




### **BJC Book Club Notice**

### THE RABBI'S MESSAGE

Rabbi Eric, L Abbott

"Passover Love Song" by Rabbi Hara E. Person<sup>1</sup>

The seder is a love song written in the language of silver polish and dishpan hands freshly grated lemon zest blanched almonds ground pecans shelled pistachios pitted olives sliced meat matzah meal white tablecloths to-do lists trips to Boro Park and Sahadi's

This is how it's done.

ashkenazi haroset
vegetarian chopped liver
my mother's real chopped liver
Bonnie's matzah ball soup
Israeli salad
gefilte fish terrine
chestnut farfel stuffing
tzimmes
leek and shallot kugel
salmon in grape leaves with pine nuts
turkey and brisket
coconut macaroons
sephardic lemon pistachio cookies
pecan meringues
chocolate dipped apricots

Remember.

tables stretched the length of the house
tulips on the mantle
my grandmother's blue glass plates
Aunt Hannah and Uncle Joe's silver
Nana's candlesticks
the silver salt bowls from my mother
Frieda and Solly's cut-glass horseradish pot
the wedding present seder plate
grape juice stains on the tablecloth
thin paperback haggadot
our mismatched family of friends
silly half-versions of songs
and don't lick the wine from your finger after the plagues

Don't be fooled by the easy domesticity of these words.

This is more than a recipe for nostalgia.

This is an urgent coded message of
survival
adaptation
love.

Read between the words.

Rabbi Person's beautiful poem strikes a chord for me as I consider the way my views of Passover have transformed over time. In my youth (and still today), I loved preparing for the ritualized meal: laying the tablecloth, setting out our nice cutlery, preparing extra bowls for the dipping, and placing countless other items that only come out once a year. While I would set everything up, the kitchen radiated the wonderful scents of chicken soup, brisket, and more, diligently tended to by my parents. Then, we sat down and began

the Seder. My family never walked through the Seder step by step. Instead, we would constantly interrupt with questions, with stories, and with singing. Finally, we got to the meal—and how delicious it was!

When I was a child and even through today, I looked forward to these sensory, delicious, heartwarming elements of the Seder: the food, the singing, and the conversations. As I grew older and older, however, and especially as I journeyed down my path toward the rabbinate, I also came to understand the deeper meanings behind the holiday. I internalized what Rabbi Person calls in her poem the "urgent coded message" of Passover. The holiday is not simply about the meal or its rituals—its purpose is much deeper.

What are some of the main messages of the holiday? While I'm sure other rabbis would create their own list, here are some of the elements of mine. First, we share our story. This is, as I've shared before, what Rabbi Jonah Dov Pesner of the Religious Action Center calls "the defining master story of our tradition."

We tell the story of our ancestors: how they were "wandering Arameans" who travelled down to Egypt and became enslaved—until God redeemed them with miracles.<sup>3</sup> Yet we do not simply take the story and leave it be. "Once we were slaves, now we are free," we say in the Haggadah; but then we do something about it. For many Seders—perhaps you celebrate this way in your own home—we apply that story to our own world. We ask, "Who else is still enslaved today? Who is marginalized and oppressed? How can we help them?"

This brings us to another key message: the importance of asking questions. The Mishnah tells us that a child is supposed to ask their parent questions about the Seder, and if the child is too young to ask, then the parent teaches them what to say (what we now know as the Four Questions). But as my teacher Rabbi Larry Hoffman explains, the point is not to ask these specific questions, but rather simply to make sure that we ask any question at all. By asking questions, we notice that the night is different, that there is a story to tell, and that it is our duty to make it personal.

Finally, unlike many other holidays, we do not perform these rituals while sitting in the pews of a sanctuary; rather, we gather together with friends and family over a meal. The setting deepens the experience as it becomes full of storytelling, laughter, delicious foods, and love. This can happen whether we're in our own homes, those of friends or family, or even right here at BJC (and I hope you will join us!). More than almost any other holiday, Passover literally brings the Jewish experience home.

Therefore, as we observe Passover this year, may we continue to smell and eat delicious food, sing fun, meaningful, and sometimes goofy songs (*Chad Gadya*!), and enjoy the festivities around our tables. As we do, I hope we also find ourselves inspired by the words of Rabbi Person's poem as we take to heart some of the key teachings of the holiday: to share our Jewish "master story" and apply it to our lives; to ask questions; and to enjoy time with friends and family.

Chag Pesach sameach—Happy Passover!


