Shavuot (falling this year on May 25 & 26) is the festival of the first fruits of the spring harvest, and a time for us to recommit to our faith as we celebrate the receiving of the Ten Commandments at Sinai. We mark this holiday with worship, reading Torah, late night study, and traditionally, eating all things dairy! There

are many explanations as to why this is, but the one that works the best for me is... it's delicious!

So if you are in need of some inspiration as to which dairy delicacies to enjoy as you stay up into the night studying at our Tikkun Leil Shavuot on May 25 at 9:00 PM (on Zoom), and our Shavuot Yizkor Service on May 26 at 10:00 AM. Look no further than this tasty blintz recipe. Chag Sameach!

Cheese Blintzes

(from thespruceeats.com)

Ingredients

For the Blintzes

4 large eggs, at room temperature, beaten

- 1/2 cup water
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 1 cup butter, for frying

For the Filling

1 pound ricotta, dry curd, or farmer's cheese, at room temperature

1 tablespoon butter, melted

1 large egg yolk, at room temperature

- 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- 1/4 cup sugar (or more to taste)

Sour cream, garnish

Fruit toppings, fresh or canned, garnish

Make the Blintzes

- 1. Gather the ingredients.
- 2. In a medium bowl, beat together 4 eggs, water, milk, salt, and flour until well-mixed. Don't overbeat. It's okay if small particles of flour remain as they will be absorbed during the resting period.
- 3. Let the batter rest at room temperature for at least 30 minutes.
- 4. Heat a small skillet (about 7 inches in diameter) and add a pat of butter.



- 5. Whisk the batter until smooth.
- Pour about 1/4 cup batter into the pan and swirl it around, pouring off excess. Make sure not to let it brown.
- 7. Flip and cook the other side for a few seconds.
- 8. Then, turn the blintz out onto a towel.
- 9. Repeat with remaining batter and pats of butter, staggering the crepes one on top of each other.

Make the Filling and Assemble

- 1. In a large bowl, mix together cheese, melted butter, 1 egg yolk, vanilla, and sugar until well-incorporated.
- 2. To assemble, place one blintz on a work surface and place 1 to 2 tablespoons of filling in a line close to the edge nearest to you.
- 3. Fold envelope-style.
- 4. Roll up, and continue with remaining blintzes and filling.
- 5. Fry the filled blintzes in butter until golden brown.
- 6. Serve with optional sour cream and/or fresh or canned fruit toppings. Enjoy!

Did you attend the community seder on the second night of Passover at the temple? Well, that's when Lag BaOmer, the holiday that literally translates as the 33rd day of the Omer began. The observance begins Monday, May 8, through May 9.

O.K., so what is the Omer about? The Omer is the counting period that begins on the second day of Passover and culminates with the holiday of Shavuot, which celebrates the giving of the Torah on Mount Sinai, as well as the grain harvest for the summer. In addition, Omer means "a sheaf". It refers to the measure of grain that was once offered at the Temple in Jerusalem.

So, the Omer is a counting period of 49 days between the end of Passover and the beginning of Shavuot. It's referred to as the Festival of weeks. This instruction is found in the Torah from Leviticus 23:15-21: "From the day on which you bring the sheaf of wave offering the day after the Sabbath you shall count off seven weeks."

Put another way, the practice is derived from counting the days from the barley offering at the Temple to the day of the wheat offering on Shavuot.

In truth, Lag B'Omer is the one day in which celebrating is allowed because the rest of the days of the Omer are actually considered a period of semi-mourning. You see, the holiday commemorates a break in the plague that struck during the life of Rabbi Akiva (50 A.D. - 113 A.D.). We find in the Talmud that Rabbi Shimon bar Yochai, the great teacher of mysticism died on Lag B'Omer and due to him in great part, the holiday has come to symbolize the resilience of the Jewish spirit. Many Jews like to plan weddings on this date within an otherwise somber period. In Israel, a popular tradition is to have bonfires and barbecues, and/or have picnics and sporting activities.

Bonfires are lit not only to commemorate the death of Bar Yochai, but also to remind us of the thousands of followers of Rabbi Akiva who lost their lives fighting the Romans in the last of the Roman-Jewish war named the "Bar Kochba Revolt" (132-135 AD).

The sages developed a construct of 7 virtues to follow, based on 7 divine qualities in the kabalistic universe, one for each of the 7 weeks: love, respect, compassion, efficiency, beauty, loyalty, and leadership.

Perhaps the big takeaway is using the 7 week period to evaluate our behavior and work on self-improvement, being more humble, and connected with all other Jews and our greater community.

Tikkun Olam

National Council of Jewish Women CEO Sheila Katz spoke at Sunday, March 12's protest of Israeli Finance Minister Belazel Smotrich, including his threats to women's rights, alongside the Progressive Israel Network and UnXeptable. We've shared the full transcript of her remarks below.

NCJW doesn't normally protest government officials or elected individuals. Rather, we focus on policies and issues.

Like many other nonpartisan organizations, we strive to *work with* politicians on issues we care about — whether we agree with them or not. But there comes a time when it is no longer business as usual.

This is that time. Israeli Finance Minister Bezalel Smotrich cannot be seen as just any other elected leader or politician.

