




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THE RABBI'S MESSAGE

This year, we celebrate Pride at BJC. But how do we do so when it can be so hard to be seen by others?

An old Chasidic tale tells us about Reb Nahman Kossover, who believed that the best way to connect with God was to consistently consider God's four-letter name, YHWH—to picture in one's mind the four letters over and over and over again. When Reb Nahman preached at the synagogue, he found it easy to see God's name on every face in the community. Yet when he sold his wares at the market, he found it significantly tougher. With the frenzied pace of buying and selling, Reb Nahman could not as easily focus on every face. He became frustrated and downcast with this disconnection—until he developed a solution. He soon hired an assistant, who only had one role: to stand there, to be Reb Nahman's reminder. Now, whenever Reb Nahman looked at his assistant, he could once again see God¹.

This story reminds us of a core Jewish value, b'tzelem Elohim. In Genesis 1:27, during the creation of the world, God creates humanity b'tzelem Elohim, in God's image. The Torah implores us to see others as reflections of the Divine and to behave accordingly. Treating other people with dignity, compassion, and respect—these behaviors flow from this central idea. Granted, as the story above shows, sometimes this can be hard, such as when we're in a hurry at the grocery store or someone cuts us off on the road. Nonetheless, our aspirational goal should be to treat others as, well, humans—humans created in God's image.

Yet lately, if you have been following the news, you will have seen that more and more often, there are folks out there who do not see others through this lens. Shockingly and frighteningly, there has been a rise in anti-LGBTQ+ rhetoric, legislation, and actions. As of this writing, the ACLU is tracking 491 anti-LGBTQ bills in the US, including restrictions on medical care for trans folks and bans on drag shows. Far-right insurgents continue to plan to terrorize and disrupt LGBTQ+ events. There is, of course, the infamous "Don't Say Gay" law—which Governor DeSantis recently expanded. Even in Israel, far-right extremists have threatened the Jerusalem Pride Parade.

These folks fail to understand what we know: that we each deserve to be seen as we are; that we each deserve to receive empathy, recognition, and honor; that each of us, no matter our gender, our expressions of identity, our love lives, are children of God. And that is why —because we each are created b'tzelem Elohim—it is upon us, as Jews, to stand up with and for the LGBTQ+ community, as members and as allies. As Rabbi Rachel Timoner of Congregation Beth Elohim in Brooklyn writes:

Jews have a vital role to play in the tikkun [repair] that is needed both for the Jewish people and for the American people. First, we must assert our pluralistic, egalitarian vision for Judaism and the Jewish people. Second, we must teach an interpretation of the Hebrew Bible that allows for the full humanity, dignity, and expression of people of all sexual orientations and genders. Third, we must advocate in the public sphere for the liberation of LGBT people and all people from heterosexism, homophobia, transphobia, and sexism.

Each of us has this vital role to play. Each of us can partake in this act of tikkun olam, repair of the world.

At BJC, we're proud to start taking bold action for LGBTQ+ inclusion, acceptance, and belonging. We have recently joined Keshet's DC Shivyon Cohort, in which we're developing strategies to address our culture, policies, and programs around LGBTQ+ life. Please let me know if you want to join our team (whether as a member of the LGBTQ+ community or as an ally!).

To kick us off, we're celebrating Pride this month. Join us on Friday, June 9, for Pride Shabbat and a celebration of LGBTQ+ life. Then on Saturday, June 10, we will head into the District for the Capital Pride Parade (click here to find out more and sign up to march). Come join us—show the DMV who we are!

You can get involved in other ways, too, such as signing onto this open letter from parents and allies of trans kids seeking greater action from Jewish leaders. Beyond these events, keep an eye out for more LGBTQ+ programming and some new LGBTQ-inclusive policies.

Looking for more information? Want to know more about the intersection of Jewish and LGBTQ+ life? (Want to ask some of those questions you may have been too afraid to ask?) Here are some more resources:

In a world where not everyone recognizes the basic humanity in each other, may we at BJC strive to live up to that fundamental Torah teaching: that we are all created in God's image. May we each, like Reb Nahman, see God's name in every individual. And may we, through our actions and love of one another, find blessings. To help us get there, I share this excerpt from "A Blessing for Pride":

Sh'chinah shel ahavah, Presence of love, You embrace us with Your love. May we embrace ourselves, our partners, our lovers, our friends, our children, our dear ones with the power of Your ahavah rabah, Your unending, boundless love.

Ru'ach hashalom, Spirit of peace and wholeness, open our eyes to the gifts and blessings we offer and receive from each other; open our hearts to welcome each other fully and truly; open our hands to embrace, to support, to lift each other b'gilah b'rinah uv'rei'ut—with joy, with song, and with deep friendship. ...

We bless You, Wellspring of our lives; may You fill us with joy and sanctity. Amen.²





Juneteenth *By Karen Levi*

Juneteenth in Texas.

The Emancipation Proclamation became law at the stroke of midnight on January 1, 1863. But not all enslaved people would be unshackled; those in the western Confederate states were not emancipated until June 19, 1865, when 2,000 Union soldiers arrived in Texas to announce that the black people in bondage were liberated by executive decree. This day came to be known as

The day has been commemorated in Texas and in the African American community. However, most Americans remain unaware of the significance of the day. President Biden signed the bill in 2021 to make Juneteenth a national holiday. The first Juneteenth commenced the fight for full citizenship rights and autonomy for African Americans. Those freed could not have imagined that 158 years later, their descendants would continue "to fight structural erasure of their lives, history and even their sacred burial ground", according to Dr. Marsha Adebayo of the BACC.

There will be other celebrations around the county. For example, the BACC (Bethesda African Cemetery Coalition) will hold a Juneteenth Celebration (on June 19) at the site of the former Moses Cemetery, next to 5124 River Road, from 2-4 p.m. They will hold a service of Interfaith Healing and Reconciliation on June 17, 2 p.m., at the Macedonia Baptist Church (5119 River Road).

This year BJC members will participate with BHPC members at Cabin John Mall, on Monday, June 19, 2023, at a tent located at the Interfaith and Social Action Pavilion from 9 AM to 4 PM. This event is part of a larger celebration for the historical Black community of Scotland in Potomac, MD.

From the Festival website: "When the Scotland Community was at risk of being eliminated by socioeconomic forces in the 1960s, it was the surrounding faith community who stepped in with a "Save Our Scotland" campaign. In 2023, a similar campaign, "The Second Century Project," was formed by the Scotland AME Zion Church to bring together leaders in faith, business, and the broader community. This area of the festival will be filled with fun and games under the theme of "What it Means to be a Neighbor!""
