A VIEW FROM THE BIMAH



A

s long as deep in the heart, the soul of a Jew yearns...Our hope will not be lost." Written in 1886 by Naphtali Herz Imber, HaTikvah, meaning "The Hope," stands as Israel's National Anthem.

There is a good reason why hope is the prominent element of our national anthem. It is because, without hope, the Jewish people cannot survive. Hope is what links us together with the past. It connects our most ominous, heartbreaking events with our brightest moments of celebration. Hope enables us to wake up each day with the promise the future holds happiness and joy. Even when we are blinded by despair.

For the Jewish people, this isn't just a word, a feeling, or an emotion. Instead, it defines the true nature of the Jewish people. Hope is our North Star. Hope is the hug we give and receive with grieving friends and family. It is shared in our prayers and melodies on the Shabbat evenings. It's in the eyes of our children who carry the Torah down our aisles. It is an intrinsic part of everything we do. We are a people of hope.



Within the scope of recorded history, it is understandable that the world does not share in the plight of the Jewish people. Jewish hatred fills our history books. And while some will claim that Jewish persecution and attempts at genocide should be long forgotten, it is simply impossible to do so. That trauma has become implanted in our hearts, bodies, and souls.

We do not expect the world to understand why we defend Israel and why there should be a need for a Jewish homeland. But we understand. Because we bear every atrocity just as we bear each celebratory moment in our history. At this moment, it has become our task, as was the task of our ancestors, to be hopeful.

Like any other precious entity, hope must be garnered, protected, willed, and made sacred. When you arrive at Temple Beth El and see the Israeli flag on our front lawn, understand that it is not simply the symbol of a country we proudly raise. It is hope that we're flying. And will continue to do so as long as the Jewish soul sings within our hearts. Our hope is not yet lost.



READ WITH ME



ur Parents Association had an excellent turnout with our Fall Scholastic Book Fair. Hundreds of children's books were sold. Unfortunately, I heard from several parents that it is getting harder and harder to get their children to read a book when they can just have some device read a book to them. This is, of course, not a new problem.

When parents ask me how they can get their children to read, my first question is how often does that parent read in front of that child? Children love to model adults and if they don't see you reading, they are not going to want to read themselves. And, for the record, reading on a computer screen does not count. While many of us have Kindles, the opportunity for a child to switch from an electronic device to some other application is too hard to avoid.

If you want your children or grandchildren to read, read with them. Sit down with them with a book of their own and read it. Set a special regular time for reading and join the children for that reading time. For older children, make sure the book the child has is age-appropriate for that child's reading and comprehension level. For younger children, sit with them and read with excitement. Read to your child with humor and expression. Use different voices. Be silly and make it an adventure. Read it again and again.

Our teachers read daily. They often read the same book over and over. In preparation for our Book Fair, each classroom chose a book (i.e., Rainbow Fish, Chicka Chicka Boom Boom, Three Little Pigs, etc.) for that week's curriculum and spent every day exploring that book from cover to cover in different ways. One way they expanded their classroom's chosen book was to bring literacy alive through arts and crafts. They decorated their classroom door (see pictures).



















Here are some ideas to "Read with Me." Take your child to a bookstore or a library. Children also need to see children like themselves doing ordinary kid stuff like visiting a library or a bookstore. Barnes & Noble has a nice children's section. Let your child sit, surrounded by hundreds of books, and ask the child what he or she would like to read. You might be surprised by the child's interests.

If your child is still reluctant to read despite your best efforts, don't give up. The rewards of making your child an avid reader is too great to abandon your endeavors. We all know the benefit of a good education and it is proven that well-read children have a much better foundation for learning as they get older.

Keep "Reading with Me!"



JEWISH LEARNING CENTER

S

halom! I have had a hard time putting my thoughts on paper for our Connections publication. Do I share with you all of the wonderful things that are happening at Temple Beth El and the Jewish Learning Center? Do I share with you all of the wonderful friendships and new students we see blossoming every Sunday? Do I share with families best practices on how to talk about tragedy or my complicated relationship with Israel?

I think this article will encompass all of these ideas as they are all intertwined. So far, our year started off with an exciting shofar blast. Our children sang beautifully at High Holiday services and many of our post B'nai Mitzvah students chanted torah with finesse and class. Fun was had by all in our Junior Congregation services, where we prayed to our own levels of understanding and made delicious snacks. Our celebrations for Sukkot and Simchat Torah were awesome and so much fun! So many people came to celebrate with us; it was everything that I have ever wanted for our children.

And these children...there are so many new faces! I am still reminded of that year when I taught Kindergarten at JLC - 2008. There was a group of young ladies who met that year and to this day, are all still friends. When I see our JLC kids hanging out at temple or beyond, my heart is full because friends that we meet at temple stick with us for life. My temple friends sent their children to Camp Coleman this past summer and many of them expressed their relief at knowing that I was there too. I also worked with a couple of temple friends, but after forty years, we just call each other friends.

In the late 90s and early 2000s, I worked for the Jewish Agency, recruiting college students for various programs. I loved the job. I got to travel to Israel almost every 6-8 weeks and had many friends to visit. I got to sample the programs so I had credible knowledge of the trips I was attempting to "sell." My time with the Jewish Agency ended shortly after the events of 9/11, and I was bitter.



The events that transpired back in October have shaken me to the core, like most of us, but what is most important is talking to our children and ensuring that they are comfortable and understand that they are safe. You don't need to have all the answers, but you do need to be willing to listen and hear what our kids are saying and thinking. Our children need us to be calm presences who are just willing to listen. Keep things short and simple, like, "People are fighting, and some are getting hurt." Maybe show them on a map where the fighting is taking place. End the talk by reminding them that the adults in their lives keep them safe. For older kids, try to avoid graphic details. They may ask more questions, and it's OK to answer them briefly. Encourage them to share by asking, "What do you think about what's going on?" Let them lead the conversation. Then try to answer any questions they have. If you don't know how to respond to something, explain that the issues are complex.

Lastly, lean on your village! Here, at Temple Beth El, we are always here for you. Please feel free to reach out.
