


Purim's Surprisingly Sober Message

The ancient rabbis famously asked, "What is Hannukah?" and by doing so ignited a many thousand year discussion over what the holy day actually celebrates. You might wonder why they'd even ask such a question but part of that answer is found in the mystery of what is missing from Hannukah. There is no single book that teaches us the story of Hannukah. After all, nearly every Jewish holiday has a religious text connected to it: Rosh HaShanah, Yom Kippur, Sukkot, Pesach and Shavuot all from the Torah. The fast day of Tisha B'Av has Eichah (and the writings of the prophet Jeremiah). Admittedly, there is a Book of the Maccabees (actually 3) but none of them are in the canon of the Hebrew bible. There's no shortage of scholarly material on the reasons but the surest explanation is the only surviving copies of the Book of the Maccabees are only in Greek and Jewish tradition was loathe to include a non-Hebrew book into the Jewish bible. Because of this remarkable deficit we still debate the reasons to Hannukah.

But Purim has the Megillah. Jewish law made reading and hearing it the central mitzvah of the holiday. Clearly we know what we celebrate.

That said the better question might be

how we celebrate. Or think of it this way: if you were to ask 20 people they'd respond with an experiential answer. Answers about costumes, carnivals, religiously sanctioned inebriation. Very few people would mention the Megillah. Ask about Pesach and people say Haggadah! Books on Purim? Not so much.

A deeper look at this would be the experience of a parent who must buy a costume for their child's Purim party.

To be that parent is to open yourself into a fascinating world of not only a child's imagination but also a child's imaginative self. What we dream to see ourselves as. Adults are no different. In the search to find the "right" costume is in many ways the search to find the costume that shows our truer self. Strange? Not really. Most of us wear masks to be other things all the time: work, spouse, family member, parent... we don't often get to be just "me". Hiding behind a mask and



costume paradoxically makes us feel freer to be what we are.

So what is Purim: a holiday of what or how? A celebration of books or experience?

This difference is not just a philosophical one but a real world one too. Our Jewish lives are lived between the kinds of polarities we seldom see clearly because we are so accustomed to them, but they exist nonetheless: feeling and knowledge. Texts and emotions. These polarities are so powerful that entire religious movements have been created to save one of them from the other. The Hasidic movement began in the 18th century as a reaction to the dominance of the eastern European Yeshiva hierarchy. The Dead Sea Scrolls were written by a disgusted sect of Jews who abandoned Jerusalem and the governing Sadducees for the desert in the hope of establishing a "better" Judaism of purity and heart.

But in this search there is no end because there is no perfect measure.


However for one day on Purim we hold both. The book and emotion. Experience and text. We do this because Judaism refuses to accept the impossible. For us everything is possible. As Herzl said it, "If you will it, it is no dream."

TIME FOR "JEWISH" SPRING CLEANING!

This year, Passover begins on the evening of Wednesday, April 5th. In preparation for the holiday, your house and any other establishments you own or rent (including cars and boats), that will be entered into or used during the holiday, must be completely free of any forbidden Passover items, like chametz. Other properties you rent or own, if they are not going to be used during the holiday, must be locked up and included in your Sale of Chametz. You cannot own any Chametz during Passover.

A form can be submitted online to sell your chametz. This form must be submitted before 9:00 am on Monday, April 3, 2023. We hope that the following guide is helpful as you prepare for Passover.

רמץ - Chametz

Chametz is simply defined as any food that's made of grain (rye, wheat, barley, oats or spelt) and water that have been allowed to ferment and "rise."

WHAT IS PERMITTED?

Although it may seem like all the delicious foods are forbidden, foodies can still enjoy many treats. For example, any unopened packages of: pure natural coffee, pure granulated sugar, pure tea (not including herbal teas), non-iodized salt, black pepper, fresh vegetables (except peas or beans) can still be eaten on Passover. Frozen fruits are acceptable as long as other ingredients were not added.

You can enjoy the following items, as long as it has been certified "Kosher for Passover" by a competent Rabbinical authority: matzah, matzah meal, matzah farfel, cake meal, Passover noodles, candies, cakes and cookies, beverages (including fruit juices), canned and processed foods, milk, butter, cheese, margarine, jams, jellies, vinegar, wines, liquors, liqueurs, gelatin, relishes, salad and cooking oil, shortening and dried and canned fruits.

