# Why can't we all just get along? Maybe there's a better way to look at it.

Let's consider the dilemma Rabbi Moses ben Israel Isserles was faced with. Better known as the "Rema" – the acronym of his name – Rabbi Isserles was a renowned scholar who flourished in the mid-sixteenth sixteenth century Poland where he was hard at work on a comprehensive code of law.

In the midst of his labour it came to his attention that the great rabbi Joseph Caro had already completed such a code. Caro's erudition and fame made the Rema despair that anyone would ever read his own: "I was afraid that I had worked in vain and laboured for naught and robbed my eyes of sleep to no end...I was in a state of confusion for many days." In time, however, the Rema saw that while he could not replace Caro's magisterial work, he could add to it. The Rema added sources, the current Ashkenazic practices (Caro was a Sephardic Jew living in Zefat and was recording only those laws applicable to his fellow Sephardic Jews), and dissenting opinions.

The Rema could have published his own book, but he knew that differences, that do not divide give rise to something greater. By allowing Jews to understand that differing thoughts and practices can coexist on the same page, these two great scholars set a model for the generations. Their book is called the Shulhan Arukh, the "Set Table", and it became the preeminent code of law in Jewish history. It is the essential code book for Jewish religious life to this very day. As so often happens in Jewish tradition, argument bred intimacy; the two great scholars - Rabbi Moses Isserles and Rabbi Joseph Caro - are now printed on the very same page. Caro's writing in the centre, Isserles's in the middle too but italicized.



There are many examples where differences of opinion create lasting connections between people. S.Y. Agnon is Israel's sole winner of the Nobel Prize for literature and had a lifelong competition with the renowned scholar Klausner. They lived on the same street and Klausner was said to have been floored when he heard of Agnon's success. However, today if you want to visit Agnon's Museum, you'll find it on Klausner Street. The examples are many ...David Ben Gurion and Menachem Begin. Shammai and Hillel.

On Shavuot we celebrate the giving of the Torah. But we are charged to remember the Torah was given to the people of Israel, not the people of Israel to the Torah. As its "owners" we debate, disagree, get angry, slam doors but are called to realize through argument we draw closer to each another and to our tradition. Our tradition of elevating questions over answers might strike people as the antithesis of this wish. But in doing so our history has shown our concern isn't homogeneity but unity. Paradoxically, our differences create our shared success.

As I write Israel's government is reported in good faith to be working with its opposition parties to formulate a broad consensus for changes to its judicial system. It is impossible to



know what the outcome may be by the time this article reaches you but they need to be talking and the search for common ground is essential. Now is as good a time as any to learn compromise isn't contrary to our values but it is the inherent value. When this ground is found the State of Israel will emerge stronger and closer. As you, I pray daily for peace within and outside her borders.







#### **Flowers**


It's a tradition to decorate for Shavuot using flowers and greenery, based upon a midrash that the foot of Mount Sinai was carpeted with greens and sweet-smelling flowers upon the granting of the Torah.

#### Shavuot

The word Shavuot means "weeks." It marks the completion of the seven-week Omer counting period between Passover and Shavuot.

### Two Meals

On the holiday of Shavuot, a two-loaf bread offering was brought in the Temple. To commemorate this, we eat two meals on Shavuot—first a dairy meal, and then, after a short break, we eat the traditional holiday meat meal.

### TISHA B'AV SERVICES

Wednesday, July 26 | Fast Begins at 8:48 p.m. Mincha/Ma'ariv: 8:45 p.m. Thursday, July 27 | Fast Ends at 9:27 p.m. Shacharit: 7:30 a.m. Mincha/Ma'ariv: 8:45 p.m.

