the Writings. Torah is the manual for peace. It teaches how to integrate body and soul, the physical world with its spiritual source. It is "the third" entity, the one that unites the other two.

New Torah Display Cabinet

The Czech Memorial Scrolls Trust (MST) saved these Torahs from neglect after the Nazis had confiscated them, intending to display them in a museum of a dead culture and people. In 1964, these Torahs were housed at Westminster Synagogue in London in numbered cradles for inspection and classification. In 1980 these two Holocaust Torahs came to St. Louis, and were placed in the custody of Kol Rinah's legacy synagogues, Brith Sholom Kneseth Israel (BSKI), and Shaare Zedek.

Today we display these scrolls in a special case in the Guller Chapel so that we may learn about and remember those Jews who perished in the Holocaust. These Holocaust Torah cabinet

very scrolls were held, used, and revered by some of those people.

We hope that history becomes more personal and meaningful from the experience of seeing and learning about these torahs.

We are so fortunate and blessed to have started our 2021-2022 school year in our new center. To witness the pure joy and excitement of the staff, children, and families arriving to school that first day was a truly incredible experience. Parents gleaming with smiles as they pulled up in the carpool line to drop their child/children off. Glancing at teachers happily awaiting the children's arrival to carry or hold hands to walk them across the new play space and take them into school. Then to finally see the look on the kids' faces as the ECC door opened. The first words out of their mouths were, "Look at those lines!" The teachers quickly responded that those colorful lines lead us to our classroom.

As the kids passed each classroom they noticed all the windows and quickly realized that they could see everything going on in each room. It's really cool to see children peeking in on their friends, siblings, and cousins through the windows and not only that, but being able to see through the classrooms to the other hallway.



You've heard of Hedy Lamarr, the beautiful starlet in the 1930s and 40s, who appeared in numerous films starring opposite some of Hollywood's most famous leading men.

However, you probably don't know the other Hedy, born Hedwig Eva Maria Kiesler in Vienna, Austria-Hungary who was so much more.

Incensed over the Nazi takeover of her home country, this highly intelligent woman collaborated with composer George Antheil and invented a secret communication system to form an unbreakable code which she envisioned helping submarines to deploy missiles to allow them not to be detected by enemy ships, thus forming the basis of spread spectrum technology.

Hedy's invention was snubbed by the Navy during WWII because she was an immigrant Jewish Hollywood actress. They waited for the patent to run out and then developed it further to create a sophisticated buoy system which was used during the Cuban Missile Crisis. Hedy never received any acknowledgement or compensation for her invention. No lightbulbs going off?

How about this? That's the basis for much of the modern wireless technology that resulted in cell phones and that today governs: **Wi-Fi, GPS, and Bluetooth**. Interested now? There's a lot more to this fascinating woman and her story.
