MILK—Hiland Milk with a P next to the date is supervised by the VAAD.

PREWASHED FRESH VEGETABLES—

Require certification. Fresh Express must be OK-P, however, Dole with a Star K does not require a P. Salad Time with an OV is not approved for Pesach.

EGG & GRAPE MATZAH—Matzah made with fruit juice or eggs is permissible on Passover only for the elderly, the sick, or young children who cannot digest regular matzah. The following matzah falls into this category: egg matzah, chocolate covered egg matzah, egg matzah crackers, Passover Tam Tam crackers, white grape matzah.

BAKING SODA.

COCOA—Hershey's.

COFFEE—All regular, OU unflavored coffees do not need special certification. Decaffeinated coffees do require Passover certification (Folgers, Taster's Choice, Hills Bros.) All General Foods coffee (Maxwell House, Sanka) require OK-P.

EGGS—Should be purchased before Passover.

FRUIT—Raw or frozen, unsweetened and without syrup. Canned in 100% natural juices.

INFANT FORMULA—Isomil, Similac, Enfamil.

FISH—Kosher frozen or raw fish is acceptable.

JUICE—Any pure frozen orange or grapefruit juice with no added ingredients. In containers, look for Tropicana with the Circle K-P.

MEAT—All kosher raw unprocessed meat and chicken may be used. Ground beef needs special Passover certification.

NUTS—Commercially packaged, raw unroasted, uncolored nuts with no additives and not listing "BHA and corn oil," bleached or unbleached, shelled or unshelled. All Herman's raw and unroasted nuts are acceptable, including almonds, pecans, and walnuts.

OLIVE OIL—All extra virgin olive oil with an OU or Pompeiian Extra Virgin with the Star K.

POULTRY—All raw Empire or Aaron's poultry that has no added ingredients.

SALT—Any non-iodized brand without maltodextrin, dextrose or polysorbate.

SOAP PADS—Scotch Brite.

SUGAR—Any brand, white granulated cane sugar (not confectionary); Domino brand Brown or Brownulated with a Circle K-P.

TEA—Any brand of pure, unflavored tea or tea bags (Lipton, Tetley); Nestea Instant, regular and decaf, unflavored.

THE KASHERING PRIMER - PASSOVER 2018

One of the most daunting preparations we make for Passover is kashering, a process to prepare chametz utensils for Passover use. As with all areas of halachah, those who are unsure of how to apply the rules of kashering to their situation should consult an Orthodox rabbi. The Torah (Bemidbar 31:23) requires kashering utensils that have been used with non-kosher (and will have absorbed non-kosher flavor). Chametz on Passover is forbidden so the laws of kashering to chametz. There are four basic methods. The prescribed method depends on the utensil and how it was used.

LIBUN Gamur (Burning): Utensils used directly in the fire, (e.g. BBQ grate) must be kashered by placing them into fire. This process has the effect of burning any absorbed taste. To qualify as a complete libun, metal must be heated until it glows. A self-clean cycle of an oven (approx. 850° F) also qualifies as libun. There is no need to wait 24 hours before libun, though it is advised. There is no need to scrub the utensil before performing libun, since the fire will burn off residue, but some cleaning is advised.

HAGALAH (Boiling): Utensils that were used to cook non-kosher liquid can be kashered with hagalah (boiling in water). To prepare the utensil for hagalah, the utensil must be thoroughly cleaned. Only utensils that can be scrubbed clean should be kashered. Items that have narrow cracks, crevices, deep scratches or other areas that cannot be cleaned, cannot be kashere



that have narrow cracks, crevices, deep scratches or other areas that cannot be cleaned, cannot be kashered for Passover. The following, for example, cannot be kashered for Passover: pots with rolled lips, bottles with narrow necks, filters, colanders, knives (or other utensils) where food can get trapped between the blade and handle. After cleaning, the utensils should then be left idle for 24 hours. To kasher, every part of the utensil must make contact with boiling water. This process can be done in parts. For example, a large spoon can be immersed into a pot of boiling water for 10 seconds, turned over and then the remainder immersed. When the utensil is removed from the boiling water, it should be rinsed off in cold water. While strictly speaking these utensils may be kashered in a clean non-Passover pot that was not used for 24 hours, the minhag, however, is to kasher the pot first, by boiling water in the pot and discarding.

