

## נטילת ידים - Hand Washing

After making Kiddush on Friday evening and again at Shabbat lunch, we prepare for the recitation of the blessing over bread, Ha-motzi, by washing our hands.

This is meant to be a ritual washing, and not one for cleaning our hands. It is customary to remove all jewelry from our hands before washing.

Fill a cup of water and pour it over each hand. After this has been completed, say the following blessing before drying your hands.

It is customary to not talk until Ha-motzi has been recited.

Barukh atah Adonai, our God, sovereign of time and space, who has provided us with a path to holiness through the observance of mitzvot and has instructed us to wash our hands.

## רמוציא - Ha-motzi

On Friday evening and again at Shabbat lunch, two uncut loaves of hallah are uncovered and the following blessing is recited. After the meal, Birkat Ha-mazon is recited. Birkat Ha-mazon can be found in a bentcher or on page 87 of Siddur Lev Shalem.

Barukh atah Adonai, our God, sovereign of time and space, who brings forth bread from the earth.
