This week's D'var Torah The Power of Consistency Pinchas (Numbers 25:10-30:1)



Hashem said to Moshe, "Take to yourself Yehoshua son of Nun, a man in whom there is spirit, and lean your hand upon him."

(Num. 27:18)

Moshe prays to God to appoint a new leader over the nation and God appoints Yehoshua (Joshua). There were plenty of people who were eligible for this position. There was Elazar, Pinchas, and the 70 elders. Why then did God choose Yehoshua as Moshe's successor? If you have a pot of water on the stove and you are waiting for it to boil, but every few minutes you remove it, the water will never boil. It doesn't even matter how big the flame is, since each time it is removed and returned, the boiling process starts over from scratch. It is only the continuous process of heating which causes it to boil. The flame could be very small and it may take longer to heat up, but as long as it's consistent it will eventually begin bubbling.

The Torah says abut Yehoshua: "A lad, who did not depart from within the tent" (Exodus 22:11). Already from his youth Yehoshua gave up every comfort to be in the tent of Torah. He was consistent - never removing his pot from the flame. He didn't have all those sick days and vacations. Whatever it took, he made sure that he was always there. He started out with a flame no bigger than anyone else, but it was his power of consistency that made him hotter than everyone else! The Korban Tamid, the daily sacrifice, was not an expensive sacrifice. but its effects were enormous: it atoned for the sins of the Jews. The reason it managed this is because it was tamid, consistent: every single day it was brought without fail. It doesn't matter how big a project is; what matters is how you do it. If you're not consistent then you won't get too far. Better take something small that you can be sure to do every day, and it will then just be a matter of time before you begin bubbling! Beth Israel is proud to have a consistent minyan 3x a day, every day. There's no doubt that those who come every day, have seen the most growth. Join us so you too can see an even better you.

1st Aliya: As a reward for his act of zealousness, Pinchas is appointed as a Kohain. Although a grandson to Aharon, he was not included in the original selection of Kohanim. No other person would ever be so honored **2nd Aliva:** Moshe is told to do battle against the Midianites in retaliation for the incident at Baal Peor. Moshe counts the Bnai Yisroel in preparation for entering Eretz Yisroel. The total number of men over 20 years old, not including the Levivim, is 601,730; compared to 40 years earlier when it was 603,550. If you include all men, women and children, the total is approx. three million

3rd Aliva: Moshe divides Israel through a lottery that miraculously matched each tribe to its proper portion. The Leviyim are counted. **4th Aliya:** Motivated by the "shayla – question" of Tzelafchad's daughters regarding their father who died without any sons, the laws of inheritance are discussed. Moshe is told to prepare for his death, and Yehoshua is chosen as his successor.

5th. 6th & 7th Alivot: The remainder of the Parsha details the various public sacrifices offered throughout the year: daily, Shabbos, Musaf, Rosh Chodesh, and every Yom Tov.

WELCOME TO BETH ISRAEL SYNAGOGUE

We are delighted to welcome you to Beth Israel Synagogue. A passage from Deuteronomy 30:11-14 inspired the art work in the sanctuary. "For this commandment that I command you today - it is not hidden from you and it is not distant. It is not in heaven, [for you] to say, 'Who can go to the heaven and take it for us so that we can listen to it and perform it?' Nor is it across the seas, [for you] to say, 'Who can cross to the other side of the sea for us and take it for us, so that we can listen to it and perform it?' Rather, the matter is very near to you - in your mouth and your heart - to perform it." Mitzvot are obtainable.

- ◆ The focal point of the sanctuary is the Menorah Window, which frames the Ark and is shaped in the form of the six branched candelabrum. To the right, brilliantly colored windows have forms that reflect the heavens, while the left side depicts the seas.
- ♦ The message is completed in a frieze, the horizontal painting on wood mounted on the wall. The background of the frieze symbolically and abstractly represents the relationship between G-d and the people of Israel through the Covenant. The perochet, or curtain over the Ark, completes the symbolic composition, with an expression that intertwines the Torah and the letter Aleph, the first letter of the Hebrew alphabet, of the Ten Commandments, and of G-d's name in Hebrew.
- ♦ As is traditional, the sanctuary has 12 windows, representing the 12 tribes of Israel. These windows contain the name of each tribe in flowing, organic letters. The windows are located above the continued frieze, which includes two central texts of the revelation at Sinai "If you will keep my Covenant, you shall be precious to me," and "You shall be a kingdom of priests and a holy nation." This composition expresses the unity of Israel as the people stood together at Sinai and accepted the Torah.