### TISHA B'AV

Tisha B'Av, the 9th day of the month of Av, is the saddest day on the Jewish calendar because of the incredible series of tragedies which occurred on that date throughout Jewish History, including the destruction of both the 1st and 2nd Temples. We mark this occasion with a 25-hour fast, and by reading the book of Eichah (Lamentations). However, Tisha B'Av is not your run-of-the-mill fast day, as it is the only 25-hour fast day in our calendar other than Yom Kippur, and Yom Kippur isn't even a day of mourning. Yom Kippur is a Yom Tov, a day of rejoicing and celebration. We shower, put on fresh clothes and wish each other a "Gut Yom Tov" or "Chaq Sameach". Our last meal before Yom Kippur is with our families and we smile and laugh throughout the meal. But on Tisha B'Av there are no such exchanges, no clean clothes, and no showers. Our last meal before the start of Tisha B'Av is eaten alone; just some bread and salt with a symbolic dash of ash on the bread. We have eggs present as a mourner does when he returns from the cemetery. Some Sephardic communities have the men putting the ashes on their foreheads.

### MORE TISHA B'AV OBSERVANCES

- Beginning with the period of the 'Nine Days' (July 19) our mourning intensifies over the destruction of our homeland, therefore certain additional observances have been mandated through time by Jewish Law. Public celebrations are avoided, musicals, concerts, and the like. We also refrain from eating meat and wine during this time, with Shabbat being the exception.
- Tisha B'Av this year begins on Saturday evening, July 17. Following evening services, people sit on the

ground to recite Eichah (The Book of Lamentations by the Prophet Jeremiah) and Kinot (stories from the Jewish history and the Holocaust).

- On Tisha B'Av morning, Tallit and Teffilin are NOT worn, instead we put them on in the afternoon during Mincha and Ma'ariv. This is because we view wearing Tallit and Teffilin as adornments, much the same as if we were wearing expensive clothes or perfumes. Mourners refrain from these
- We do NOT wear any type of leather

shoe (you can wear a leather belt) for the duration of the fast.

• We do not sit on chairs of regular height (much the same as someone who is sitting Shiva) until the midday point of the fast (approximately 1:00 p.m.) and we customarily remove one of our pillows that we sleep on to discomfort us in the slightest of ways.

• Driving and using electricity is permitted, as Tisha B'Av is not a Biblical fast like Yom Kippur

### WEDNESDAY, JULY 19th - THURSDAY, JULY 27th 2023 THE NINE DAYS

In our mourning for the destruction of the first and second Holy Temples, we refrain from:

- Eating meat & drinking wine (exception for Shabbat or Mitzvot)
- Buying or sewing new clothing (exception for Shabbat or Mitzvot)
- Swimming or bathing for pleasure
- Seeing movies or live theatre

### **OUT OF THE COLD**

### **RAFI AARON**

The Out of the Cold (OOTC) Meal **Program at Saint Luke's United Church** (U.C.) opened its doors for indoor meal service on December 13th, 2020 operating on Sunday and Wednesday nights. The Program was created as an emergency response to the pandemic. The Beth Sholom/Beth Tzedec OOTC had been a destination point for those experiencing homelessness during the winter months. During COVID it was not feasible to have people traveling long distances to receive a meal and other services. We therefore created a partnership with Saint Luke's U.C., to form an Out of the Cold in the downtown east where many of our quests reside.

The Program was designed to operate twice a week on Sundays and Wednesdays, serving 350 hot meals a week for 5 months for a total of 7,000 close in April of 2021 we were serving 600 meals a week. We felt that during has served some 65,000 hot meals.

this crisis we could not close our doors and sought out additional partners.

The Out of the Cold Meal Program at Saint Luke's has grown into one of the largest interfaith initiatives in recent memory. We are proud to spearhead this Program along with Rev. Jim Keenan and his congregation at Saint

meals a season. When it came time to Luke's U.C. that is now into its 29th consecutive month of operation and

Along the way we have achieved many firsts for the Out of the Cold Program. We are the only Program to: 1) have provided indoor dining during the height of the pandemic; 2) operate 12 months a year; 3) serve twice a week from the same place of worship; 4) serve by far the largest number of meals by any Out of the Cold; 5) provide meals to those living in encampments and sleeping rough; and 6) provide meals to overdose prevention sites.

With the easing of health restrictions this was the first season we were permitted to have volunteers in large numbers. We are hoping to increase our volunteer numbers. For volunteer opportunities please email us at: volunteer.ootcbsbt@ gmail.com