Kosher for Passover labels must have a reliable heksher or rabbinical signature. This also applies to products produced in Israel. Laundry detergents and aluminum foil certified kosher require no special Pesach heksher.

- Kitniyot

In addition to chametz, Ashkenazic Jews should not eat foods in this category. This includes rice, legumes, corn, beans, peas and peanuts.

S WHAT IS FORBIDDEN?

No Chametz whatsoever is allowed during Passover, starting from 10:30 am on March 27 and ending on the evening of April 4. Chametz is simply

defined as any food that's made of grain (rye, wheat, barley, oats or spelt) and water that have been allowed to ferment and "rise." One may not eat anything that is or may have come into contact with Chametz during the holiday of Passover, not even a crumb! Bread, cereal, cake, cookies, even beer are all examples of Chametz, but you should pay close attention for any food that contains grain or grain derivatives as some food may have come into contact with Chametz.

Any utensils (pots, pans and the like) that came into contact with Chametz cannot be used unless they are properly Koshered. Please see below for how to Kasher your utensils.

Ashkenazic Jews are also forbidden to eat foods in the category of "Kitniyot". These include rice, maize, millet, legumes, corn, beans, peas and peanuts. Sephardic Jews are not prohibited from "Kitniyot" and may eat these foods during Passover.

Forbidden foods also include vinegar, any alcohol or beverage that contains or came into contact with chametz, rice, cereals, coffee containing cereals, biscuits, cakes etc.

KASHERING UTENSILS



Generally, for Passover, most households have a separate set of all kitchen utensils set aside exclusively for Passover. However, contrary to popular belief, you can use your everyday utensils and dishes as long as they are made Kosher for Passover. Check it out below and see how you can Kasher your kitchen for Passover!

SILVERWARE & FLATWARE: If you would like to use your silverware on Passover, it must be made entirely of metal and must be Kashered by scrubbing thoroughly and leaving unused for 24 hours. Lastly rinse the silverware with boiling water and you're ready to go.

GLASSWARE: If you'd like to use your glassware during Passover, you can Kasher it by washing it thoroughly, leaving unused for 24 hours, and then soaking in water for 72 hours, keep changing the water each 24 hour.

POTS & PANS: Any of your everyday metal pots and pans used for cooking only (not baking), can be Kashered by thoroughly scrubbing them and leaving them unused in boiling water for 24 hours.

Your everyday baking utensils such as stoneware, ceramics, enamelware, bone china, porcelain and plastic cannot be Kashered for Passover.

CLEANING THE KITCHEN

STOVE: As this is the heart of the kitchen, the stove must be taken apart and thoroughly scrubbed. Bibs under each burner should be thoroughly cleaned as well. Once done, leave each burner on its highest heat for about 15-20 minutes. Gas stoves should be left on high for about one hour.

OVEN: Self-cleaning ovens may go through their programmed cleaning cycle as it is sufficiently hot enough to Kasher the metal parts, including your oven racks. If your oven does not have a self-cleaning option, you may Kasher your oven by first cleaning all parts very thoroughly and either bringing a flame of a propane torch into contact with all metal surfaces or you may turn your oven on to the highest possible

temperature for one hour. The broiler can only be koshered with a torch. Covering your oven racks is recommended.

MICROWAVE: This one's pretty easy. Clean your microwave thoroughly (underneath the revolving glass plate too...). Once done, place a glass bowl of water inside the microwave. Turn the microwave on to full power and leave on until water vapors cover the inside services.

SINK: Unfortunately, non-metal sinks cannot be koshered. You may use new plastic tubs for dairy and meat respectively. If you do have a metal sink, you can kasher it by cleaning it thoroughly and pouring boiling water on the entire surface. Your counters should be thoroughly cleaned and covered.

REFRIGERATOR: Remove all shelves, drawers, and food not allowed on Passover, and clean very thoroughly. Same goes for the freezer (and that fridge in the basement)! Don't forget to clean behind the fridge and dust those coils.

FOOD PROCESSORS: You may use your food processor as long as it is thoroughly cleaned (including the motor) and the plastic bowl unit is replaced.

PLEASE NOTE...

