

### Todah Rabbah Rena/Shira Rachlin -Dreamlanders for this week's D'var Torah



### Speak to the Children of Israel and say to them: When a man among you brings an offering to Hashem...

Vayikra deals with the offerings one had to bring in the times of the Temple after sinning. Why was it necessary to set up an elaborate system involving slaughtering animals in order to evoke in a sinner thoughts of repentance? Surely it would have been simpler for the Torah to command the transgressor to confess his sin and accept rebuke!

The Torah chose the most effective method of stirring us to sincere repentance. Of course the Torah could have demanded of a transgressor a mere verbal confession: "I did wrong." However, the effect of spoken words cannot compare to that of actions, which make a vivid visual impression. Man must bring an animal to the Beis Hamikdash, the Holy Temple, rest his hands on it, and then witness it being slaughtered and burned. One would become conscious of the fact that all the acts performed on the sacrificial animal should rightfully have been done to him. This arouses in a sinner a far more profound awareness of the evil of sin than a mere oral acknowledgment of his wrong doing.1

Nowadays, since we do not have the opportunity to bring sacrificial offerings for our sins, we need other tools to help make us aware of the reality of sin. A person only sins because he sees the sin as an isolated incident, failing to appreciate the bigger picture which includes the results of his actions. One needs to picture a sin as poison. Just as one can understand that eating a small but harmful thing can really damage the body, so too, every sin is poison for the soul and does real damage. We must take the spiritual world as seriously as the physical world.

Rabbi Moshe Feinstein was once asked to leave the Beis Midrash in order to take an important phone call from another country, but he would not go to the phone since someone was davening Shemoneh Esrei near the front door and blocking his exit, and one is not allowed to enter the four amos of a person standing in prayer. When asked why he could not leave, he said that there was a wall blocking him and he could not walk through a wall. For Rav Moshe, the four amos of prayer was not some vague concept – it was a tangible reality!

**1st & 2nd & 3rd Aliyot:** The instructions for offering a "Oleh" – burnt offering (fully consumed on the Alter) is detailed. This offering could be brought from a bull, or male sheep or goat. The less expensive "Oleh", using a Turtle Dove or common dove, is described. The Mincha, an offering made from baked, fried, or deep fried matzoh type crackers is detailed.

**4th Aliya:** The Korban Shlomim – the peace offering, brought from male or female cattle, sheep, and goats is described.

**5th Aliya:** This aliya describes this Korban Chatas – the sin offering. Three unique sin offerings are described:

1. When the High Priest sinned

2. If the King sinned

3. If the entire nation sinned because of a wrong ruling by the Sanhedrin – High Court. Note: A Korban Chatas could only be offered if the sin was unintentional.

**6th & 7th Aliyot:** The Korban Chatas of a commoner is detailed, as well as the specifics of the Korban Asham – the guilt offering. This Korban was offered in instances where intentional wrong doing was implicated; such as not fulfilling an assumed oath, or doing something questionable without first ascertaining the law. Additionally, a type of Asham was offered in instances of dishonesty and swearing falsely.

### WELCOME TO BETH ISRAEL SYNAGOGUE

We are delighted to welcome you to Beth Israel Synagogue. A passage from Deuteronomy 30:11-14 inspired the art work in the sanctuary. "For this commandment that I command you today - it is not hidden from you and it is not distant. It is not in heaven, [for you] to say, 'Who can go to the heaven and take it for us so that we can listen to it and perform it? Nor is it across the seas, [for you] to say, 'Who can cross to the other side of the sea for us and take it for us, so that we can listen to it and perform it?' Rather, the matter is very near to you - in your mouth and your heart - to perform it." Mitzvot are obtainable.

- The focal point of the sanctuary is the Menorah Window, which frames the Ark and is shaped in the form of the six branched candelabrum. To the right, brilliantly colored windows have forms that reflect the heavens, while the left side depicts the seas.
- The message is completed in a frieze, the horizontal painting on wood mounted on the wall. The background of the frieze symbolically and abstractly represents the relationship between G-d and the people of Israel through the Covenant. The perochet, or curtain over the Ark, completes the symbolic composition, with an expression that intertwines the Torah and the letter Aleph, the first letter of the Hebrew alphabet, of the Ten Commandments, and of G-d's name in Hebrew.
- As is traditional, the sanctuary has 12 windows, representing the 12 tribes of Israel. These windows contain the name of each tribe in flowing, organic letters. The windows are located above the continued frieze, which includes two central texts of the revelation at Sinai "If you will keep my Covenant, you shall be precious to me," and "You shall be a kingdom of priests and a holy nation." This composition expresses the unity of Israel as the people stood together at Sinai and accepted the Torah.
