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

Relationships: Past, Present, and Future

One year ago this week, on July 1, 2022, I began the exciting work of being your Spiritual Leader here at Bethesda Jewish Congregation. I decided, for this one-year anniversary, to look back at some of what I had written as I first embarked on this journey. In my very first piece for BJC Insights, I quoted Dr. Ron Wolfson, who teaches, "People will come to synagogues...for programs, but they will stay for relationships." In my first sermon on Friday night, I echoed that theme, stating, "This is exactly what I hope to continue to build at BJC: A community built on relationships, cooperation, and shared values." In both cases, I invited the community to partner with me in the work of relational Judaism and to join me for coffee dates so I could get to know you (and, in return, you know me).

Thankfully, that invitation paid off. In this past year, I have gone on at least 58 coffee dates (and ice cream dates!) with 80 individuals—and that excludes all of the work-related meetings, pastoral calls, Zoom sessions with prospective members, life cycle gatherings, and other ways in which I have engaged individuals. During these sitdowns, I have gotten to know so much of what makes the folks at BJC tick and why folks joined our community, from the importance to interfaith acceptance to spirituality and music to the desire for a more fluid and accepting Jewish space.

As I have built these relationships, I have also been seeing the relationships that exist between community members. I have seen members come together to support each other during times of grief, providing support at funerals and shiva. I watched as our Saturday morning regulars welcomed the newest member of our minyan gathering, baby Eli. I have discovered whose kids play sports together on the weekends, who drives whom to BJC events, and who used to be neighbors (and even one case of one member living in another member's childhood home!). Even just last week, I observed with awe as two members dropped everything to support their friend after the loss of a loved one.

These moments stand out because they reflect the power of relationships and the beauty of BJC. We have the potential to create meaningful and lasting friendships and relationships, and many of us have.

Yet I know that not everyone can relate to these deep bonds within the community. Dr. Wolfson, the aforementioned expert in relational Judaism, shares a story of what can go wrong in a synagogue:

A rabbi confides in me, "A woman who was a member of my synagogue for twenty years resigned. I was shocked because she showed up to all of our programs. So, I called her to ask why she was leaving. You know what she said? 'I came to everything, and I never met anybody.'" <sup>2</sup>

I hope, I pray that this is not true of us, and yet I know that it very well could be. I know that some of us come to events yet still do not know other people's names, nor they ours. I know there are families in the religious school who do not yet know the other grownups.

And so I challenge us: Let us make these relationships even more meaningful. Let us continue the sacred work of building a covenantal community. Let us deepen the relationships with those we already know and broaden our interactions to meet new people:

- Do you only come on Saturday mornings? Join us on a Friday night! And vice versa!
- Do you drop your kids off for religious school and then do some shopping? Stay and schmooze with the other grownups!
- Too scared to join us for Torah Today? The good news is, I recognize that not everyone grew up studying Torah and this might be your first time, and so I strive to make our learning accessible to all—including providing opportunities to share of ourselves (for, after all, it is the subject we each know best).
- And, of course, my coffee date invitation is still open.

Yet perhaps what is more important than attending new programs is that when we do show up, I hope that we strive to actively, consciously get to know each other. Ask each other's names; check in about someone's week; learn what they do for fun outside of BJC; find out what makes them tick. It might take some effort, and, for some of us, we might have to push ourselves out of our comfort zone a bit. Yet, I believe, it is worth it.

Our tradition teaches, "Two are better off than one...for should they fall, one can raise the other; but woe betide the one who is alone and falls with no companion to raise them." May we continue to build a synagogue in which we can raise each other up in times of joy and in times of grief. May we continue to build relationships that may have a lasting impact of support and camaraderie. May we continue to build a community of covenant and love. Amen.

I also invite you to share with me your own labels and how well you think BJC is doing at communicating that we value those aspects of you. No institution can meet all the needs of every person, but the more we know about who you are and what's important to you, the better informed we will be when making decisions about how to allocate our resources and the more we can help congregants connect to each other.








#### Bethesda Big Train vs Southern Maryland Senators

For as many years as many of remember, we have supported the National Center for Children and Families (NCCF) -- helping their students get ready for back to school. This family shelter, which is just behind BJC on Greentree Road, has a large student population in all grades, and the families have limited resources for school supplies—which have only gotten more expensive.

NCCF has a target delivery date of our donations of August 10, but will take donations through the end of August. We make it easy for you! There will be a big box outside of the BJC office door. #### Bethesda Help

Linda Blumberg and I have been delivering food on behalf of Bethesda Help for almost 3 years. Food delivery consists of in-person deliveries to persons and families who call to request help. The food quantities are determined by family size, with special, nutritious snack packs for children in those families. To assure that families have access to fresh, non-shelf stable food, each delivery comes with \$20-\$40 in Giant gift cards, again depending on the size of the family. Individuals and families are eligible for up to 2 deliveries per month.

In addition to food, Bethesda Help provides assistance with prescription glasses and metro fare cards. The Officers of the Day (ODs), who receive client calls the night before delivery, also provide information to assist clients who are having difficulty paying utility costs. The ODs also are trained to refer families that need alternative financial assistance to appropriate private and governmental entities. Bethesda Help also needs more ODs – a task that does not require work outside your home.

Bethesda Help takes clients in lower Montgomery County. Clients find Bethesda Help through notices at schools, community centers, and word of mouth. In addition, school counselors who recognize that students need food assistance refer parents to Bethesda Help. Bethesda Help averages 10-15 deliveries per day to individual families, five days a week (excluding holidays) throughout the year.

Linda and I have enjoyed working with Bethesda Help because it is a limited time commitment each month, well-organized, and offers a tangible way to perform an act of tikkun olam by directly assisting people facing food insecurity.