IRUY KLI RISHON (Poured boiling water): If the utensil only came in contact with hot liquid being poured on it (iruy), it can be kashered in the same manner. If the utensil came in contact with hot chametz solids, then one should kasher by pouring boiling water accompanied by an even melubenet, a heated stone. For example, if hot pasta fell into a sink, stones should be heated on the stove, and moved around the surface of the sink while boiling water is poured over them. In this way, the water will remain boiling on the surface of the sink. The stones may need to be reheated several times, since they cool down quickly. In all other aspects the process is identical to hagalah.

LIBUN KAL (Light burning): In certain cases, libun kal is sufficient. This can be accomplished by heating in an oven at 550° F for one hour. This method of kashering can be used in place of hagalah. It is also used when the need for libun is only an added stringency.

Not every material can be kashered. Ceramic, such as china, and enamel coated pots cannot be kashered. Ask your rabbi for guidance.

Mechirat Chametz—Selling Chametz

It is preferable to either eat or give away all chametz in one's house prior to Pesach. If this is not possible, then the chametz can be sold before Pesach to a non-Jew (see contract above). The sold Chametz is the non-Jew's property until after Passover ends and must be secured until after Passover when the Rabbi repurchases it for the community. It should be stored away in a manner in which the non-Jew would have access to it. Unsold Chametz which remained in a Jew's possession during Passover may not be used even after Passover ends. If you have any questions, call Rabbi Ari. Rabbi will be available in the office for the Sale of Chametz after minyan each day the week prior to Pesach or by appointment. The signed form must be received in the synagogue office NO LATER THAN FRIDAY, MARCH 30TH at 11 a.m..

DELEGATION OF POWER FOR SALE OF CHAMETZ

Know that I, the undersigned, fully empower and permit Rabbi Ari Dembitzer to act in my place and stead, and on my behalf to sell all chametz possessed by me (knowingly or unknowingly), as defined by Torah and Rabbinic Law (e.g. chametz, possible chametz and all kinds of chametz mixtures). And to lease all places wherein the chametz owned by me may be found, wherever it may be. Rabbi Ari Dembitzer has the full right to sell and to lease by transactions, as he deems fit and proper and for such time which he believes necessary in accordance with all detailed terms and detailed forms as explained in the general authorization contract which have been given this year to Rabbi Ari Dembitzer to sell the chametz.

This general authorization is made a part of this agreement. Also, I do hereby give the said Rabbi Ari
Dembitzer full power and authority to appoint a substitute in his stead with full power to sell and to lease as provided herein. The above given power is in conformity with all Torah, Rabbinical regulations and laws, and also in accordance with laws of the State of Nebraska and of the United States. And to this I hereby affix my signature on the day of .2018.

A Look Back at Beth Israel's History

This past month, Beth Israel celebrated the 14th anniversary of the "new" building. The following is a summary of the synagogue's rich history.

1883 - First presence of an Orthodox community in Omaha. Beth Hamedrosh Hagadol (BHH), otherwise known as "The Litvsche Shul," was built. Other small synagogues were formed over the next few years, including B'nai Israel Adas Russia (better known as "The Kippler Shul"), B'nai Jacob Anshe Sholom ("The Kapulier Shul"), and Beth Hamedrash Adas Yeshurun. Bnai Jacob Anshe Sholom and Beth Hamedrosh Adas Yeshurun merged to form B'nai Jacob Adas Yeshurun, but kept the nickname "The Kapulier Shul." B'nai Israel and BHH merged to form the Union of Orthodox Congregations of Omaha.

1946 - UOC hires architect Clarence Kivett of the firm Kivett and Meyers (Kansas City) to create a design for a new synagogue building. The building was a major advance in architecture; its large sanctuary and social hall spanned about 200 feet without any support columns. Beth Israel Synagogue is the name selected for this new congregation.

1948 - Groundbreaking ceremony in September at 1502 North 52nd Street.

1950 - Cornerstone ceremony in May.

1951 - Completion of the building and dedication ceremony in September.

1961 - Construction of school wing.

1999 - Membership of Beth Israel approved the building of the new synagogue on property owned by the synagogue at 126th and Pacific Streets. With architects RDG Planning and Design, the synagogue works to design a building to meet the needs of the congregation.

2002 - Groundbreaking ceremony in October at 12604 Pacific Street.

2004 - Opening of the new building in February and formal dedication in October.