If your child requires specific non-pesach foods (such as formula) and there are no other kosher for passover substitutes, your child may eat the items with kitniyot (such as soy bean derivatives, see above for more information about kitniyot). Pet foods are not permitted. Please consult Rabbi Flanzraich and your doctor regarding medications. Those with kitniyot are permissible. When Kosher for Passover substitutes are availble, they should be used.

SALE OF CHAMETZ PESACH 5783/2023

To sell your Chametz, please visit www.bethsholom.net/Chametz

There are four ways we fulfill the Biblical mitzvah of ridding ourselves of chametz before Passover. We clean our homes. We burn any remaining crumbs. We verbally declare that any chametz in our possession is worthless and no longer owned by us. To ensure that there is no question about our intent to remove chametz from our possession, we sell our chametz to non-Jews who may own leavened products on Passover. Canned goods and liquor and other foods too valuable to throw out, may be sold in this way.

You have to do the cleaning, burning and nullification yourselves. We can assist you in the sale of chametz. If you are unable to personally arrange to sell your chametz, please visit bethsholom.net/chametz to fill out the Chametz Sale form no later than Tuesday, April 4 at 12:00 p.m.


YOM HASHOAH

This year **Yom HaShoah** (יום השואה), will be commemorated on **Tuesday, April 18, 2023.**

Yom HaShoah (יום השואה), also known as Holocaust Rememberance Day, was established by the Government of Israel to be observed yearly on the 27th of Nisan to commemorate the Holocaust and its victims.

This year Yom HaZikaron (יום הזכרון), will be commemorated on Tuesday, April 25, 2023.


Yom HaZikaron is Israel's Official Memorial Day for her fallen soldiers and victims of terrorism. Falling either in late April or early May every year, Yom HaZikaron is an especially solemn time and marked by ceremonies and moments of silence across the country.

COUNTING OF THE OMER

LAG BA'OMER

Lag Ba'Omer begins (לג בעומר) in the evening of **Monday, May 8** until evening **Tuesday, May 9.**

Sefirat Ha'Omer (ספירת העומר) or, the counting of the Omer, counts seven weeks (49 days) commencing on the second night of Passover, Thursday, April 6 (7th of Nisan) and culminating on Shavuot, the evening of Thursday, May 25 (5th of Sivan). This marks the countdown that joins Passover with Shavuot. The blessing for the countdown can be found in your Haggadah.



YOM HA'ATZMAU

Happy 75th Birthday Israel!

Yom Ha'atzmaut (יום העצמאות), otherwise known as Israeli Independence Day, is Israel's birthday! David Ben-Gurion, the first Prime Minister of Israel, publicly read the Declaration of Independence of Israel on May 14, 1948.

That date is translated to 5 lyar 5708.

Therefore, we celebrate Yom Ha'atzmaut on the 5th of Iyar (unless it's Shabbat) every year! **This year we celebrate Yom Ha'atzmaut on Wednesday April 26, 2023.**



KOSHER FOOD BANK

We want to take this opportunity to thank the Forest Hill Lion's Club who, in recognition of the current food crisis in Toronto, made a generous donation to the Beth Sholom Kosher Food Bank. Their gift will allow us to provide food to every food bank client on a first of the month visit: this means their donation will cover not only the cost of a weekly bag of staple items, but also the additional cost of a monthly bag of higher value food items.

A donation to the Kosher Food Bank of \$1100 covers the cost of client bags for one week; a donation of \$1300 covers the cost of client bags on the first of the month. A donation of \$2400 covers the cost of both the weekly and monthly bags on the first of the month. These sums are approximate as our weekly food bank attendance numbers fluctuate from week to week as does the cost of food. The Synagogue provides tax receipts for all donations to the food bank. Interested in the cost per bag? Typically, our weekly bags cost \$16 each, and our monthly bags cost \$18.50 each.

For the upcoming holiday of Passover, we will once again be providing clients with boxes of matzo and matzo ball soup mix. The food bank is closed during the Passover holiday, but we do distribute additional items in advance in order to try and alleviate the strain felt during this time.

We are still accepting gently used hats, gloves/mittens and new socks which so many of our clients do need in the winter months. You can drop these items off, along with your non-perishable food items, in our donation bin located in the Synagogue lobby.

