
They are the stars that brighten our lives, the lights that continue to guide us—and so, we remember.



### Change is Life, and Life is Change by Barry Dwork





Our adherence to our Jewish values is about to be put to a test.

Since April, the governors of Texas and Arizona have been busing asylum seekers to Washington, DC – and more recently, New York and Chicago. Their objective is transparent – to bring panic to northern cities, in the hope of pressuring the Administration to seal off our southwest border.

Our community is now facing a question: do we bewail our fate and try to wall off these migrants, most of whom are fleeing oppressive regimes like Venezuela, Cuba, and Nicaragua, or do we support them as they try to make new lives for themselves?

We know what the Torah teaches about this matter. The rabbis who count these things tell us that the Torah says the following in 36 different places, in slightly different ways: "The stranger who resides with you shall be to you as one of your citizens; you shall love him as yourself, for you were strangers in the land of Egypt." As one rabbi notes, the Torah could have said that because no one helped the Jewish people, we don't owe anything to anyone. Instead, it says just the opposite: that the Jewish people's history of hardship is exactly the reason why we are called upon to show chesed, lovingkindness, to immigrants in our midst.

We also know that migrants coming from these desolate places have shown themselves to be the hardest working, entrepreneurial ones among us, able to overcome the toughest barriers to success if given a chance.

And finally, it should give us comfort that we Jews don't have a monopoly on the value of honoring the stranger. Similar sentiments are prominent in Christian and Muslim sacred texts, and are long-held values of decent American communities throughout our history.

So we have plenty of like-minded citizens throughout our area who are willing and able to provide the guidance and support that will make our area a continuing beacon of hope. Let's continue to work together and show how it can be done.



Each year, our Yizkor Book pays tribute to the people and community of Boskovice, also known as Boskowitz, for whom BJC serves as home of its sacred Holocaust Torah. Our charge is to keep the memory of Boskovice and its people alive, caring for and studying their Torah.

Bethesda Jewish Congregation is a proud guardian of one of 1,564 Torah scrolls that, having been gathered for storage during World War II, survived the communities that owned them before the Shoah. Scroll # 143, from the town of Boskovice located in Moravia, Czech Republic, is on permanent loan to Bethesda Jewish Congregation from the Czech Memorial Scrolls Trust in London. It is over 160 years old and arrived at BJC in 1971.

Boskovice was home to one of the largest Jewish communities in the province of Moravia. On March 19, 1942 the entire Jewish population of the town was deported and/or executed by the Nazis. Only 14 Jews are known to have survived. A descendent of one surviving family, Charles Ticho, visited BJC in 2005 and read from this Sefer Torah, one of only four that remain intact from the town.

Very fragile, with holes where vermin gnawed on the sheepskin, faded print in many places, and with a few missing sections, the congregation still lovingly reads from the scroll on Yom HaShoah and on, or near, the anniversary of Kristallnacht. With 160+ years of service, we consider it the oldest member of our congregation and honor the memory of the Jewish community of the town each time we take it from the ark.



The Chesed Society was formed several years ago to assist the Rabbi and expand his role in the "good and welfare" of BJC members.

### The Committee:

- Visits and keeps in touch with congregants, particularly through illness and times of sadness
- Provides assistance to people observing Shiva
- Provides rides to religious services or other congregational events
- Provides rides for occasional appointments or errands
- Provides meals for people recovering from surgery
- Sends cards for major events such as illness/surgery bereavement, births, weddings, engagements, and special anniversaries and birthdays




