2015

2019

OTUSY wins the Seaboard Region Chapter of the Year award!!!!

This came after the work of the 2019 chapter board as well as the work building up the chapter over the previous years. The award was presented after the annual awards ceremony at Seaboard USY Spring Convention, where 16 OTUSYers were able to celebrate together on this achievement.

2020

OTUSY had a lock-in recently where 13 teens set up a Power Pack in partnership with the Social Action Committee and made blankets for premature newborns. We packaged more than 173 Power Packs and made seven tied blankets to donate to people in need.

The night began with Havdalah, then we were briefed on our first activity, a scavenger hunt. Set up by the OTUSY Board's very own Alexi Wirpel, the hunt took the chapter all around the synagogue while learning about the history and artwork at OT, allowing us to explore possibly previously unexplored places. After a few ups and downs through the game, Team 1 put all the pieces of the puzzle together and won the game. Though it was getting late the fun wasn't even close to over.

After the scavenger hunt we all made our way back down to the Social Hall to pack as many Power Packs as we could. After setting up the tables and sorting through the foods we began to pack as fast as we could. At the end we packed over 173 full bags and still had food to spare for next time.

After a few rigorous activities it was time to settle down. We turned on a movie and started to make hand tied blankets for premature newborns through Project Linus. Some of us changed into our pajamas and got our sleeping bags out, while others had some snacks to fuel up for the rest of the night. When the movie ended it

OTUSY still wasn't done! It was time for the traditional game of Jungle Speed, a high speed card game involving memory, reflexes, and strenath.


To our Olam Tikvah community,

As we approached Passover, we arrived again at our annual remembrance of the Jewish peoples' bitter slavery and eventual Exodus from Egypt. We recalled the 10 plagues sent to punish Pharaoh for enslaving the Hebrews, how Moses confronted Pharaoh and led us out of bondage, and how the Jewish people became Am Yisrael. But most of all, we recalled how God rescued and protected us, splitting the sea and crushing the Egyptian army in order to guarantee our freedom.

The story of our Exodus from Egypt is a defining aspect of Judaism. It is a formative moment for Am Yisrael the first time we emerge as a nation and govern ourselves. But even more than that, the Exodus is the primary example of God's influence and empathy for the Jewish people. To this day, it is one of the moments that we thank God for the most in our prayers; every Shabbat we praise God who "rescued us from Egypt, and redeemed us from the house of bondage" in the silent paragraph before Mi Khamokha.

God's rescue of the Jewish people from slavery in Egypt, with a strong hand and an outstretched arm, builds upon our covenant with God and further establishes our faith in God to support us when we are in need. It is the prototypical example of how the Jewish people find strength and resilience through our Judaism, trusting that God will protect us and grant us freedom. Throughout our history of thousands of years of exile from our homeland, including more than a few heinous attempts to kill Judaism entirely, we have always looked back to the Exodus to find our faith in times of need - God protected us then, so God will protect us now.

Even today, the Exodus teaches

us how to rely on Judaism as a source of strength. Tikkun Olam (repairing the world), one of the core aspects of Judaism, tells us to find resilience in Judaism and work to help others or fix injustices. Although Tikkun Olam can be difficult and sometimes strenuous work, it is critically important because of its relationship to our covenant with

God. Our strength to take action when we see injustice in the world stems from our connection with Judaism and with God.

One way I find strength in my Judaism is through USY. Participating in Olam Tikvah's USY chapter and supporting Tikkun Olam projects is just one connection I have to my Judaism and my connection with God. Judaism provides me with a foundation of morals and lessons, which motivate me to participate in OTUSY's Social Action and Tikkun Olam projects

So, with Passover in mind, I encourage you to find your source of strength within Judaism and, if you're a teenager at Olam Tikvah or you happen to know one, maybe that source of strength could be through OTUSY.
