




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THE RABBI'S MESSAGE

Rabbi Eric. L Abbott

Sefirat Ha'Omer: The Eternal Journey toward Sinai

We are on a journey...

Not so long ago, we were in a place of fear and longing. For generations, our people were enslaved. Then, we experienced frightening plagues: blood, insects, hail, darkness. Armies, with their swords and their spears and their rearing horses, chased us. We scaled the rocky cliffs, traversed the roaring sea. And finally—we were free.

Now, we continue our journey as we head eastward. The desert sun beats down. The land appears foreign and unfamiliar. We are in a space of the unknown.

But looming on the horizon: a mountain. Towering above the wilderness, its peak reaching to heaven itself, Mount Sinai beckons us. It calls us to prepare: To purify ourselves, to prepare our bodies, to prepare souls. And then we stand ready. The anticipation is palpable. Soon, we will rise and receive the greatest gift God gave the Jewish people: the Torah.

This ancient journey echoes to us from the past as we reenact it every year. Just a few weeks ago, we left Egypt once again as we celebrated the holiday of Passover. As we sat around our family or congregational tables, we retold the words that our ancestors have said for generations: "Once we were slaves, now we are free." We celebrate our redemption.

And, like our ancestors, we now look ahead. When they journeyed through the wilderness, they eventually arrived at Mount Sinai and experienced revelation, receiving the foundation of our lives: the Torah and all its laws and commandments. So, too, do we: In just a few weeks, we will celebrate the holiday of Shavuot, a reenactment of Sinai and a celebration of receiving the gift of Torah.

But right now, like the Israelites of old, we're in between the two moments: between redemption and revelation, between Passover and Shavuot. This period is called Sefirat Ha'Omer, "the Counting of the Omer," in which we count each day from Passover to Shavuot. This practice started as an agricultural ritual of counting the sheaves of the first fruit harvest and has become a spiritual endeavor in which we develop on our very being, our souls.

Just as the Israelites had to prepare to receive Torah, so, too, do we prepare for Shavuot—through the Counting of the Omer. For many Jews, especially the mystics, counting the Omer is an opportunity for spiritual and inner growth. Each day, each count, is an opportunity to focus on a specific value and find a way to better ourselves. For instance, Monday, May 1, the 25th day of the Omer, keenly focuses on the idea of netzach, or "endurance." Where are the instances in our lives in which we have the capacity for endurance? What do we need a little more strength to endure? How can we develop skills to address these questions?

Ultimately, we use this as a tool to prepare to stand at Sinai once again on Shavuot. What might it mean to be at the holy mountain, just as our ancestors did many years ago? How can we accept, interpret, or reinterpret Torah to fit our lives? Perhaps, as Dr. Judith Plaskow famously taught, standing again at Sinai means including the voices of the those who have not traditionally been heard: women, as she originally taught, and also LGBTQ+ folks, interfaith families, and others. Perhaps it means taking our tradition, immersing ourselves in it, and making it our own—even if that means adapting or changing it. Maybe we must set out on a personal journey to find the right balance of personal morals, communal ethics, and Torah teachings to live a full Jewish life.

Whichever way we get there, may we once again embark on our journey from redemption to revelation, from freedom to Jewish living. May we once again stand at Sinai. May we make Torah our own and find the wisdom and drive to take ownership of our Jewish lives. And, whether through Counting the Omer or otherwise, may we find an opportunity for spiritual growth and inner development.



THE FRIENDS CLUB

Did you know that our shared sacred space is also the home to The Friends Club? I have volunteered at The Club for about twelve years, and it has and continues to be a spiritual and rewarding experience.

The Club is designed for men diagnosed with dementia. It provides them with a warm, non-institutional setting and the opportunity to socialize with their peers and enhance their overall quality of life. Established in 1990, it is a non-profit, non-sectarian program, supervised by two experienced professionals and assisted by volunteers . Every Monday, Wednesday and Thursday, twelve men meet in the lounge from 9:30 to 1:30. A typical day's program would be about an hour of discussion of current events or reminiscing about movies, sports or travel, and a short video on some interesting topic followed by a physical activity such as cornhole or golf toss, then a musical performance, then lunch. We usually end with a modified word game like Idiom or our version of jeopardy.

In addition to serving as a bridge between the social isolation of early-stage Alzheimers and the more traditional care services, The Friends Club offers support and respite for the men's caregivers, generally their spouses, through the Caregiver Support Group which meets twice a month in the Library. We hope to expand the program to four days a week which means we would have forty-eight slots available, as compared to the current thirty-six positions. The Friends Club thrives on referrals and we always need more volunteers.

I'm proud that I am part of a community that is both spiritual and is engaged in a social program that enhances the lives of people in need. If you have any questions about The Friends Club feel free to contact me or the Executive Director, Ken Silverstein at Ken@Friendsclubbethesda.org.