At this time we also want to thank our amazing volunteers, many but not all pictured here. Thanks to this team the food bank continues to run smoothly and provide support to the communitythrough Tikkun Olam.

SHIVA LEADER

Caring For Our Bereaved

There are many ways for members to become involved in supporting our Beth Sholom family. For me, one very special honor is that I participate as a member of the Beth Sholom Shiva Leader Team. I have had the privilege of being a shiva leader for the past 20 years and consider it one of the more important activities in which I have been involved as a long-standing and active member.

I remember back many years ago, before I knew how to lead prayer services, I needed someone to lead services when my mother passed away. It was a very sensitive and emotional time for me. I felt supported and cared for when members of my community stepped up and provided this deeply important service.

Beth Sholom is blessed with so many member families that it is not

possible for the rabbi and the cantor to lead every shiva of such a large congregation. This is where our Beth Sholom shiva leaders perform their mitzvahs. A shiva leader is typically a regular minyan attendee who is well versed in leading the weekday morning, afternoon, and evening services. When a shiva is taking place, usually in our members' homes, a person who knows how to daven and to lead a group of people in prayer is needed twice every day lasting the entire shiva.

The team of 17 volunteer shiva leaders performs great mitzvahs, not only for the family in mourning, but also for ourselves. It is extremely meaningful and a great honor for me to lead services for a bereaved family at their house of shiva, each and every time that I have been requested to help. I encourage mourners to continue

saying Kaddish after the end of shiva, for the full duration needed. I invite them to meet me at synagogue so I can continue supporting them in prayer, so they have someone to stand with and to be with. For this they always thank me as they now have a connection when they first come to the synagogue to say kaddish.

Many mourners have become regular attendees at our daily services so that they too can support others saying Kaddish. It is a wonderfully supportive group, with great camaraderie (the morning breakfast is pretty great too)! While I hope you will never have the need for a shiva leader, you should know this volunteer team is here for you.

Why is This Book Different from Other Books?

One of the most central elements to both Purim and Passover is the Hagaddah readings, which tell us about our history as a people, our journey from slavery to freedom, and how we can use this story in our own lives today.

The Hagaddah is a collection of stories, poems, prayers and blessings that are read aloud during both Purim and Passover Seders. The core text is found in the book of Exodus from the Torah but it has been supplemented over time with commentaries by rabbis throughout Jewish history as well as songs and other additions that make it relevant for different generations. It's often referred to as "the story of redemption" because it recounts how God delivered us out of slavery in Egypt through various miraculous events including plagues on Pharaoh's army and parting the Red Sea so we could escape.

These stories are essential for understanding not only what happened thousands of years ago but also what is happening in our lives right now – after all, many aspects of life remain similar even though centuries have gone by since then! Our ancestors

were able to overcome great struggles just like we have had to do ourselves; this gives us hope that no matter what adversities come along in life there are still chances for success too if we keep faith strong enough.

The Hagaddah readings also remind us that each person's experience holds value - including those who lived long before us - so that everyone can learn from their insights into living an ethical life filled with Chesed and Tzedakah. This includes showing hospitality towards strangers or visiting sick people; providing food for those who need it; standing up against injustice when faced with oppression; being humble even when successful - these are all lessons taught within its pages which will help guide us on our journey through this world.

The power behind these stories lies not only in their ancient wisdom but also their ability to bring families together around shared values while creating meaningful conversations between generations old & young alike – something especially important during challenging times such as these! People can find comfort & strength knowing they aren't alone

on their spiritual path - nor ever shall be - thanks largely due to teachings passed down throughout centuries via texts like The Hagaddah .

This year we invite you to join us for the Hagaddah reading that is best for you and your family. Our very talented head of Education Alexa Abergel will be leading non-traditional Hagaddah readings that incorporate fun and games while our amazing Parnas Jeff Green will also be doing several traditional Megillah Readings. Please see the times in this bulletin and plan accordingly.

We will also be offering great programs including our Purim Carnival and our Passover Chocolate Seder that make it fun to share the joy of these holidays while staying connected to the tapestry of Jewish life.

Lastly as is always my message please attend a daily service. Commit to a Shacharit, Mincha/Mariv service. Support those saying Kaddish by being part of a Minyan.


