We'll gather at a family's home to help build a *sukkah* in preparation for *Sukkot*.


Shabbat Dinners

HIGH SCHOOL DETAILS

- Classes are open to all Jewish high school students (grades 9-12).*
- There are three sessions during the year. Each session meets once a week for four weeks.
- Classes are on Sundays from 12:20-1:10 p.m. and 1:10-2 p.m. Lunch is available at noon.



- Students should plan to attend all classes within in a session.
- You may register for the whole year, but registration will also be shared as each new session approaches.
- We try not to limit numbers, but some classes are filled on a first-comefirst-served basis. Get your requests in early!
- Students who work as *madrikhim* in our religious school must attend two sessions of high school and are expected to attend all classes within a session.
- Cost is \$60 per session for Beth Meyer members/ \$72 for non-members.