The Torah teaches us not to stand idly by the blood of our siblings, and instead to engage and take action.

This is a moral emergency. We must name the deep pain that so many of us feel for what's happening in Israel right now, a place so many of us love.

It is with that love that we come here tonight — standing with our Israeli siblings — saying there is nothing normal, nothing acceptable about this moment.

It is unacceptable that Smotrich speaks openly of his desire for a society with unequal roles for women, subservient to the roles of men in government and beyond.

It is unacceptable that Smotrich has said that he is a "proud homophobe," who has compared the Pride parade to bestiality, threatening the safety of the whole LGBTQ+ community.

It is unacceptable that Smotrich has advocated for segregated maternity wards to separate Jewish and Muslim women, threatening grave inequalities.

It is unacceptable that Smotrich has said that "Arabs are citizens of Israel 'for now at least," threatening the hope and promise for a diverse, democratic, and safe state where both Jews and Arabs can flourish.

It is unacceptable that Smotrich has said that he wishes the founders of Israel had expelled all of the Arabs from the state at its founding, normalizing hate and exclusion.

And it is unacceptable that Smotrich threatened what amounts to genocide, calling to "wipe out" the Palestinian town of Huwara, which has over 5,500 residents. 5,500 people with dreams and aspirations. This validates and encourages violent actions which threaten Palestinian safety and disregard human rights.

We're here today to say our friends in Israel are not alone.

Many people ask NCJW what we learned from the fall of *Roe v. Wade* here in the United States, impacting millions of people's access to reproductive care. I'll tell you what we learned.

When politicians threaten to take away our rights we must believe them — and we must act and organize accordingly.

We cannot normalize or simply accept politicians in government who don't act in the best interests of the people just because they were elected or invited to be in a coalition.

Yesterday after Shabbat, half a million people showed up on the streets of Israel to say loudly — Demokratia! — to say loudly that they will not allow the government to destroy Israel's democracy through its judicial overhaul plans.

We're here today to say our friends in Israel are not alone. And that we, the American Jewish community, who believe in the original vision and promise of the State of Israel, will not stand idly by.

We will not tolerate threats against women — including segregated national parks or punishments for failure to meet modesty standards at the Kotel.

We will not tolerate hateful rhetoric.

We will not tolerate violence or extremism; racism, incitement, or discrimination.

We will not tolerate this blitz of legislation to overhaul lsrael's judiciary.

This is a moral emergency for the State of Israel.

Complacency cannot be an option.

We must refuse to normalize remarks like Smotrich's.

We must make it clear with our actions as Americans and as American Jews that we side always with democracy, with human rights, and with basic dignity.

We just left the holiday of Purim—in which we followed the leadership of women to fight back against genocide and hate. And now we begin our preparations for the holiday of Passover, where we will see hero after hero in the Exodus story—many of whom are women—take a stand, at great personal risk, for everyone's safety and freedom.

We must be in solidarity with our Israeli siblings, and shout out loud together with them: DEMOKRATIA!

The arc of the moral universe is long — and it doesn't bend towards justice on its own. WE bend it — together.

My Take on the Torah – Chol HaMoeid Pesach – Exodus 33:12-34:26

This week's torah portion picks up right after the Golden Calf incident. God tells Moses to "Lead this people forward." Well, Moses wants some help with this task. God says that he will lead and lighten the burden. Then Moses takes it a step further asks God to present himself to Moses. God responds by saying that "I will make all my goodness pass before you." He also says that no human can see God's face and live. God says that he will pass by Moses and as he does so, he will shield Moses's eyes with his hand until after he passes.

Then God tells Moses to carve two more tablets like the ones Moses smashed upon seeing the Israelites worshipping the Golden Calf and bring them up Mount Sinai. The next morning Moses went to Mt. Sinai with the new tablets and God then appeared in a cloud before Moses and as he passed Moses, he began to name what's known as the 13 Attributes of Mercy or Middot. The recitation of the middot is thought to be a way for the Israelites to gain favor with God should the Israelites fail again.

God then states he will form a covenant with the Israelites and proceeds to list several conditions including observing the Sabbath and Pesach. In exchange, God will "work such wonders as have not been wrought on all the earth or in

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any nation; and all the people who are with you shall see how awesome are God's deeds."

There is a lot going on in this passage, but it struck me as curious that Moses chose this time to ask God to make his presence known. Afterall, the Israelites just broke one of God's most sacred conditions with their worshipping of the Golden Calf. However, I think Moses deserves a great deal of credit for knowing his people. Recall that the Israelites are newbies to this monotheistic religion. The only exposure to religion they and their ancestors have had for generations is the Egyptians worshipping many gods that have been given anthropomorphic characteristics. Perhaps Moses thinks that the Israelites would have an easier time accepting God if they could identify God with something that is known to them. God chooses to remain unknowable and instead vows to smite their enemies and make them prosperous people.

I think this is one of the beauties of Judaism. It is not necessary to have an intimate relationship with God to be Jewish. And while visiting locusts on the Egyptians and smiting their first born might be a bit extreme, knowing God's presence through the wonders of nature or the joys of friendship and love are a little more understandable to me.


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
