A Message from Our Rabbis

I am writing this in mid-August as I sit at my new (for me) desk in my still-new office. The Delta Variant is exploding, and despite vaccinations, we've put our masks back on to minimize risk. But we're back to doing lots of things in person, including services on Shabbat and on the High Holidays (while still streaming too, of course).

A year ago, construction on our offices had not yet begun, and I was working from my old office in our old building. But more often than not, I was working from home, because last summer was still in the midst of the pandemic, with no vaccine available yet.

It's so hard to know, or predict, or even imagine what a new year will bring for us—for any of us individually, or for all of us collectively.

Nonetheless, we can try to understand where it is that we are right now. And we can try to anticipate and plan for what the future might hold.

I anticipate that this year, we will settle into our new home. Plants, furniture, the end of construction for a while, b'nai mitzvah, holidays, meetings, celebrations—these are all happening and in the works. As a congregation, we'll also be continuing to figure out what dimensions of our community will remain virtual and what will transition back to being in-person. We'll continue to think about what we have learned and are still learning from the pandemic, and how we must change, and adapt. What should return to "normal," and what "new normals" have been established?

It still feels like we are, in some way, living in a time that is not normal, that must at some point come to an end. We don't know when that end will be though, nor do we know what it will look like—not for us as a nation, nor as individuals, nor as a congregation.

How do you think we should be adapting and changing to sustain ourselves during this time? How are

we doing? What do you miss? And what do you actually not miss?

What I miss most of all is seeing so many of you so much more regularly than I do now. I hope, and pray that that is able to change soon, and that we will be able to be together once again, unafraid.

May you be inscribed and sealed in the book of life.

Preparing for New Possibilities

What is the proper path for a person to walk down? Any path which, through its journey, brings honor to a person and earns them esteem from others.

Mishnah Avot 2:1

When we think about a learning journey for our young people, we often imagine setting them on a path to move forward in their lives. We want to give them the skills to succeed, the knowledge to support their endeavors, the courage to find their way and face new challenges, and the ideals to become the best version of themselves. As parents and educators, we also want them to "become good people." In Hebrew, we have a term for this: דרך ארץ (derech erez), which literally means, "the ways of the land," but is more commonly understood as common decency and respect for others.

One of the ways to understand this idea comes from the rabbis of the Mishna who tell us that there is no one way to be a good person in the world.

In fact, they acknowledge that each person may have a different way of engaging with the world around them, but that in the end, it is the way we give respect to others, and receive it from them in turn, that can show us we are on the right path. Moreover, walking down the path of life alongside people we trust, respect, and care for only helps us to find our way through an ever-changing world.

With the onset of the fall, we are once again looking forward to another great school year at our Kol Rinah Education Hub (KoREH). Though we are still working under the shadow of the COVID-19 pandemic, we are bringing together an amazing group of learners, both children and parents, as well as an incredible team of staff and madrichim (classroom assistants) to create new learning adventures for all. We have kept protocols, such as vaccinating our staff and requiring everyone to wear masks during the school day, and have created new

avenues for learning and engagement throughout the last year. Between new projection technology, re-equipping our classrooms, participating in professional development, and creative team-building, we are excited to dive into this new year of learning and growing.

But most critically, we have learned anew how much care our students and families share with one another, especially when times have been hard. Some of our students are going to be learning in person for the first time in a year. All of us have struggled to make sure we feel safe, our voices heard, and can continue to learn and grow and discover new ways to engage Jewishly with the world around us.

So, as we start the 2021-2022 school year at KoREH, we are looking forward to traveling down new paths of learning together, with curiosity, excitement, questions, and compassion for one another.

We have realized over our many years in operation that one of the things that our families really appreciate in addition to our warm, nurturing environment and educational philosophy is our location. Many of the families that already send their child/children to our program work in Clayton and are so happy that the new center is within walking distance of their workplace. Equally as important as our location, families care about what sets
